"Evan's extensive background in private practice and public service will be a fantastic addition to the bench, and I am confident that he will faithfully defend the Constitution and uphold the rule of law for the people of Texas."

Young is a partner at the Baker Botts law firm in Austin and previously served as counsel to the U.S. attorney general, where he spent a year on detail to the U.S. embassy in Baghdad, Iraq.

The annual cash report from the state comptroller outlines the economic damage caused by the CO-VID-19 pandemic. From August 2019 to August 2020, the state's economy lost 616,600 non-farm jobs, largely from the economic aftershocks of the pandemic and a drop in energy prices. However, sales tax collections, a major part of the state's revenue, increased two-tenths of a percent in 2020 because of increases in retail spending that offset declines in oil and gasrelated sectors.

Sales tax collections comprise nearly 60% of the state's total revenues, according to the comptroller's office.

A couple of other items that should be considered before attempting to use introduced plants are insects and other predators present along with the presence/ amount of ground water available for use in irrigation.

Each of these soil or climatic conditions can be a limiting factor; if just one of the requirements includprecipitation, light, etc. are not met the plant will not perform as it should even though all of the other factors are supplied. Everything has to "click" in order for Agriculture to be a successful supplier of food, fabric, shelter and energy.

There's a lot more to it than sticking seed in the ground, adding a little bit of fertilizer and some rainwater to make it work. Or buying a calf, putting him in a Coastal patch and expecting quality beef in 9 months. It's hard work and you have a lot of things beyond your control that you have to work against to have a positive outcome. This most likely is the biggest reason that less than 2% of the population of the U.S.A. are involved in production Agriculture.

If you haven't figured it out yet this area of Agricultural Science is one of my "oldies, but goodies"; my students would receive a plentiful dose of this information. Maybe even more than they signed up for! 'til next time.



Scott Moore was a member of the U.S. Air Force from 1991 to 1999, leaving after attaining the rank of Staff Sergeant. He was a helicopter crew chief, initially assigned to the 55th Special Operations Squadron at Hurlburt Field in Florida.

"We flew the all-weather, extended range MH-60 Pave Hawk (a highly modified version of the UH-60 Black Hawk helicopter)."

Moore's time in service was most memorable when he was stationed in Keflavik, Iceland, because that is where he met his wife, Ruth, who was serving in the U.S. Navy.

"We explored Iceland while we were dating, visiting geysers, glaciers, and waterfalls, and were able to experience together the distinctive culture that is unique to the Icelandic people," Moore said.

They were married and their first child was born while stationed there.

"One morning, shortly after our first child was born, I was getting ready to do some grocery shopping while my wife planned on staying home with our new baby daughter.

"I've done a little of everything," said Dunlap, who paved roads and laid natural gas pipes in Springtown as well as worked at General Motors for a time. "But I was never out of a job if I wanted to work."

Dunlap served in the Navy from 1944-47, making \$25 a month until he got a raise to \$120 three and a half years later. Three of his brothers also served – one in the Army, one in the Navy and one in the Air Force.

"Instead of being drafted, I went to the Navy so I could travel," Dunlap said. "And I did travel."

One of the highlights of Dunlap's military service was being there to watch the peace treaty being signed at Tokyo Bay in 1945, marking the end of the war.

Dunlap's thought during this auspicious moment was "Oh boy," knowing the war was over.

Dunlap also was off the coast of Japan when U.S. forces dropped atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Afterward, he toured the bombed area. He called the experience "unbelievable."

"It just ripped that town all to pieces, both places," Dunlap said, adding that the people there didn't say much and were processing shock. "I don't know what they thought."
