

Domestic violence shelter coming to Azle

Future, Hope and Healing Center discusses plans for shelter at public meeting on Main Street

AZLE — On Nov. 16, interested parties and volunteers from Future, Hope and Healing Center met at Slice Dessert Bar to discuss exciting new prospects for the organization and the Azle community. While the non-profit has provided free counseling, resources and hundreds of nights of safe sleep to victims of domestic violence, it has

been limited in providing long-term support to families due to a lack of shelter, until now.

Future, Hope and Healing Center is an Azle-based non-profit that provides assistance, resources and security for victims of domestic abuse. Located on 141 W. Main Street, its office also houses Hope's Bazaar resale shop, which raises funds

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Boyd administrator asks for more water from Walnut Creek SUD

SUD board to consider granting request at future meeting

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SPRINGTOWN — Walnut Creek Special Utility District will consider increasing the amount of water the city of Boyd receives.

At the board of directors meeting on Nov. 20, Boyd City Administrator William Taylor spoke to the board about the city's need for more water, which is provided to the city via agreements with Walnut Creek SUD.

Taylor described booming growth in Boyd. In a particularly large subdivi-

sion, he reported hundreds of homes are expected to be completed in about 18 months, including some that are already built or will be by the end of the year and some that will be done around February and March. Taylor added that 2,800 more homes are in the pre-planning phase.

"We're here tonight to find out if the district is open to providing the additional water for those houses that we've approved in the subdivision or if the city needs to

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Springtown installs crosswalk by elementary school after grandmother reports near accident

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SPRINGTOWN — After Springtown-area resident Teresa Shipley experienced a dangerous situation while walking her granddaughter to school, she called on the city of Springtown to remedy the issue.

City staff answered her call. Shipley and her granddaughter were walking to Springtown Elementary School to attend Grandparent's Morning when Shipley said she was almost hit by a car on the west side of the school.

"I could've hit the car with my hand because that's how close it was," she said.

After the incident, Shipley notified the police and city officials. The next day — Oct. 26 — public works crews installed a crosswalk at the intersection of Third Street and Avenue D.

"Luckily, we had all the materials on hand, and it only takes a couple hours to put those in," Springtown Public Works Director Joseph McCannless said. "It worked out really well."

McCannless added, "If it's something that's quick and doable and reasonable that a

customer requests, we try to fulfill any request we can."

After the crosswalk was installed, Shipley said it should've been done sooner and in a more proactive manner.

"It shouldn't take for me to go in or somebody to nearly get ran over for that to happen," she said. "Shouldn't it be done like in July, maybe before school starts in August?"

Shipley said the installation of the crosswalk was good, but she would also like to see it be monitored, though it seems this overwatch does occur at least to some extent. Springtown Elementary School Principal Pearl Russell reported that before the time change, teachers who monitor the crosswalk area noticed safety concerns in the mornings when it was dark outside and students walked to school in dark clothing, but that problem isn't as prevalent anymore.

Russell was pleased that city staff installed the crosswalk so quickly. Still, she warned families to be careful when navigating school traffic.

"Given Springtown Elementary's current overcrowding challenges, we hope

our community will exercise caution around not only our campus but all campuses in Springtown ISD during pick-up and drop-off times," she said. "Heavy traffic is unavoidable, and your patience and cooperation greatly contribute to student safety and well-being."

SISD Superintendent Shane Strickland praised McCannless' swift efforts to install the crosswalk.

"We appreciate the prompt action taken by the city's public works director to address the safety concern and install a new crosswalk," Strickland said. "The safety and well-being of our students continues to be our utmost priority. As the district continues to grow, so do our many needs."

Strickland also lauded SISD staff for adapting to demands in order to be successful.

"The entire staff should be commended for their efforts that tend to pull them out of what we would consider to be the normalcy of daily operation," he said. "One area that tends to be overlooked and can be probably one of the most stressful times of the day is during arrival and dismissal, particularly when dealing with traffic."

As far as monitoring, the superintendent pointed out that two campuses have dedicated and trained crossing guards, and soon, school resource officers will be stationed at each campus. These officers are expected to enhance safety and security in multiple areas, including traffic management.

"While we acknowledge the challenges posed by heavy traffic and overcrowding at

many of our campuses, these are factors beyond our immediate control," Strickland said. "We value the feedback from our community members and remain committed to ensuring the safety of our students and all visitors to our schools."

At the Nov. 13 school board meeting, Shipley addressed the board and called on them to pressure the city into creating a safer area

at the school, such as by installing and maintaining Americans with Disabilities Act-approved sidewalks. The grandmother fears there could be a tragic accident in that area that could require children who witness it to need counseling for psychological and emotional harm.



"Why create havoc when you can prevent the havoc?" she said to The Tri-County Reporter.

Since the approval of the Nov. 7 bond proposition, we have been diligently working on the projects. We are work-

ing closely with VLK architects in the design process and are seeking a general contractor or contractors for the projects. The process includes advertising an RFQ (Request for Qualifications), accepting and reviewing submissions, an interview process, and a scoring rubric,

along with specific timelines and various legal regulations. Once a contractor is secured, they will work closely with the district and VLK in the design process. Our commitment of delivering you, our Azle ISD community and valued tax payers, quality buildings on time and within budget remains strong. As a reminder, we cannot change grade configurations until ALL projects have been completed. The expected completion date is fall 2026.

Regarding the November 2021 bond projects, a reminder this was AHS focused. The expanded and renovated cafeteria and serving area opened on the first day of school. It has been amazing

having room for all AHS students to be together in one lunch room over three lunch periods. The two-story science lab, also a storm shelter for ALL of AHS, is wrapping up completion. It, along with the second welding shop and a second culinary arts classroom, will have students in them when we return from the break. The additions and renovations at AHS give our high school a student capacity of 2,400 students. Currently, our high school enrollment is 2,138 students.

As with all bond projects, this would not happen without your approval. We are thankful for your support and entrusting us with your tax dollars. Our strong finan-

cial and years of Superior FIRST ratings are key indicators of our commitment to being good stewards of our community's tax dollars.

Our first semester ends with an early release on Thursday, Dec. 21. Staff returns on Monday, Jan. 8, and students return on Wednesday, Jan. 10, kicking off the start of our second semester.

Reno council awards 2 more bids for water disinfection systems project

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RENO — Reno is moving closer toward converting its water disinfection system and thus making it easier to enhance its supply with water from other entities after last week's city council meeting.

On Nov. 27, Reno City Council accepted two bids related to this project. First, the council awarded a bid for electrical work on the seven well heads not to exceed \$47,585 to Cody Vaughan Electric, LLC. Then council approved a bid for excavation and construction of seven concrete pads for no more than \$8,910 to Wendell Chesney Cement Contractor, Inc.

In April, the council accepted the \$273,000 bid from Environmental Improvements, Inc., for

equipment purchase and delivery of the disinfection systems for each wellsite. The skid units, which include a tank, pumps and controls, will be installed at the well sites to produce chloramines and are expected to arrive in Reno in early December, Public Works Director Chris Albright said. The skid units will be situated on concrete pads adjacent to wells and run using electricity.

“It's an all weatherproof unit, completely enclosed,” Albright said. “It can withstand rain, lightning, ice storms, snowstorms, you name it.”

Converting the disinfection systems will allow Reno to be compatible with water systems in Azle, Springtown and Walnut Creek Special Utility

District by using the same chemical mixture as those entities, Albright said previously. This means Reno can get water from these entities without asking residents to boil their water.

“It'll allow us to basically open our water line to those outside connections without any repercussions on the water system,” Albright said on Nov. 27.

This project to replace the chlorine disinfection systems with chloramine ones at all well sites was partially funded by a Texas Department of Agriculture grant for \$500,000, which the city matched with \$636,000. Money for the electrical and concrete work that the city approved on Nov. 27 comes from the city's well maintenance budget.

Converting the disinfection systems was not only a priority of the grant funding, but it was also mentioned as an important task in two prior reports prepared by engineering firm CobbFendley.

The city's 2019-2029 Capital Improvements Plan Update and Impact Fee Analysis for Water, Sanitary Sewer and Thoroughfares lists the disinfection systems conversion as a priority among other projects. The other report, City of Reno: Potable Water Model, from 2021 states that Reno should work out an agreement with nearby entities and use their water supplies to meet the requirements of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

During the Nov. 27 meeting, council member Joy Jenkins pointed out the original plan was for Reno's public works staff to install the concrete pads themselves. Though she and other council members were pleased with the bid for concrete pads, Jenkins asked Albright why the work needed to be contracted out instead of done internally.

“With all the leaks we had that we're trying to fix and get caught up on and between meter reads and all that, we don't have time,” Albright said in response to Jenkins's question. He also pointed out that the concrete contractor is an expert and can do the work better than he can.

After the bid for the skid units was approved in April, Albright had hoped the conversion project would be completed by the end of the

year, but now, the deadline has been moved to the end of January.

“There were a little bit of delays on the engineering side, but we're running close — very, very close — to schedule,” he said. “But once we get the pads in, we should be on schedule, and they should be able to finish all the pads within a week and a half or so.”

Previously, Albright described the disinfection systems conversion project as a necessary improvement, and he reiterated those sentiments after the Nov. 27 meeting.

“This is just a small percentage of what needs to be done in the city, but it's a step in the right direction,” he said.

seek some other methods to get that water,” he said during the meeting.

Taylor said Boyd needs 381 gallons per minute instead of the 215 gallons per minute the city currently receives to provide water for Phase 1 of the new subdivision. He proposed further discussions of additional increases as more housing phases are finished, including from 381 gallons per minute to 400, 400 to 498 and then 498 to 663.

“We understand that the district has their customers, their needs, and before we can take a whole bunch of water, you guys have to make sure that you can actually get it to the delivery point,” Taylor said to the board. “We want to work with you guys on that more as a partner

moving forward other than just a customer. So, on our end, I think there are things that we can continue to fund that will help the district. Obviously, we're going to be increasing the amount of water that we purchase if the district will allow us to actually do that. So, I think long term, it could be a good relationship.”

At the meeting, SUD general manager James Blackwood said he didn't have an issue with increasing Boyd to 381 gallons per minute since the SUD has allowed the city to take as much as 440 gallons per minute. He even suggested going ahead with 400 gallons per minute instead of 381.

“That way we're not sitting right back here in this same spot in February,” Blackwood said. “We got a little bit longer, a little more cushion to play with.”

However, Blackwood added the caveat that he would have to discuss the matter further with the water plant operator before a final decision is made. The board is expected to consider this topic again in December.

“We'll work with you as long as we take care of our home folks, too,” Board President Mike Gilley said to Taylor at the meeting.

Taylor also said the city is building a pump station and storage tank that is expected to ease the effect of Boyd's water usage by slowly pulling water as opposed to taking a lot all at once.

“It solves problems for us on our end, and I think it'll eliminate some of the impact on y'all's end,” he said.

Walnut Creek SUD recently received just under \$40 million for water infrastructure improvements that will increase the water plant's

capacity to 12 million gallons a day. This includes adding a 4-million-gallons-per-day filter to the water plant, which is expected to be installed about nine months after bids are awarded.

After the meeting, Taylor seemed pleased with how his request was received.

“Right now, I think everybody has a limited amount of water to provide, so I'm just happy that it looks like we're going to be able to get that lined out and meet our immediate needs,” he said. “I think the biggest challenge is with Southern Wise County and Parker County growing so much, the water availability is just not there to support the rate of growth we have. I think everybody is trying to find at least interim solutions and then long-term solutions so that whoever follows us at least has a good starting point.”

November school board meeting packed with info

ISD Board recognizes athletes, presents campus attendance awards, addressed school safety and hears from TEKS Resource System

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AZLE — Hoover Elementary student council members led the Pledge of Allegiance during November's school board meeting alongside their teacher sponsors. Afterward, the students shook hands with board trustees.

SPECIAL THANKS AND ATHLETIC ACHIEVEMENT

The Azle ISD Board of Trustees and Superintendent Todd Smith thanked the district's political action committee and long-range planning committee for their work in getting the word out about the recent bond election. Kara Stumph, Jay Ewing and Tiffany Baisden were on hand to represent the committees.

"They're a small group but they do great things," Smith said. "Obviously, they were a huge part of the success of the bond."

Becky Spurlock, director of athletics, recognized the many achievements made by Azle High School athletes this fall.

"The coaches did a phenomenal job this year of teaching the basics of work ethics and defeating adversity," Spurlock said.

Spurlock said she is especially proud that every kid in the varsity volleyball program and 11 on the tennis team were named All-District Academics, meaning they had at least a 3.50 cumulative grade point average among other requirements. Spurlock also said she was proud of coaches stressing academics as much of winning on the court.

Kenley Buckholt, head volleyball coach, said the team's achievements were almost a year in the making and she was proud of their hard work. The coach introduced the players and listed their accolades one-by-one.

"I'm very proud of these girls and I bet we'll be back here again with hopefully even more people to talk about it next year," Buckholt said.

The cross-country team's coach Keith Boenisch spoke about how the girls started practices in June. Boenisch noted that Aledo was the only 5A school that could beat them in the area.

Tennis Coach Conner Mason and Assistant Coach Dalton Baron recognized their students. "It's great to see the camaraderie," Mason said. "They get started the second school ends and unless you're graduating it never ends. Last year was the first year they made playoffs. This year they did better, as bi-district champions. They finished third, the highest they ever did."

CAMPUS ATTENDANCE AWARDS

Assistant Superintendent Matt Adams introduced the winners of Azle ISD's campus attendance awards. The awards were paused during COVID-19 but are now continuing.

"All the research shows kids need to be in the classroom," Adams said. "Kids do better when they're in the classroom."

The award is intended to encourage campuses to promote student attendance. Along with the award, schools with 95% or higher attendance rates receive \$1,000 for their Hornet Activity Fund to use however they want on campus. Adams said this year, more money has been awarded to Hornet Activity Funds than ever before. Some principals of these winning campuses were present to be recognized for the achievement. Azle Elementary, Azle Junior High, Cross Timbers Elementary, Eagle Heights Elementary, Hilltop Elementary, Hoover Elementary, Liberty Elementary, Silver Creek Elementary, and Walnut Creek Elementary each received the award.

"As a sidenote, it also helps our budget because revenue is based on (average daily attendance)," Adams said.

SCHOOL SAFETY

The board discussed holding its first reunification drill to practice what schools need to do to reunite parents with students following a crisis, along with use of the Raptor app. The drill, which was held the day after the meeting, had students bussed from campuses to the administration building to meet with their waiting parents.

Azle ISD Police Chief Darren Brockway presented the results of a recent Texas Education Agency (TEA) security audit. Beginning last year, the state mandated that TEA would begin security audits on campuses throughout the state of Texas. This is Azle ISD's second year to be tested. Five campuses were audited with only Walnut Creek Elementary receiving a correction item and a failure of the audit. While no one was able to enter the building in the first phase of the audit, a door was found to have not been properly secured in the second phase during a spot-check.

"Since this began, we've never had anyone just be able to get into any of our campuses," Brockway said. "We did have one campus that had an issue with the door latch. (Walnut Creek Elementary). This door has been checked daily, but it's just the way it goes. When the

auditor showed up it wasn't completely shut."

Brockway said the door had expanded due to temperature change and positive pressure from the air conditioning. The school has since tightened the latch on the door and readjusted the angle portion tension arm so the door now slams shut to prevent reoccurrence.

Brockway is satisfied the issue has been addressed. By law, Brockway must discuss the failure with the board in open session, conduct a safety and security meeting and provide training for staff and substitute teachers at Walnut Creek Elementary. Last year, Azle Junior High failed part of the audit when a playground fence on campus was found to not meet TEA's 8-foot non-scalable requirement. This year, Hoover Elementary, Azle Junior High, the Disciplinary Alternative Education Program campus, Walnut Creek Elementary and Cross Timbers Elementary schools were audited.

DISTRICT PRAISED IN TEA PILOT PROGRAM

TEKS Resource System (TRS) has recently partnered with Azle ISD as part of a pilot program to review, grade and improve aspects of the district's curriculum and facilities.

Dr. Erica Weber of TRS recently visited all 12 Azle campuses and has begun a second round of principal-led reviews. Weber presented a report of her initial finding at the Nov. 13 school board meeting.

"There are some phenomenal things happening in this district," Weber said. "With each and every single group of campuses that I walked, the classroom management and the student behaviors was absolutely phenomenal. I have never been in a school district (with this level of) compliance of the students. The engagement — I have never seen it. It was absolutely stellar. Teachers were working extremely hard, they were up, walking around, talking with students."

Weber described 95% of elementary classrooms, 100% of intermediate school classrooms and 98% of middle school classrooms being in alignment with TRS. She said there is effective utilization of cross-connectivity between subjects and depth complexity icons. Weber particularly praised the high school English department and intermediate school social studies classes.

"When you get to middle school and high school level you start thinking you're going to see all these classroom behaviors and classroom management issues and non-compliance, but that was not





the case. Again, stellar behavior. Teachers were really putting in the work there. The engagement of students by the teachers was awesome. The conversations they were having, and the engagement of the students just is not common in high schools."

Weber also listed a few areas where Azle schools could see improvement, including increasing the level of ques-

tioning, implementing activities that encourage independent thinking, a greater use of academic language and better utilizing time on task.

Weber said she has been in over 100 classrooms since August and declared Azle's were not only the best, but they exceeded expectations.

"As compliant as our students are, they're not having to be distracted with routine

classroom management, so we should be seeing larger gains and that's what we're hopefully going to get to," Superintendent Todd Smith said.

Along with the pilot program, Azle ISD is also utilizing a Parker County Strategic Leadership Grant and other resources to improve the quality of education at its campuses.

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Old-Fashioned Christmas

Old-Fashioned Christmas highlights the community's traditional small town values

For the last 30 years, Springtownians have gathered on the town Square and under its crown-jewel Tabernacle every second Saturday in December to celebrate the Christmas season as a community.

For 25 years, this event was known as Christmas on the Square, and continues to be hosted by the City of Springtown as a way to blend Yuletide and community spirit as a gift to the community. In 2019, the City's newly formed Events Committee, following direction from the City Council, worked to vastly expand and improve the event. While many mainstay traditions – such as free photos with Santa, performances from local entertainers, and vendors selling all kinds of wares – remained, the City's goal was to elevate the event to a higher level and provide even more holiday fun for its residents.

That year, the event was renamed Old-Fashioned Christmas, to highlight the community's traditional small town values and establish an warm and charming atmosphere in which families and friends could celebrate the Christmas season in a variety

of ways.

Old-Fashioned Christmas would become a two-part event. The first, is a magical evening, lighted float parade which ushers Santa into the Square, and culminate with Saint Nicholas himself lighting the communities several stories-tall and beautifully decorated Christmas tree – which was purchased in part with the help of several gracious donors. During the parade and tree-lighting ceremony, there is a guaranteed 100 percent chance of snow which adds to mystical ambience. After the tree-lighting, Santa sticks around to take photos with all the good little boys and girls who are in attendance.

Following the parade and tree-lighting, on the second Saturday in December each year, is the annual festival which now includes even more vendors, children's activities, Christmas-themed contests, and much more. The two events continued despite the challenges of the TXDOT FM 51 project, which limited access to the town's Square, and the COVID-19 pandemic which, in 2020, prompted the first-ever (and hopefully only) reverse parade where floats parked on the Square for at-

tendees to enjoy while driving the parade route themselves.

The 2023 event promises to be the best one yet. This year the parade has been moved from the Sunday after Thanksgiving to the first Sunday in December – Sunday, December 3 at 6pm. For the festival, the City expects there to be a record number of vendors on hand, including carnival-style food vendors and vendors selling a myriad of one-of-kind Christmas gifts.

For the first time, and which aims to become one of our favorite annual traditions, Old-Fashioned Christmas will feature free ice-skating in Springtown Park at Newby Pavilion, a debut planned for last year's rained-out festival. This year's inflatables will be Christmas-themed and will undoubtedly produce priceless photo opportunities and memories. Admission to the festival, the ice-skating, and the inflatables are all available free of charge, though the ice-skating requires reservations which can be made through the City's website.

Simple tricks to disentangle holiday lights

The joyous holiday season is enhanced by the beautiful and festive decorations that adorn homes and businesses during this special time of year. Twinkling lights are part of the holiday decorating equation. However, tangled lights in storage bins and boxes can sap anyone's holiday spirit.

Christmas lights can turn into a tangled mess no matter how hard people work to avoid such an outcome. Christmas lights get tangled partly because of their design. There is a metal wire inside the cord to help with the packaging of the lights, which gives the cord a natural curve. Furthermore, most light cords are made from twisted or braided wires that have spaces throughout. The lights themselves can get snagged in these pockets between the wires.

Although it can be frustrating to deal with tangled lights that look like balls of yarn in a knitting basket, there are ways to disentangle them with relative ease – and then pack them in a way that can reduce fur-

ther tangles.

Begin by plugging all lights into the outlet to see if they work. If most of the bulbs are burnt out or the lights do not go on at all, discard the strand. There's no point untangling lights only to learn they don't work.

Start slowly, beginning on the plug end, when untangling the lights. Keep the strand you're working on separate from the other lights so they do not inadvertently become entangled. Tackle this job in a space with a lot of room. Lay the lights out on a large table or sit on the floor to do the untangling.

Utilize a pen or pencil to fish out more stubborn snags. This can help you loosen any knots and make it easier to pull snags through.

Lay the untangled strands out in a safe area away from your working space as you work through each strand.

One of the ways to avoid the hassle of tangled lights is to remember to store the lights in ways that will reduce their

propensity for tangling in the first place.

- Rather than wrap lights around your hand or arm to condense the strand, use something else. A piece of cardboard, a hanger and some PVC tubing can keep lights from becoming tangled.

- Store lights in a zip-top bag to keep them from tangling with other strands stored together.

- Save the original boxes and return the lights to them after each use.

- Icicle lights have hanging strands of lights on longer strands, which can compound tangling issues. Use a rubber band to gather the hanging 'icicles' together, or use some plastic wrap for the same purpose.

- Invest in a cord reel, similar to what you might use for a garden hose. Longer light strands or wires are stored on such reels, and they can be used with Christmas lights.

Patience and care can prevent holiday lights from becoming tangled.

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Holiday wreath dos and don'ts

No greenery is more recognized during the holiday season than Christmas trees. However, wreaths likely take a close second to towering evergreens when it comes to green holiday decor.

It is important to treat wreaths with care in order to maximize their longevity and beauty. The following tips can help ensure wreaths remain fresh and festive throughout the month of December.

- Choose the right design. Select a wreath that is not too busy nor too boring. It is important to strike the right balance. A good wreath has a focal point, which may be a festive bow or another decorative piece. Keep in mind this is a wreath which should have lots of greenery on display, rather than flowers that characterize other seasonal wreaths.

- Weigh your wreath. Take a moment to ask a salesman how heavy the wreath is when you purchase it. Knowing the weight of the

wreath will help you identify the proper hanging mechanism, as hooks are generally characterized by the weight they can hold. A less than sturdy hook can increase the chances the wreath falls down and ends up damaged.

- Determine your hanging method. Once you know the weight of the wreath, you can figure out how to secure it to a door or window without having to drill holes into any structures. Removable adhesive strips are one option, provided you attach something like cardboard or another material to the back of the wreath upon which the adhesive strips can be stuck. Otherwise, over-the-door wreath hangers are wise investments that can support large, heavy wreaths.

- Consider the safety of pets. When decorating with plant material, it is important to know what is safe for pets in the household. According to the Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine, most holiday plants cause irritation

of the mouth. Pine trees produce oils that can cause gastrointestinal issues.

- Exercise caution with storm doors. If you hang a wreath between a glass storm door and your front door, the air around the wreath will heat up and cause the wreath to turn brown.

- Choose a cool spot. In addition to avoiding heat that builds up between doors, you should select a cool spot out of the hot sun. Many pine trees, like balsam fir, react more favorably to cooler temperatures and will keep their vibrant green color and fragrance more readily.

- Go artificial. If you want to hang a wreath indoors, opt for an artificial one. Prolonged warm temperatures inside may prematurely dry out a fresh wreath, ultimately turning it into a fire hazard.

7 ways to organize and store holiday decorations

Decorating a home for holidays is quite popular. A survey from the National Retail Federation found that 53 percent of respondents said they were planning to decorate their home or yard for Halloween in 2023.

With so many avid holiday decorators, individuals will need to find ways to organize and store their seasonal items. Holiday decor comes in many different sizes - from the smallest tree ornaments to il-

luminated statues for the yard or inflatable items. Figuring out a storage plan can take a little effort. These seven tips can help.

1. Purchase clear, similarly sized storage bins and shelving racks, hanging them where you plan to keep the decorations. Most people prefer an out-of-the-way spot, such as in the garage, attic or basement. Label each bin by holiday and put the bins in chronological order to make finding items

more convenient. Uniform bin sizes make it easier to stack and store.

2. Store smaller items inside larger decor items. Decorative baskets or wrapped boxes brought out for Christmas or Chanukah are ideal places to keep smaller tchotchkes like ceramics, dreidels, candlestick holders, or mantel hooks. Delicate items can be tucked into Christmas stockings or wrapped and stored in a fluffy tree skirt. Egg cartons can be

used to keep small items safe as well.

3. Label everything so you will not need to dig through boxes or bins to know what is inside. This might be a good year to ask for a label maker for the holidays!

4. Use overhead or wall storage for holiday decor. Overhead spaces in the garage or basement walls can be good spaces to keep holiday decorations. Always keep bins and boxes off the floor so they are

not vulnerable to damage related to leaks or floods.

5. Garment bags can protect larger decorations, such as wreaths, artificial trees or signs. If you have a large number of mechanical, illuminated or inflatable lawn ornaments, consider investing in a small shed where these items can be safely kept. Wrap the extension cords and any bracing stakes or strings used with the decorations so it's easy to find.

6. Utilize pieces of cardboard

as well as toilet paper or paper towel tubes to keep lights and wires tidy. Tuck cords into the toilet paper tubes, and wrap lights around the cardboard to avoid tangles.

7. Each year, take inventory of your decoration collection and toss out anything that is damaged or has seen better days.

Storing holiday decorations will take some time, but once you establish a system, things will be simple year after year.

and collects supplies for the organization. Sally Daniels founded the organization in 2015 and ran it from a Lake Worth office until 2018, when it moved to Azle.

While the organization was already beginning plans on a permanent shelter to be built by the year 2025, Servolution Network jumpstarted its plans by donating a three-bedroom, two-bathroom home to provide a temporary shelter expected to open by Jan. 1, 2024. Currently, the temporary shelter needs new furnishings and repairs. Part of the reason for the Nov. 16 meeting was to organize this effort and to urge community members to volunteer and donate toward the cause. Future, Hope and Healing Center is also looking for committee members to help organize and plan its upcom-

ing shelter efforts.

"Why is there is a need for shelter?" Daniels asked rhetorically. "Because the shelters are full. When you call a domestic violence shelter there is a 40% chance the shelter is full. It's not safe to go to somebody's house because if the abuser knows where they're at, now you've put everybody at risk. There is a huge need for a shelter (in Azle)."

According to Daniels, the Wise Hope Shelter and Crisis Center in Decatur receives about half its clients from the Azle area. Daniels said having a shelter in Azle would mean families fleeing domestic violence would not have to risk changing schools, abandoning support systems, or relocating in order to receive assistance.

Elijah Featherston of Jag Metals has volunteered his consulting services to help plan and organize the construction of the permanent

shelter in 2025. The permanent shelter is intended to have a living room, kitchen, playroom, playground and 10 bedrooms in order to house up to 40 people. Future, Hope and Healing Center also wants to run its administration office and an event center from the site. The organization hopes to build the shelter on a six-to-eight-acre property and anticipates using the surrounding area for gardening, animal husbandry and artisanal manufacturing in order to generate revenue for the upkeep of the shelter.

"The ultimate goal will actually be, who knows how many years down the road, to maybe have about 10 transitional families that will have their own apartment and be able to be there for two years," Daniels said. "(They can) go to school if that's what they need to do and do whatever they need to do to become settled and become completely independent and

not have to depend on finding someone to help take care of their family's needs. A lot of people go back (to abusers) because at the end of the day, I can't put food on the table and now my babies are hungry and so I go back to the abuser because at least there's food there. I'll get beat up, but my kids are going to get fed. We don't want that; we never want that to happen. Our goal is to ensure as much safety and as much independence as possible."

During the meeting, Daniels expressed the shelter's need for storage space, as Hope's Bazaar was effectively overflowing with donated items. Jason Malewiski, director of Servolution Network, then offered to donate a 12-foot-by-18-foot shed in a kit and semi-trailer for Future, Hope and Healing Center to use for storage.

"I am overwhelmed still," Daniels said of the donation. "Last Tuesday (when

Servolution connected the organization to an anonymous donor for the temporary shelter building) after all these blessings started coming, all of our staff just kept crying and going 'I can't believe this.' We spent the rest of the week saying, 'oh my gosh we have so much to get done.' It just tells me that we live in an amazing community. It's scary, but it's a big step forward and a big step in faith and we're taking it."

Future, Hope and Healing Center is a faith-centered organization that chooses not to rely on government grants. Daniels said the inspiration for both the organization as a whole and the shelter came after much arguing and conversation with God. Servolution is a faith-based non-profit which, among other things, repairs homes for those in need in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

"God's gifted with us with some blessings and

we can just pay it forward," Malewiski said. "I've seen Sally putting her nose to the grindstone for eight years to make this happen so I'm excited to jump alongside and help her."

With the Azle Police Department's creation of a domestic violence unit in March 2023 and its partnership with Future, Hope and Healing Center, the organization reaches more clients than ever and is the de facto resource provider for domestic violence victims in Azle. In recent months, the resale shop has also seen record-breaking sales, demonstrating to its leadership that this lightning-speed expansion may not only be viable, but also necessary for the community. Future, Hope and Healing Center plans to hold another public meeting in January to discuss the plans moving forward.


Born in Bowie on June 8, 1940, Monte spent his childhood in River Oaks. In 1969, he moved to Azle, where he built his life and raised his family.

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Winter falls

Fort Worth neurosurgeon urges caution when prepping for the holidays

While decking halls, don't slip and fall this holiday season.

Accidental tumbles are the largest cause of non-fatal emergency room visits in the United States, according to the CDC. In 2021, there were approximately 6.98 million of these visits from across the age spectrum.

Dr. Christopher D. Shank, a Fort Worth native, TCU grad and medical director of Texas Health Fort Worth's Neuro-Trauma Program, says the holidays often bring an increase in the number of patients to the facility.

"We see these kinds of injuries year-round, but we certainly see an increase in either inclement weather-related or decorating-related trauma this time of year," Dr. Shank said in an interview with the Tri-County Reporter.

"Ground level falls and falls from a height are the two most common traumatic mechanisms for our facility, more than motor vehicle accidents or gunshot wounds or anything like that. We see a lot of plain old ground level falls both in and out of the home. We do see a large number of falls from a short height, like falling off a step ladder in or around the house. I've seen several falls through an attic floor and unfortunately, we do see a significant number of falls from a larger height like falling out of a tree or off of a roof or off a multi-story building. It's basically the whole gamut."

Dr. Shank explained that while falls from a larger height often cause more damage, even trivial falls can present unexpected levels of danger, especially in the elderly population or those on blood thinners, for example. While some falls may result in obvious signs of injury, like lacerations, numbness or severe pain, serious problems can also be subtle. A gradual increase in pain over days or weeks, dizziness or even forgetfulness can be a few of the symptoms of an unnoticed injury to the nervous system.

"Frequently there are no external signs of a brain or spinal injury," Dr. Shank said. "It's not like if you cut your arm and you're bleeding, there's an obvious sign of injury there. So that's why it's particularly important to pay close attention to those symptoms. If there are new symptoms or they get worse over time, then that would be a reason to get checked out sooner rather than later. If left unevaluated, these injuries can be devastating

to both the brain and spine, both high severity (injuries) can be devastating or even life ending."

In preventing falls, slips or potential injury, Dr. Shank says there are three important rules that can help keep you safe.

"First and foremost is knowing your surroundings and understanding the task you're taking on. If you're 147 years old, you don't need to be on the roof of your house, hanging lights up there. So, recognize your own limitations, your surroundings and the details of the task at hand. Number two is always make sure to have someone there spotting you or helping you in some capacity and number three is make sure, before you start the task, that you have all the appropriate equipment you need. (Use a) ladder or a step that is the appropriate height, so you're not at the top rung. Make sure that if you're doing stuff up on a tree or on the roof or on a balcony that you have all the appropriate safety equipment to harness you to the tree or the house."

The Climate Prediction Center anticipates wetter than normal conditions across Texas during winter 2023 and 2024. That, combined with freezing temperatures, can present a serious hazard for residents over the winter.

"I think the weather definitely plays into it," Dr. Shank said. "We don't get much snow and ice in this part of the country but we're also not very good at dealing with it when it does happen, so that's something to recognize. I would say that holiday decorating in particular leads people to get up in an area like on a tree or on the roof more than they would have. We see an enormous number of slip-and-falls, or motor vehicle accidents related to winter weather."

Dr. Shank says the elderly, who are particularly vulnerable, have earned the right to delegate outdoor tasks, decorating and holiday preparations to their loved ones at this time of year. Even still, people of all ages should exercise an appropriate level of caution and practice good safety measures while preparing to celebrate near Christmastime.

"Use caution and do everything you can to limit the need to come meet me and my team and but also know that you do have an incident like that or an injury or any of those concerning symptoms after an event that we're always here 24/7 ready to help," Dr. Shank said.

'Something to be proud of'

SPRINGTOWN — Springtown Independent School District received the highest score it has had in the past five years on the state's school financial accountability rating system.

The School Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas (FIRST) is meant to hold schools accountable for financial management practices and encourage them to improve.

"We want to make sure that our financial resources are being used to the maximum benefit possible to the students and in the classroom," SISD Assistant Superintendent of Business and Finance Wesley Thomas said at the Nov. 13 school board meeting where he presented the district's latest rating.

For the 2022-23 school year, SISD earned a superior

A rating with a score of 96, which is 10 points higher than 2021-22's rating. In the past five years, SISD's score has bounced around from A to B, but the most recent grade is the highest of them all, according to the state's data online.

At the November school board meeting, Thomas said SISD's score shows that "the district has been phenomenal stewards of taxpayer dollars."

"We are extremely proud the hard work of the business department has been recognized by this rating, and we are overly excited we can share the great news with our community that (Texas Education Agency) has recognized the outstanding finan-

cial workings and efficiency of the district," he told The Tri-County Reporter.

Thomas described this year's increased score as two-fold. The district scored higher because it has continued to decrease its liability to asset ratio, and SISD's enrollment growth also contributed to a higher score.

"SISD historically has budgeted and been extremely conservative in the fiscal matters of the district," Thomas said. "Also, as everyone is aware, our district student population continues to grow. With the student enrollment and tax base increases, SISD has been able to aggressively pay down existing debt, while at the same time keeping our existing

assets in relatively stable positions."

The annual FIRST ratings are based on data from the previous school year, so the score for 2022-23 is derived from 2021-22 data. Ratings are based on multiple indicators, such as:

- Submitting the annual financial report to the TEA by the deadline
- School districts complying with the payment terms of their debts by the end of the fiscal year
- Districts making timely payments to government agencies like the Teacher Retirement System
- Whether districts have a balanced budget, or enough revenue to cover expenses
- How much money districts have in fund balance and cash on hand
- How transparent districts have been, such as by posting financial information online and discussing changes or impacts to local, state

and federal funding at board meetings before adopting budgets

During the November school board meeting, Thomas also disclosed reimbursements from the district to school board members and the superintendent for lodging, food and transportation expenses related to mandatory training during the 2021-22 year.

"There were no frivolous gifts or anything like that over the \$250 threshold nor was there intermingling of board members with district business," Thomas said in his report.

SISD Board President Rick Beall called the rating "excellent" and "something to be proud of" while also praising SISD leaders for their work.

"I do want to say, regardless of the narrative that is out there in the state at times, that this once again proves how financially accountable public school districts

are, down to every nickel," Beall said during the Nov. 13 school board meeting.

The school board unanimously accepted the SISD's FIRST rating.

"The SISD Board of Trustees has made a commitment to keep taxes as low as possible, while at the same time maximizing opportunities for our students," Thomas said. "Even as the district has continued to lower the overall tax rate, we have been able to continue to provide exceptional opportunities for our students. The FIRST rating is merely one more example of the great work being done at SISD."

Street — which is adjacent to a Dollar General north of State Highway 199 — regarded the road as a problem, especially toward the north end. They voiced their frustrations with the potholes that damaged their vehicles and a lack of gravel or road base that caused dustiness during dry times and muddiness on rainy days.

"They used to take care of it a lot better when we were growing up," said Rhea Knowles, who moved back to Tower Street after living there when she was young, in a previous Tri-County Reporter article. "But for the last probably 10 years, it doesn't seem like anything is getting done."

Tower Street resident Chad Geeslin was so sick of Tower Street's condition that he started repaving the road himself using his own equipment and crushed asphalt from Parker County Precinct 1.

"I think I just finally got fed up and said, 'You know what, I'm just going to do something about it,'" Geeslin said in a previous Tri-County Reporter article.

Tower Street is under the city of Reno's jurisdiction, but when Public Works

Director Chris Albright was asked about the road previously, he said the city was short on the resources needed, like time and money, to fix it.

"Between all the leaks we've been doing, and all the meter reads and everything, they only have a few days allotted to being able to fix streets," Albright said previously about his staff's duties. "So, our time is really crunched right now."

Currently, using city funds, the city and county have partnered together to repair Tower Street via an interlocal agreement. The public works director reported last week that the county had started work on Tower Street.

So far, Tower Street residents are appreciating the efforts of the city and county.

"I've had several residents tell us thank you," Albright said. "They're happy to see the road fixed."

However, Tower Street dwellers will have to wait a little longer for the road to be completed. Precinct 1 Commissioner George Conley said county crews have to wait for warmer weather, probably around April or May, to apply the chipseal paving.

"It got too late in the year to chipseal it, so it'll be when the weather gets like 70 degrees

at night," Conley said. "That's the lowest it can get, and then we can chipseal it."

Geeslin, for one, said he will be counting down the days until spring.

"I'm super grateful for Parker County," he said, adding a special thanks to Conley.

Though the road is not yet perfect, Geeslin has noticed an improvement, especially with the lack of potholes.

"You can actually drive straight down the road without weaving around the potholes," he said.

Earlier this year, Geeslin's efforts to repave Tower Street himself were the subject of a city investigation, but Reno Police Chief Scott Elsner confirmed that this is no longer the case.

"If he goes out and does something else to the road, it might not be good because that's not his road," Elsner said in late October. "I understand why he did it, but he moved there when that road was already like that."

From Geeslin's perspective, his effort to attempt to fix the road, which ended up drawing attention to Tower Street's condition, was worth it.

"I was just trying to make sure we had a decent road to drive down," he said. "I would do it all over again if I had to."

didn't know them, so I didn't know what to expect, so I really took a leap of faith letting them take the reins from the get-go. I know they're proud of themselves and I'm proud of them, too."

"I always had people encouraging me and telling me I was doing great and that always helped, but I always had a blast screaming at everybody on-stage. Even though I love them all it's a good way to get your energy out screaming at them," O'Neil said. "I think the performance went really well. I think we were all able to put a

High alert for the holidays

Fire Marshall Kenny Wilson urges Azle residents to stay safe as fire risks mount

AZLE — With Christmas cheer comes a new list of Christmas fears. On Saturday, Nov. 18, residents on Silver Creek Road in Azle were given a shock when firetrucks and first responders from as far as Lake Worth and White Settlement blocked a stretch of street in front of Flying Oaks Airport. An unidentified Azle resident saw a small plane land at the strip and shortly after witnessed large billows of dark smoke coming from the area. Suspecting a plane crash, the resident notified first responders who quickly arrived to discover there had been no crash and instead the smoke had come from a neighboring property that was burning a large amount of brush in their backyard.

On Tuesday, Nov. 21, Azle's Walmart had its own fire-related mishap and was closed for several hours after there was a grease fire in the deli. According to Azle Fire Marshal Kenny Wilson, the fire at Walmart was the result of filtering the grease

from the fryer while the unit was turned on.

Both the Azle Fire Department and the Briar-Reno Fire Department see a substantial increase in calls when cold weather kicks in, and around Thanksgiving first responders easily keep busy with the number of calls they get from deep-fried turkey fires, Wilson said.

"In order to prevent grease fires, make sure combustible items are kept away from the grease and cooking area," Wilson said. "Use caution when dipping any object that contains water into hot grease as it will cause the grease to expand rapidly. Do not attempt to extinguish any grease fire with water. Use a cover and baking soda or a dry powder fire extinguisher."

In order to prevent confusion and ensure the safety of all involved, Wilson urges residents to follow all laws and proper precautions when starting fires outdoors, whether that be inside or outside city limits.

"Outdoor burning in the unincorporated county areas requires the person to fol-

low the Texas state laws on outdoor burning," Wilson said. "In short, these laws require the person only burn approved materials, make notification to the authority having jurisdiction (county fire marshal, fire department) and verify that weather conditions are acceptable. They further must have a water supply present and the fire shall be attended at all times. The fire can only be conducted between sunup and sundown. In the city, outdoor burning is prohibited without a permit issued by the city. The same rules apply, including distance requirements."

The National Fire Protection Association says half of home decoration fires in December are started by candles. Be sure to keep candles at least a foot from anything that's flammable and make sure to keep Christmas trees at least three feet away from heat sources like fireplaces, space heaters and radiators. December, January and February are the peak months for home heating fires, with space heaters being the most common culprit. Heaters, as well as can-

dles, should be kept a safe distance from any flammable material, should not be left unattended, and should only be used with extension cords or outlets rated for that heater's power needs.

As the seasons change, everyone loves to bundle up with loved ones and hot cocoa in front of a crackling fireplace or wood burning stove. But it's important to take the proper precautions before firing up the old chimney after months of disuse.

"If using a fire to warm your home, have the chimney professionally cleaned and inspected," Wilson said. "Verify the flue is open and clear of obstructions, such as bird nests. Do not over fill the fireplace with logs and clean out the fireplace after use. Make sure the coals are placed in a non-combustible receptacle to prevent fires and cool with water."

Whether weathering wild weather or just having fun this winter, be wary when cooking, decorating or heating and stay safe this holiday season.

GAME ON

My opinions on computer gaming and some of my favorite games. I've been playing games on the home computer since the days of the Trash 80. I love indie, open-world, unique, puzzle, and resource games. The cake is a lie.

Gorogoa uses combinations of tiles to tell a story through pictures, and the puzzles are solved by combining or moving these tiles. A wall with a broken ledge becomes a pathway to another landscape, a mandala from one illustration becomes a cartwheel in another. Each tile is a separate interactive scene, and you can move around inside the scene, but the tiles can also be moved to create new scenes. Part of solving the puzzle is connecting the tiles or moving them so they're stacked on top of each other to make a new scene.

Jason Roberts, creator of Gorogoa, knew nothing about game design when he started this project. His initial idea was to create an interactive graphic novel, but as indie games became more successful, he decided to create an interactive video game. He quit his full-time job to work on it. It took him six years to complete. In December 2016 Annapurna Interactive be-

gan publishing games, and Gorogoa was one of the first.


What makes the game stand out is its illustrations. Each panel is hand drawn in colored pencil, with a lot of delicate detail. Roberts has said the choice to use hand-drawn illustrations probably slowed down the development of the game and kept it small. He says in an interview with GamesBeat "I think I would have gone with the art style regardless, because that was such an important part of the project for me. I like drawing in pencil. That was a requirement for the project that had nothing to do with game design."

There's usually a team of game designers, but in this case Roberts created the game on his own, using the Unity engine to put the game together. Roberts worked with Annapurna Interactive for sound design and music,

but everything else was done by him. He says many of the creative decisions he made caused the design to be constantly challenging. He says "Each step was a struggle, finishing the game, but that awkwardness of making the game is connected to why it's unique and special. If you make something through an unlikely, inefficient process, it will seem more magical, naturally."

It's a story of a young boy who grew up in a war-ravaged country, got injured, then healed, and is now reliving those experiences as an old man. But the narrative isn't as clean cut as that. Pieces of the story are not presented in chronological order but are discovered as you play through the game.

In an interview with GamePilgrim, Roberts says "That's one of the thematic ideas underlying the game:

that the vivid moments from our life story that stand out strangely in our memory might also belong to a different axis of meaning, like a letter in an acrostic that belongs

simultaneously to two different words." Playing Gorogoa is an almost meditative experience. Its low-key gameplay and beautiful illustrations make

Let the muffins cool in the tin for a few minutes, then transfer them to a wire rack. Once they're cool, you're ready to enjoy your homemade chocolate chip muffins! Yum!


a technical school for HVAC or welding.

Springtown football leaves it all on field in dramatic finish

The Springtown Porcupines completed their football season on the day after Thanksgiving.

Their fans were thankful for three months of exciting games, culminating with Springtown's 37-17 loss to Brownwood on Nov. 24 in the regional semifinals.

The Porcupines were coming off a down year in 2022, when they won just three games. Fans weren't sure if the team would continue struggling in 2023 or bounce back.

They did both.

The Porcupines opened the season on Aug. 25 against Alvarado and played well but came up short 48-41. Then, in week 2, the Porcupines took on Graham and were knocked

around, losing 36-15.

At that point, the players could have caved. Instead, they remained focused, worked hard, listened to their coaches, and found ways back into the win column.

The Pines won nine of their next 10 games, including a district championship and an area title. They didn't lose again until starting quarterback Hudson Hulett and primary running back Drake Doggett were lost to injuries. Doggett went down with an ankle injury in the first quarter against Brownwood, and Hulett's leg had been broken in the previous week's victory over Riverside.

Hulett and Doggett were involved in 80% of the offensive yardage this season and scored a combined 70% of the

Now, she's dreaming bigger.
