Springtown brothers plead guilty to intent to distribute fentanyl

WEATHERFORD — The Parker County 43rd District Court recently convicted two Springtown men of a firstdegree felony for possessing between 4-200 grams of fentanyl with intent to deliver the drug.

Samuel Ibarra, 24, and his younger brother Angel, 21, pled guilty to the charge and were both sentenced to 10 years in prison, according to Parker County's court records online.

Parker County Special Crimes Unit arrested Samuel and Angel Ibarra in October

2022 following a search warrant at a residence near Springtown. Investigators seized 67.5 tablets - 7.4 grams — from the residence which tested positive for fentanyl.

According to the arrest report, Samuel and Angel Ibarra both admitted to selling fentanyl, and the investigator believed the drugs belonged to both of them.

In December 2022, Parker County grand jury indicted the brothers. Samuel Ibarra's case concluded April 8 while Angel made his plea on April 16.

Samuel and Angel Ibarra declined interviews with The Tri-County Reporter.



Traditions at the Masters are a good thing

This past weekend, the Masters golf tournament was held at the Augusta National Golf Club in Augusta, Georgia. The Masters is one of the four men's major championships in professional golf, and the only major played each year at the same course. The club was founded by one of the greatest golfers in the history of the sport, Bobby Jones, and his friend, Clifford Roberts. The course was opened for play in 1934 and is considered one of the greatest venues for golf in the world. To many it is a golf cathedral, and the very names "Masters" or "Augusta National" conjures images of the purest form of the sport.

Bobby Jones was the most successful amateur golfer



to ever compete at a national and international level. During his peak, he dominated the competition and competed successfully against the world's best professionals. Remarkably, he retired from competitive golf at the age of 28 to raise his family and practice law. His simple love of the game and his search for golfing perfection was unique and notable. These characteristics are the basis that led to the founding of Augusta National and

> of the Masters tournament. What is compelling is these traditions still exist.

One of the trademarks of Augusta National are the caddies are compelled to wear white overalls. At Augusta there is no room for individual expression which might detract from the purity of the match. Caddies are merely an implement, a tool for the golfers, and should never stand out or become part of the storyline.

This policy even flows to

the audience. Considered one of the hardest tickets in sports to procure, attendees are prohibited from wearing anything denim, athletic shorts or tank tops. There can be no running from hole to hole. Fans can carry no signs or take any other action which is considered distracting from the match and if they do, they are removed from the grounds and prosecuted if possible.

Remarkably, cell phones, beepers and other electronic devices are prohibited. One cannot even bring a "selfie" stick onto the grounds! Can you imagine in today's world, thousands of people being at an event and voluntarily surrendering their cell phone? I know of no other event in the world where such dictates would be so graciously accepted by its audience.

Here is something refreshing, while no spectators may bring a cooler or any other device which could carry beverages onto the course, refreshments are modestly priced. A sandwich is priced from \$1 to \$3, and a Coke is only \$2!

There are no cheerleaders or light shows at Augusta. There is no music or other forms of entertainment to enhance the experience for the attendees. There is no need. The purity of what some describe as the "perfect game" embraces the audience and seizes its full attention. The only star is the course and the very nature of the game itself. The players are mere

devices which show the grace and skill of the game. They are to be revered, but never placed above the game, its rules or its traditions.

Heaven forbid that anything ever causes the Masters or Augusta National to redirect itself to a more modern sports/business approach. After all, who needs a cell phone at Augusta when it is a time to bask in the glory of springtime in Georgia and a game which is perfection. The best things should never change.

Thought for the day: Tradition is not the worship of ashes, rather it is the preservation of fire.

diately placed on a "hold" status while Azle ISD Police and Azle Police departments investigated and searched all restrooms on school grounds. At 3:48 p.m. the school issued a "HORNET ALERT", notifying parents of the hold on Facebook.

The building was cleared, and the hold was lifted just before 4 p.m.; dismissal from school occurred as usual.

"The call made to Azle PD appears to have been a hoax." the district said in a statement released to parents. "Events of this nature can be very emotional for our students, parents, staff and community. As always. we do our best to share information or updates as quickly as possible, especially regarding safety. It is often hard to stay ahead of what is being shared on social media, especially when it may not be factual. If you did not receive text message notifications this afternoon, please follow up with the

school."

When a school is on a hold, students and staff remain in their classroom or area and the halls are cleared. A complete summary of safety practices, including standard response protocols, can be found at https:// www.azleisd.net/o/aisd/ page/police-department under "Standard Response Protocol (SRP)."

Azle High School experienced a similar scare last May when an anonymous call put students and teachers on lockdown and brought police from throughout the metroplex to Azle. Like the May 5 incident, in which a caller claimed a student had a backpack full of grenades and an AR inside the school, much of the activity by responding police departments was self-initiated. After hearing initial reports from the Azle Police Department, officers from other nearby departments arrived on the scene to offer mutual support. An officer from the Pelican Bay Police Department blocked cars from entering the school.

Springtown Council to decide on rezoning for Main Street martial arts studio

P&Z unanimously recommended approval

SPRINGTOWN -Springtown City Council will have the chance to decide whether to allow a zoning change that would make way for a martial arts studio on North Main Street.

Heather and Bryan Creech discussed the proposed studio on North Main Street at the April 11 Planning and Zoning Commission meeting and requested that the zoning of the property, near the southwest corner of Church Street and Old Cottondale Road, be changed from single

family residential to commercial. The commission ultimately recommended approval of the change to the city council.

Bryan Creech told P&Z members he wants to develop a shopping center (to be called Founder's Plaza) in addition to the martial arts studio (Legends Martial Arts) on North Main Street using surrounding properties that were already zoned for commercial use. The school will be an additional branch from a location in Hurst, which is run by the son of one of the pioneers of American karate, J. Pat Burleson. Creech said

Founder's Plaza will have a fountain in memoriam of Burleson who died a few years ago and lived in Azle.

Heather Creech explained that multiple forms of martial arts will be taught at the school, and kids can begin lessons starting at about age 3. The studio's proposed location is near Springtown Intermediate School, and Creech wants to offer an after-school program as well as promote anti-bullying among the youth.

Legends Martial Arts would also have adult programs, Heather Creech said, like a women's self-defense class.

"I've been doing this a long time (since) I was 4 years old," she said. "I've noticed that over these years when you have people who truly care

about children and adults in the community, when you pour into them love and support and give these kids confidence and you put them around people who strive to have self-esteem, these kids have grown up to do esteemable things."

Bryan Creech said the studio would also bring people to Springtown for tournaments and events as well as work on charity efforts.

"We'll be bringing a lot of people together for a lot of great things other than just breaking boards and 'hi-ya!'ing around the place," he said.

When some P&Z members brought up traffic concerns, City Secretary Christina Derr said it will be up to the Texas Department of Transportation to permit

driveways on Main Street. City officials will also consider traffic concerns once a site plan for the business is submitted and may ask the Creeches to work with TXDOT to extend the left turn lane on Main Street.

"If you guys make a recommendation to council and council approves the zoning change, they're still going to have to come back with a site plan just like any other business. That's where we'll really take a look at traffic and make sure that it's not going to cause a burden either to the school or to the nearby intersection or to the intersection to the north of Cottondale and Church, and how that's configured in kind of a strange way," Derr said. Bryan Creech also said

classes at the martial arts studio wouldn't begin until 4:30 p.m. when traffic has diminished.

P&Z alternate member Kristi Bailey, who has children, said she is excited for the martial arts studio to provide activities for kids in town.

"I love when somebody comes and says they want to bring something to Springtown for little kids," Bailey said to Bryan and Heather Creech.

For the Creeches to move forward with their plan, the city council will need to accept the rezoning, and then the Creeches will need to submit a plat and site plan. The next Springtown City Council meeting is scheduled for April 25.

TAD holds first public elections

For the very first time, Tarrant County voters will have the opportunity to elect directors to three newly created seats in the Tarrant Appraisal District. Tax appraisal districts set the taxable value of homes and businesses across each of Texas' counties. Until now, TAD directors were elected by a number of "taxing entities" like school boards and city councils. Recent legislation has expanded the number of directors serving on boards in counties exceeding 75,000 in population from five to eight members.

Eric Morris, Sayeda Bilgees Syed and Trae Fowler are running for Director-At-Large Place 1. Callie Rigney and Eric B. Crile are running for Director-At-Large Place 2. Chuck Kellev. Matt Brvant and Lee Henderson are running for Director-At-Large Place 3.

Election Day is Saturday, May 4, and early voting runs Monday, April 22 through Tuesday, April 30. The Tri-County Reporter asked the candidates vying for new TAD seats to tell us about themselves and their goals. Check out their responses listed in alphabetical order. I have lived in Colleyville with my wife, Dee, for 25 years. We have a daughter, Hope, who is 22 and attends College in Denton.

In 300 words or less, describe why you are running for Tarrant Appraisal District, and what experience you are bringing to the position.

I'm Chuck Kelley and I am running for Tarrant Appraisal Board in Place 3. I am a 30+ year resident of Tarrant County and 25-year resident of Colleyville. I am seeking to be your representative on the TAD board as I believe I am the most qualified person in the race. I have been involved in Collevville leadership for the past eight years, two years on Planning and Zoning Board and since 2018, as Collevville City Council, Over the last six years, Colleyville has had a laser focus on our city tax rate, lowering it each vear until we now have the lowest tax rate in our region. We were also able to expand services, including funding six School Resource Officers to staff our schools. We did this by running the city like a business, emphasizing spending management and transparency.

I am also an Information Technology consultant / leader with 36 years of experience designing and deploying cutting edge applications for companies like Citigroup, Barclay's, AT&T, NetApp and others. I am the only candidate that has this experience

and can critically look at the security and applications of TAD and make sure we have resolved the cybersecurity and applications issues that have plagued TAD since 2016. There have been major issues that have caused the TAD Website and systems to be down during the appraisal appeals process over the last two years and currently with the brand new website ransomware attack March 21.

In 300 words or less, what goals do you have that you feel will help serve residents in your district.

I have several priorities: 1. Full audit of all IT applications, focusing on security, resilience, replication, transparency and ease of use. We need to reach out to the Top 5 Appraisal Districts in the state to see what systems and security that they have in place.

2. The Appraisal and Appraisal Protest processes need a full transparent review so that it is easily usable for all taxpayers, able to understand how it works, and how to view their appraisals as well as contest their appraisals. My background in IT gives me the ability to define and document processes and translate them into computer systems.

3. 



SPRINGTOWN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, PLACE 7 Longtime SISD board member to face challenger in May 4 election

STAFF REPORTS

SPRINGTOWN — Yet again, voters in Springtown Independent School District are called to the ballot box to make a decision, but this time, it's not about a bond election

Two seats on the district's board of trustees are up for reelection, and one of those races is contested. While Mark Bryant in Place 6 is running unopposed, newcomer Cody Bryant is challenging longtime board member Tootie Hall for Place 7 in next month's election.

The SISD school board hears reports from administration, recognizes the achievements of students and staff and makes various decisions about the district's policies. Crucially, the board also adopts a budget and tax rate for SISD annually and has the authority to call for bond elections.

Election Day is Saturday, May 4, and early voting runs Monday, April 22 through Tuesday, April 30.

RENO — Voting for the May 4 elections hasn't even started, and Reno City Council already has a new member waiting in the wings.

Kevin Vandenberg is running unopposed for Place 1 on the council and is expected to win by default at the polls next month. Current council member Hernando Herrera originally filed to retain his spot in Place 1 but is

no longer listed on the ballot. and started going to city Vandenberg will likely be sworn in and start his service on council after the May elections conclude.

WHO IS KEVIN **VANDENBERG?**

Locals may know Vandenberg from his work on the Reno Planning and Zoning Commission, where he currently serves as chairperson. He joined P&Z in early 2022, months after he moved to Reno in June 2021

Professionally, Vandenberg works as a manager of finance and administration, and he has an advanced education, including an associate degree of applied science in criminal justice - law enforcement, Bachelor of Arts in criminology and criminal justice and a master's in professional accounting.

but not the underlying requirements of giving our students the best possible learning advantages and the social mores to assist them in being an asset to the next generation.

In 300 words or less, what goals do you have that you feel will help

serve Springtown families, students and school district staff?

We have had four failed bond elections that we hoped would alleviate crowding in our schools as enrollment

we as a board were able to lower the tax rate at times, property appraisals continue to climb. Houses sell and our enrollment escalates. Previous service on the School Board from 1982 to 1992 has given me the opportunity to see the vast changes that have occurred in our district. Back then, we had 1,100 students in school and about 900 people in the "city" of Springtown. Today our enrollment tops 4,100 and our newest building is the high school, which houses over 1,100 students and our district encompasses 100 square

miles. Our common areas need some work. Our lunchrooms and libraries need to be enlarged. More restrooms need to be added. One campus has a 600-student enrollment and four restrooms. Some of our campuses have four lunch periods to accommodate their population, starting at 10:30 a.m.

We have to make adjustments to accommodate our current student population. Whether that is putting together yearly bond elections in small amounts to renovate existing buildings or bringing in portables at \$200,000 a pop sans set-up,

electrical, ramps, HVAC and furnishings.

Our band is state ranked. We have a nationally recognized percussion group. Our choir is state ranked. Our FCCLA has national champs. Our FFA has state champs as well as our CTE program welders, artists, culinary representatives.

Our athletes are state ranked, girls and boys.

What could these kids accomplish if they had a little more room?

SPRINGTOWN — The election next month will bring two new faces to the Walnut Creek Special Utility District board of directors.

The current board members whose seats are up for re-election — Vice President Al Garrett and former President Frank Henderson are stepping down from their positions. In their absence on the ballot, four challengers are running for election, but only two of them can win a spot on the board.

Starting as the Water Supply Corporation in 1962, Walnut Creek SUD provides water to customers in the northeastern corner of Parker County as well as parts of Wise County. The district is governed by a group of five board members who make decisions related to infrastructure and district policies. They also review the SUD's budget. Board members have staggered terms, and elections are held every two years.

Election Day is Saturday, May 4, and early voting runs Monday, April 22 through Tuesday, April 30.

We constantly have no water, low water, boil notices and various stages of water restrictions at times of year when that should not be expected like now. We also have frequent incorrect billing due to faulty meters; sometimes by as much as 1,000. The water company continues to agree to service more and more homes when they are unable to adequately serve their current customer base. This is either being done due to moneymaking as a result of conflict of interest, incompetence, or both. I do not have the specific answers because I am not exposed to details unless I get elected, but it is clear that some things must end. That would include accepting any more new home service and correcting the repetitive incorrect billing and faulty meters. I believe that when a government entity has a monopoly — they have a special duty to perform above and beyond, not below, (e) Compensate customers that spend days without water and/or significant expense buying bottled water due to boil notices and undrinkable water.

(f) Establish sufficient water sources to adequately serve the customer base and make staged water restrictions the unusual rather than the norm.

SPRINGTOWN — Two members of the Springtown City Council are facing challengers in the upcoming May election.

Council members in Places 1, 3 and 5 are on the ballot to keep their seats for another two years. The last time these spots were on the ballot — in 2022 — none of the races were contested. This time is different as only Place 1 council member Ted Martinez lacks a challenger. Candidates David Martin for Place 3 and Planning and Zoning Commission member Jessica Castro for Place 5 are running against incumbents Mayor Pro Tem Walter Roberson and Scott Richardson, respectively.

Springtown City Council approves new ordinances and makes decisions on development in the city. Members are also in charge of adopting a city budget every year as well as the tax rate.

Zoning, planning and consideration of variances comprise a large part of city council responsibilities. While living in Dallas, I was part of a neighborhood effort to block the building of a six-story storage facility next to our neighborhood. To show from real-world viewpoints of what this proposed six-story building would look like next to our neighborhood, I created a 3D model of the proposed building in Google Earth. This was shown to our city planner and council member. With the neighbors in alliance, the Dallas City Council unanimously voted to deny a variance that would have allowed the storage building to be built next to our homes.

Having lived in Fort Worth, Austin and Dallas, I am well aware of the issues of large cities. As Springtown continues to grow, as a city council member, I would strive to monitor these concerns and preemptively keep them in check early to prevent them from becoming problems later.

The city council must consider completely each new proposed development. The negotiations with developers need to be conducted with critical assessment and understanding of any special circumstances related to a given property.

Some concessions have been made in the past for developers, waiving in development plans some of the requirements we have codified in our city ordinances (such as subdivision screening, fencing and tree planting requirements). We also outsource a number of professional services in areas such as building inspections and the writing of grant proposals. The council needs periodically to review and assess the quality of these services. Final plats for some subdivisions have been approved by P&Z and city council without adequate grading and drainage as built, leaving the city and/or homeowner to step in to correct deficiencies left over by the developer or homebuilder. I would make it a goal to strive to get this right the first time, and the city should require the developers and engineers to not just say the plans are adequate but to prove they are adequate before building.

As a city council member, I would provide consideration to both new residents and longtime residents. The people of Springtown are friendly, respectful and proud. We are happy to help our fellow neighbors, and we are comfortable to ask for help from our neighbors. The source of the smalltown charm of Springtown is its citizens, and I hope this friendly and helpful nature of the people of this Springtown continues into the future. If elected, I will serve the city of Springtown and its citizens earnestly with honesty, trustworthiness and integrity.

Springtown to explore potential animal control partnership with Sanctuary

Research needed before agreement is reached

SPRINGTOWN — The city of Springtown aims to someday expand its animal shelter and may be open to uniting with other cities to provide services.

Sanctuary Mayor Mark Sommers asked Springtown leaders if they would consider a partnership during Springtown City Council's March 26 meeting. Sommers told the council Sanctuary does not have its own animal control ordinance but can use Parker County's animal control services. Parker County officers occasionally respond to animal calls in Sanctuary, but by the time they arrive, the problem tends to be "alleviated," he said. To have an official agreement with Parker County, Sanctuary would also need to have a deal with the city of Weatherford to use its animal shelter, which Sommers described as expensive.

Knowing Springtown wants to expand its shelter, Sommers said Sanctuary can assist in exchange for services, like picking up animals and responding to calls in under 20-30 minutes.

"We'd like to see if we can set something up, see what your plans are, how much you want us to kick in," he said, adding that Sanctuary's financial contribution would need to be proportional to the number of years the agreement would last.

Springtown City Administrator David Miller sympathized with Sanctuary's plight and seemed open to working with the neighboring town in a long-term agreement.

"Council, if you'll recall, we were in the same boat in 2022 with the changes in the Weatherford contract where it was going to cost us north of \$175,000 a year for animal drop-offs in conjunction with the increase in fees for services from the sheriff's office, which would put us north of \$200,000," Miller said during the meeting. "The decision was made, and I think the right decision, to start our own animal control."

Miller confirmed that city staff is working toward expanding the shelter, and he hopes to present a plan to the council within a few months. He said Springtown has been approached by other entities, though he didn't say which ones, regarding animal control partnerships as well.

"I think this is the ideal time for us to sit down with Sanctuary, look at what their needs are, see if there's something we can do to assist them because we couldn't afford what we were going to be charged and we know they can't afford what they're going to be charged (in an agreement with Weatherford and Parker County), so it might be a unique opportunity to partner up," Miller said.

However, this partnership would require time for research, more resources like another animal control truck for Springtown and maybe additional animal control officers - and coordination of those resources to respond to calls in Sanctuary, Miller said. Springtown would also have to determine a fair amount of money for Sanctuary to contribute to the expanded shelter construction as well as for caring for animals and addressing their medical needs.

Springtown City Secretary Christina Derr clarified to The Tri-County Reporter that an expanded shelter would stay in Springtown, not in

Sanctuary or any other town, and would be staffed and managed by Springtown. There is a possibility that other cities could hire animal control officers to bring stray animals to Springtown's shelter, but this isn't a likely case for Sanctuary, Derr said.

"For Sanctuary, they don't have enough of a need to have their own ACO, so yes, we would use ours in their jurisdiction." she said. "For other agencies that we're looking at partnering with that can af ford to have their own ACOs, we would likely just serve as a housing base for them, and our staff would take care of the animals in custody. But as far as the animal control enforcement or pickup and drop off, they may use their own employees. It could be different for each entity that works with us."

Miller said Sanctuary would also need to develop and pass an animal control ordinance that mirrors Springtown's

ordinance.

"There's a lot of hurdles to get by," Miller said. "It can be done, but it's going to be a process."

Springtown City Council members agreed to let Miller research the possibility of a partnership with Sanctuary.

After the council meeting, Derr stressed that developing an agreement with Sanctuary will not happen immediately. The earliest leaders of the two cities could come up with an arrangement would be in October, and she said even that projection may be too soon. Likewise, expanding the animal shelter will take years.

"It's not going to be tomorrow," she said.

In the meeting, Miller told Sommers and the council that because of the capacity of Springtown's shelter currently, the city won't be able to help Sanctuary right now but may be able to develop a temporary solution.



Azle 4-H adds second hive to Azle Community Garden

AZLE — Two bee or not two bee? That was the question posed by Azle 4-H members during a recent Saturday meeting.

After a full hive inspection by four brave volunteers, the group discovered its presumedly failing old hive had more life than previously thought. The good news presented a challenge though, as the group had already purchased a new queen and three pounds of replacement workers — approximately 10,000 bees.

4-H is America's largest youth development organization. Through a variety of activities and programs it hopes to steer its nearly six million members toward giving back to the community, leading healthy lives and expanding their education and skillsets.

Before 2022, most ag-inclined families didn't know Azle had a 4-H program. Under the guidance of new parent volunteers, the Azle chapter of the organization went from being under threat of dissolution to having nearly 100 youth participants by the end of the 2023 school year. It has only continued growing, including more families and activities since.

One of these new additions is the Azle 4-H bee program. The program began last year and was initially held in a parent volunteer's home. It featured activities like honey tasting and lessons on bee anatomy and biology. Today, with the continued efforts of parents and 4-H youngsters, members can now suit up in bee-keeping duds to learn hands-on apiary skills and tricks of the trade at the two bee hives in Azle's Community Garden. Bees often travel a mile radius around the hive but can go up to five miles, so if you spot a honeybee on Azle's Main Street, there's a good chance it belongs to one of 4-H's hives.

The kids of Azle 4-H have learned lots to get where they are and there are a variety of reasons why Azle kids enjoy the program.

"I like bugs," fifth grader Gabriel Hutsell said, holding out a small handful of pill bugs. "Honestly, I just like being able to interact with the bees and see what's going on in the hive because not a lot of people usually get to have this chance."

Through the program, they've learned invaluable facts and lessons and have gained a newfound respect for nature. For these children, the bee program acts as a gateway to conservation, science and agriculture.

"When I was in second grade a wasp was on me and the wasp didn't try and sting me at all," third grader Camryn Dousay said. "If a bee lands on you, just stay still until someone moves by you and it will go away because that's what happened with the wasp. If you panic the wasp is going to feel unsecure and stuff and sting you."

Parents and 4-H kids met Saturday, April 6, not knowing they'd be adding a new hive to their collection that day. Noticing little growth and activity, worries of an unhealthy hive and queen were substantiated after doing a full check up on the original hive in February. After discussion and voting on the is-

sue, the group decided they'd replace their presumably sick or dying queen with a healthier monarch by merging the existing hive with a new one. When two hives are introduced, the stronger healthier queen may take over and kill the old queen. Worker bees from both hives will then protect the new queen and care for her brood. During the meeting, one parent, Jennifer Dousay, unexpectedly volunteered to donate a new hive and queen for this purpose after learning it was ready for pickup at Texas Bee Supply in Blue Mound. Dousay has two daughters involved in the bee program.

The program's first hive was donated by Danielle Barber and her husband Michael, who have not only been foundational to starting the bee program, but also Azle 4-H as a whole. During the April 6 checkup, 4-H members discovered that the Barber hive had begun to recover, and their queen had laid new brood. Instead of merging the hive, group members and leadership decided to instead establish the

newly donated bees in their own separate bee box.

Nicole Proctor took over the bee program's lead role at a great risk to herself this year. Proctor is severely allergic to bee stings. While other parents and students investigated the hive, Proctor remained a safe distance away, epi-pen at the ready. Proctor goes from coordinating activities and teaching her group about the insects on the weekends to solving crimes and cracking cold cases as a forensic DNA analyst during the week.

"Part of 4-H is teaching kids how to be leaders,' Proctor said. "They not only get to learn these valuable life skills, but they also get to try to turn around and teach other kids. That's confidence inspiring. That's another important life skill. I also really like the structure. For example, my son is homeschooled. If you're talking about being able to get out and socialize with other kids, 4-H activities provide an additional opportunity for that ... It's really important that they learn where their food comes from, how they produce it, how to take care of themselves and how to keep that generational knowledge going."

Another 4-H parent, Eric Baugh, agreed and expanded on how helpful the program had been for his child.

"It helps (Baugh's daughter) get out and she's made several friends from 4-H," Baugh said. "It helps socialize her, fostering everything she enjoys and being able to learn more about it. The 4H kids, they're actually friends. She looks forward to seeing them."

Azle 4-H students have a chance to win cash prizes at state and national 4-H competitions revolving around bee husbandry, knowledge and photography. With the addition of the new Carniolan bees and the recovering health of the group's old Golden Cordovans, Azle 4-H also hopes to reap sweet rewards and begin honey this year. 


Wings Over Cowtown Airshow returns to NAS JRB


