# Four dead after wrong-way wreck on FM 51

**Teacher** survives with serious injuries

 ${\bf SPRINGTOWN-Two~chil-}$ dren and two adults are dead after a crash Sunday, May 26 on Farm-to-Market Road 51.

According to a Texas Department of Public Safety press release, a white Subaru Legacy travelled into the wrong lane on FM 51 south of Friendship Road and hit a black Ford F-150 head-on. The Subaru driver Kathryn

Lain, 29 of Boyd, died as did three passengers in the Ford - two unnamed 9-year-old girls and 66-year-old Gregory Schilb, all from Springtown. The only survivor of the crash was Autumn Reed, 43 of Springtown, who was sent to Harris Methodist Hospital in Fort Worth with a serious

DPS' press release indicates that the reason why Lain's

Subaru drifted into the wrong lane is unknown, and an ongo-

ing investigation is underway. On Springtown Independent School District's Facebook page, Superintendent Shane Strickland confirmed that the two girls who died were fourth graders in the school district, and the surviving woman is a Goshen Creek Elementary

School teacher. "The teacher was care flighted from the scene and is currently in stable condition but faces a long road to recovery," Strickland said in the

statement. Earlier this week, grief counselors were available at Goshen Creek Elementary School for those who need emotional help at this time. A prayer rally was also scheduled at Springtown High

School at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the

auditorium.

"Our hearts ache for the families of those we lost, for our entire district, and for our community as a whole," Strickland said. "We are heartbroken to hear about any life that was lost during this tragedy. Life is so precious and way too short. During this difficult time, we ask that you hold them in your thoughts and prayers."

# Springtown man sentenced to 35 years in prison

WEATHERFORD — A jury in the Parker County 415th District Court convicted a Springtown man on the first-degree felony charge of repeated sexual abuse of an 11-year-old girl.

On May 23, Aniceto Turrubiates Sanchez, 38, was sentenced to 35 years in prison without parole, meaning he will have to serve the entirety of his sentence.

Sanchez was initially arrested in August 2021, after

his wife found him with the victim, who was partially undressed, at their home. According to a press release from the Parker County District Attorney's Office, Sanchez's wife testified that her husband claimed nothing happened between him and the victim, but the victim told her that Sanchez had been sexually abusing

her. Sanchez's wife took the victim to Cook Children's Hospital where she was examined by a sexual assault nurse examiner. The victim reported that Sanchez had molested her between ten and 20 times, which led to his arrest the next day.

"The victim's outcry came in on a Saturday. Within 14 hours, (Children's Advocacy

Center of Parker County) Forensic Interviewer Brittany Lain had interviewed the victim, (Parker County Sheriff's Office Investigator Nathan) Vick had interviewed the suspect, and an arrest was made," Parker County District Attorney Jeff Swain said in the press release. "This shows the dedication of our (Children's Advocacy Center) staff and law enforcement officers, and the importance that they place on protecting our com-

munity's children. They will all work nights and weekends if that's what is needed to keep our kids safe."

According to the press release, Sanchez told the investigator that he denied sexually abusing the victim.

"However, what we pointed out to the jury in closing argument was that his story changed during the interview," Assistant District Attorney Abby Placke said in

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# Reno City Council recognizes outgoing member Hernando Herrera

Herrera welcomes successor Kevin Vandenberg

RENO — The May 15 Reno City Council meeting marked Hernando Herrera's last day on council, and as such, fellow city officials honored him for his five years of service.

"Felt like seven (years)," Herrera said, causing snickers from the people around

Jokes continued to fly while the council recognized Herrera. Mayor Hector Bas Jr. kidded that the plaque he presented to Herrera was for "five years of not doing anything." Council member Jennifer Vogle playfully suggested that Herrera's wife in the audience should also be receiving a plaque, but Mayor Pro Tem Shelli Swift pointed out that she is already being honored by her husband leaving council.

"You're just trying to make sure he makes it out that door without signing anything else," Swift said to Herrera's wife Melissa jokingly.

But amid the humor, heartfelt sentiments were also exchanged. Bas and council members at the meeting — Swift, Vogle and Tod Siedell — told Herrera how much they appreciated him and enjoyed working with him.

"Hernando, thank you for everything," Bas said. "I'm glad to have the opportunity to get to meet you for the last year that you decided to run."

Herrera choked up on his words while expressing what it meant to him to be able to serve Reno. He said he would count his time on city council as one of the greatest honors

of his life in a list that also includes his military service, having kids and grandkids and marrying his wife.

"I just wanted to take the opportunity to convey my gratitude for the honor of having the opportunity to serve Reno," Herrera said during the council meeting. To his fellow council members, he said, "I'm extremely grateful to each and every one of you, for every interaction I've had one way or another."

Herrera has witnessed multiple controversial topics come up in city council meetings, like the lawsuit over the disincorporation petition and discussion of removing members of the Planning and Zoning Commission. He was

also a vocal defender of the one-home-per-acre rule.

In his parting words, Herrera also had some advice for the council members.

"Remember the voices and the conversations you guys have had from the time you first stepped into city hall to now," he said. "Remember the conversations you've had with everybody. Stay true to those conversations and your convictions."

Herrera opted not to run for re-election, and his successor Kevin Vandenberg won his seat in an uncontested race. When it came time for Vandenberg to replace Herrera at the dais, Herrera said, "Mr. Vandenberg, I think you'll do a fantastic job representing the city of Reno.





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

# Walnut Creek SUD awards bids on water plant expansion, distribution system

SPRINGTOWN — Walnut Creek Special Utility District Board of Directors approved bids on two more infrastructure projects included in last year's bond package.

Last fall, the district received just under \$40 million to improve water infrastructure for its customers. Since then, the SUD's board has been putting out projects for

bid and starting construction. and Jay Bird booster pump

On May 20, the board awarded the surface water treatment plant expansion project to Gracon Construction for just under \$4.3 million. Two new filters will be added to the treatment plant, which will give the district an additional 4 million gallons per day treatment capacity. Board members also approved upgrading water lines between the Keeter elevated storage tank

station, and that project was assigned to NAE Contracting for about \$6.5 million. The major water line distribution system project will involve the installation of about 45,000 feet of water line from the Keeter elevated storage tank to the Jay Bird booster pump station.

"That's by far the biggest water distribution system you have," engineer Bill Lohrke said during the

meeting.

SUD general manager James Blackwood said the water line distribution system project turned out to be more expensive than the amount that was originally projected, but the price is still within the overall budget of the bond.

Later during the meeting, Lohrke gave updates on other bond projects. He said the 2-million-gallon ground storage tank at the water treat-

ment plant, the 1-milliongallon ground storage tank at the Farm-to-Market Road 920 booster pump station, the 500,000-gallon ground storage tank on FM 51, the FM 51 booster pump station and the FM 920 booster pump station were all under construction. This summer, the district is expected to seek bids on building an elevated water storage tank, adding eight- and 10-inch water lines to the Three Skillet area west

of Springtown and installing a 12-inch water line on FM 2257 from Jay Bird Lane to FM 730. A project to connect the elevated storage tank on FM 51 with the new booster pump station is also expected to get done this summer.

Lohrke said all bond projects are supposed to be under construction this year, and most will be completed by early next year.

One mainstay and instrumental force in the Azle High School science department is Pamela Jungman. Jungman has been an educator for 42 years, 34 of which were at Azle ISD. Formerly a chemistry teacher, Jungman then became a science instructional coach for the district. Director of Federal Programs and Research Jordan Thiem spoke about his experiences with Jungman and the legacy she will leaves for many AHS teachers.

"The first year that I actually came here to Azle, I came into the science department and Dr. J was a mama bear for the science department," Thiem said. "She took me under her wing and made sure I was taken care of. She's done

that for countless educators. Then I got to meet her as a department head and got to see what she was doing. Not only was she teaching students, but the students that she taught gained a love for science and they became teachers at Azle ISD, and she actually was a leader for them as well. Then as we started our instructional coach program Dr. I actually took that and she became our first secondary science coach where she just continued to do what she did. She grew teachers, she loved on kids, and she made sure everybody was responsible in what they were doing. She not only took science under its wing but now she was actually an integral part of the new science wing that is there at the high school she helped design it. She kept programming together and she made sure that every single one of those teachers had exactly what they need to be successful. I think that's what Dr. J's done her entire life. Those that have been around her have been affected by her. She's given a love for science, and she continues to do that now."

Dee Suratt is another longtime Azle teacher retiring this year. She has worked in education for 27 years, all of which were at Azle ISD. Surratt currently works at Silver Creek Elementary, where Principal Aubri Deheck said she has taken on many roles throughout the years.

"She has worn several hats during her time in Azle," Deheck said. "Some of those hats include 'bus bouncer Dee' where she had to pull kids off of each other during a fight; 'kid chaser Dee' where she once had to literally go in the woods behind the high school to locate some missing students; 'snake wrangler Dee' where she had to get a rattlesnake off the recess grounds because the kindergarteners were out there during recess; 'doctor Dee' where she has stopped the bleeding on a child's cut-open head, and she has successfully given the Heimlich maneuver two times; 'lunch helper Dee' where she's paid for countless numbers of students' outstanding lunch balances; 'G' where she serves as the actual grandma of two of her aren't her own who she loves

as 'Mary Poppins Dee' where she has the best everything drawer in all of 76020 - ifyou need it she's got it. I think the best hat she's worn this year is 'game warden Dee.' One morning a deer was struck in front of our school in front of (Farm-to-Market Road) 730 (South) right before school was starting and the entrance to our school was actually closed off by the deer so Dee went out and literally moved the deer into the ditch so that our families could enter the school. Other than one leg coming off of the deer during the move, she did successfully get the deer out of the way so that the families and children didn't have to see this deer and could enter the building and drop their kids off. There are not enough hooks in the world to hold all the hats that Dee has worn during her time in Azle. We appreciate you so much, we will miss you, thank you for all you've done."

Along with farewells, campuses and the district also recognized Teachers of the Year. Each campus' Teacher of the Year received a \$500 check from the Azle **Education Foundation and** the primary and secondary district Teachers of the Year received an additional \$1,000 and will represent Azle at a future Education Service Center Region 11 conference.

Joanna Reasoner was named district's primary Teacher of the Year. Reasoner is an Azle graduate who has taught for 16 years at Eagle Heights Elementary. She was thanked by Eagle Heights **Elementary Principal Shelly** Newton who stood by her side while Reasoner accepted her award and check. Newton recalled a fun fact that further exemplified the teacher's connection to the district and her principal, saying Reasoner was one of Newton's fourth grade students at Silver Creek Elementary and Reasoner's grandmother was Newton's

first-grade teacher. Amy Hinkle was named the district's Teacher of the Year. This is her seventh year teaching at Forte Junior High School. Forte Principal William Manley stood alongside Hinkle and spoke about her contributions to the school as an eighth grade U.S. history teacher.

"What's unique about Ms. Hinkle is that she is a very nontraditional teacher," Manley said. "If you go in there, you're going to see all the things that we want to see in 2024 in a classroom, she's doing it with her kids. She's pushing out learning onto them, a lot of collaboration, she's facilitating their excellence. She's also a lifelong learner. She has applied for grants where she gets a (American Revolutionary War) traveling trunk that comes to her classroom every year. You'll often see her dressed up as some historical figure when she's teaching and this year, she's going to two trainings that she's been accepted to travel out of state to further her education as part of U.S. history."

# Azle man killed after striking 18-wheeler near Paradise

PARADISE — According to reports from the Wise County Messenger's Austin Jackson and the Texas Department of Public Safety, a fatal crash happened at an intersection near Paradise, on the afternoon of May 21.

Mandy Hays, Wise County Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace, pronounced 70-yearold Azle resident William Wyatt dead on the scene. A 2005 Freightliner, driven by Nathan Eduardo Gomez of Venus, collided with Wyatt's 1999 Pontiac Bonneville af-

ter he attempted to turn left onto Texas 114 from Farmto-Market Road 51.

DPS's preliminary investigation concluded that Wyatt had failed to yield the rightof-way just before the crash. Gomez was not injured in the wreck. Paradise firefighters


from Wise County Emergency Services District 3 and medics from Wise County Emergency Medical Services were among the first responders to work the wreck. This portion of Texas 114 was shut down for roughly three hours following the incident.

According to the Texas Department of Transportation's Crash Records Information System, 918 people were killed in the state in crashes where at least one party failed yield the right-of-way last year. Failure to yield is one of the leading

causes of roadway fatalities each year. These kinds of crashes result in death in rural areas like this stretch of TX 114 at rates higher than any other singular cause.



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# Adult & Teen Challenge hosts "Shine Like Stars" banquet

AZLE — The Adult & Teen Challenge of Texas Azle Men's Center hosted its annual gala and auction Thursday, May 16. At the event, representatives from the organization spoke about its reach and impact, introducing testimonials from those who had benefitted from the

program. The Adult & Teen Challenge is a nonprofit addiction rehabilitation center and Christian discipleship. Along with a men's campus in Azle, the organization also has several other men's and women's campuses throughout the state and several sites dedicated to at-risk youths.

Dr. George Thomas, who has served as president of Adult & Teen Challenge in

Texas for the last 15 years, spoke at the gala and reported that the organization had admitted 551 adults and juveniles across its 13 campuses in 2023. It has admitted more than 170 people in the first four months of 2024.

In 2019, Evangel University's Center for Compassion partnered with the nonprofit to release a study on the recidivism of

Abraham Muzquiz, a student of the Adult & Teen Challenge program who also organized much of the event, spoke alongside his sponsor Johnny Adams. "When I first got into this program, I felt unwanted and just alone," Muzquiz said. "The enemy had separated me and my family, and it made me in a dark place. The second day I was in the program I realized what I had done. (Adams) helps me out a lot. The little things that he does as a sponsor like bringing me candy, coming to church, it's a lot — it motivates me to be in the program. It motivates me to get better. This program is awesome but the people that God puts us with in this program is a blessing. It's one of the things I'm grateful for to get better." From left, Ambrosen, Muzquiz and Adams.



away his family with heavy substance abuse and theft. Crawford eventually found the help and change he needed in Azle's Adult & Teen Challenge to overcome his addiction and reunite with his family. "When I showed up to Teen Challenge, I lied to whoever was in intake about my drug use," Crawford said. "I was high the day I showed up. I remember they fed me goulash and I was going to try to extend the way I felt a little longer, but the goulash made me go to sleep. When I woke up, I realized all those feelings I had been suppressing through drugs and alcohol. It hit me like a brick. I chose Teen Challenge because it's so far away from home. I couldn't run back home." Crawford is pictured with his wife and daughter, and has another child on the way.

the program's students. The study showed that 78% of graduates from Adult & Teen Challenge centers remained sober and substance-free up to two years after graduation.

"Addiction, at least in our definition, is a worship disorder," Thomas said. "We become addicted to what we worship and if we worship our way into a mess we have to worship our way out of it. In the Old Testament it took God one day to free the Israelites out of Egypt, but it took more than 40 years to get Egypt out of each one of them, so it takes time. Our students spend a minimum of a year taking off their old ways and habits and putting on new ones and learning how to acclimate to living a life led by Christ and that happens with good staff and good older brothers around you over the course of time."

According to the Center for Disease Control and the National Center for Health Statistics, 13% of individuals age 12 and over in the U.S. have used an illicit drug in the past 30 days.

"If you do the math, it's millions of people," Thomas said referencing these figures. "This translates to around 71,000 drug overdose deaths a year. Adults who have had at least one heavy drinking day in the last year is at 25% of the population and the related deaths to that numb the pain. With college is hundreds of thousands."

Over the last 15 years, the program graduated 1,700 students, Thomas said. Azle Men's Director Greg Ambroson addressed the crowd as well, and Dr. Marti Williams, co-interim senior pastor at Bethesda Community Church, led the ceremony's invocation.

"I truly have the most amazing job," Ambroson said choking back years. "It's not work. When you see what God can do in the life of another human being and to be a part of it is more than I can even explain."

The rest of the gala largely consisted of musical performances from a live band and a choir composed of the campus' students as well as testimonials from graduates of the program. Steve Burgin, Abraham Muzquiz, Quincy McClean and Zack Crawford all spoke about the impact the Azle campus has had on their lives and recovery from substance abuse.

Growing up, McClean was highly involved in church, since his mother is a pastor. After his father left at a young age, McClean was exposed to drugs by an uncle who was also at the church.

"I would wake up inside of a car, doors locked, scared for my life, not knowing where I was and meanwhile, he's inside a drug house getting his dope," McClean said of a childhood experience where he was kidnapped for days at a time. "I was alone, and I needed to take care of myself."

McClean started to use drugs at age 12 as a form of escapism and later found that playing football helped recruiters scouting him in high school, McClean was unable to pursue higher education when he had his first child at 17. He would have two more at 18 and ultimately dropped out of school, leading him to spiral into more frequent drug use.

"I was seeking out attention

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in drug dealers," McClean said. "I was seeking out attention in people that had money. That led to distributing and letting my family down."

Wanting to do better for his kids, McClean checked into the Azle branch of the Adult & Teen Challenge in April

"I needed a fresh start," McClean said. "I started to see myself change as soon as I got there on campus because I came in knowing what I needed to do. The process of Adult Teen & Challenge – it taught me sometimes you have to sit still. I didn't know how to love. I didn't know how to love myself, my kids or my family."

Turning his life around while in the program, McClean said now his kids are proud of him and he is grateful for another chance at life. During the ceremony, McClean was presented with a certificate of completion and announced he is looking to pursue a career in law enforcement.

Some of McClean's most motivational realizations came while discussing his problems with fellow students and Adult & Teen Challenge staff between jobs in the organization's work

"There's just something that happens in those kinds of conversations that just can't happen inside an office behind a desk "Cody Ionlin program coordinator at Adult & Teen Challenge of Texas, Azle Men's Center said.

The program's vocational work experience program puts students and staff to work in landscaping, construction, cleaning, maintenance and more.

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
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
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### John Robertson Jr. 1961-2024

the press release. "Originally, he said he came home and went to sleep. Then he said he came home and watched T.V. then fell asleep. Later, he said he was watching T.V. with the victim then fell asleep. Finally, he said he was cuddling with the victim, watching T.V., then went to sleep. We felt his hiding important details was in-

dicative of his consciousness of guilt. Eventually, he admitted that he made a mistake, but he would never actually come out and admit what he had done."

It took jurors almost an hour to decide on a guilty verdict, according to the press release.

When deciding punishment, Assistant District Attorney Al Charanza asked iurors for a lengthy sentence. according to the press release, because the victim will likely carry the trauma of being sexually assaulted for the rest of her life.

"Despite the fact that this was a strong case, our victim had to take the witness stand and tell our jury how the defendant repeatedly molested her," Swain said in the press release. "She was proud to have stood up for herself, and we were very proud of her. This jury's decision demonstrates yet

again the firm stand that Parker County has long taken against pedophiles who would prey on our children."

According to Parker County Sheriff's Office public information officer Danie Huffman, Sanchez has declined an interview with The Tri-County Reporter and did not release a statement. The Tri-County Reporter reached out to Sanchez's lawyer for comment on Friday but hasn't received a response yet.


"We've got more kids with all the new housing developments," Brockway said. "It's nice to put a bike safety thing out there. Felicia did a bangup job with this.'



# A look into the past

### Former Azle and Springtown coach Eddie Weger shares his story

SPRINGTOWN — Eddie Weger is an 81-year-old Springtown resident who has lived in the Parker County area with his wife since 1973. He coached at Azle Junior High School, Azle High School, Springtown Junior High School and Springtown High School in the 1970s and early 1980s. Weger is originally from

Denison. He played college football for two years at Coffeyville Junior College and two years at Southeastern State Teacher's College in Durant, Oklahoma where he met his wife. At CJC, he won the Merle Brown Memorial Sportsmanship trophy in

He began his coaching and teaching career in Weleetka, Oklahoma in 1970 where he coached all sports and taught social studies. According to Weger, the town was considered a poverty area, where the population of the school was predominantly Native American and African American. The school was so small, the seventh, eighth, and ninth graders had to combine to have enough players to form teams. In his first year as coach, the basketball team went undefeated.

Weger moved to Azle in 1973 when one of his college football teammates,

Dick Lowry accepted the head coaching job at AHS and invited him to coach there. He started out at AJHS and coached seventh grade sports. Weger remains friends with one of his former junior high student athletes David Jett.

The next year he coached at AHS as an assistant football coach and baseball coach. Weger shared that he and head baseball coach at the time, Mike Harden, laid out the original AHS baseball field.

Weger coached at Brewer High School for one year during the 1975-1976 school year before coaching in Springtown.

He coached at SJHS from 1976-1978 and at SHS from 1978 until he retired from coaching in 1981. During the 1980-1981 school year, the ninth-grade freshman football team went undefeated Weger coached defensive

backs under freshman head coach Ernie Montgomery.

Weger admits what he enjoyed most about coaching was winning, but says he genuinely loved sports. He shared about how he would actively be involved in game play during practice — he would run the football with the kids, punt, show them how to block and catch.

Weger said one of his biggest challenges was in his last year of coaching, when

he only had 15 kids on the junior varsity football team and the head coach moved three kids to the varsity team. As a result, he had to coach 11-man football with only 12 kids, and they only won one game that entire season. Surprisingly, the season was not a failure because, Weger said, the kids told him it was the first game they had ever won a game since they started playing pee wee football.

"I said, 'We've got a winner," Weger said. "They were tickled to death because they've never won a ball

game."

Weger notes that one of the biggest differences in coaching then versus now is the quality of equipment has improved. Although they did have weights, he said he would get empty gallon food cans from the cafeteria ladies and he and the athletes would build makeshift weights with them by filling the cans with cement and attaching them to polyvinyl chloride pipe. He noted the experience of the kids building their own weights was a fun learning process for

them.

He would also get the kids to run with tires tied around their waists. He shared a humorous story about how sometimes the kids would get caught by a telephone pole they had to run around

— he would emphasize to the kids that they needed to run widely around the pole but unfortunately it did not al-

ways work out.

"Every once in a while, you'd look up and one of them would cut it a little short, the tire would wrap around that pole and it would

flip them backwards," Weger

According to Weger, coaches have it more challenging now because of the societal expectations that are no longer on children the way they once were when kids were expected to be more respectful than they are now.

Weger's wife, Diane Weger, taught at AHS for 33 years as a French, English and ESL teacher from 1973-2006. They celebrated their 57th wedding anniversary Memorial Day.
