

Woman killed, man arrested after FM 730 S. wreck

AZLE — An Azle woman was killed and a Weatherford man was arrested after a major accident near the 7000 block of Farm-to-Market Road 730 South Sunday afternoon.

At around 1:50 p.m. Dec. 8, Parker County Hospital District Emergency Medical Services, Fire Battalion 101, Engine 54, Rescue 34 and others responded to a major two-vehicle crash where three people were seriously injured. Police scanner chatter reported "possible entrapment and ejection" from ve-

hicles. An affidavit revealed that firefighters had to extract the driver and rear passenger, who had been thrown into the front seat.

Azle resident Cora May Estep, age 71, was pronounced dead at John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth just before 4 p.m. according to the Tarrant County Medical Examiner's office. Two other women, ages 69 and 45, were transported to Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital with serious injuries.

First responders blocked traffic on the road for much of the afternoon as the situa-

tion was being contained. An air medical evacuation was not possible due to inclement weather.

According to information obtained from the Texas Department of Public Safety, Daniel Eduardo Sainz Rascon, 21, of Weatherford, was arrested by DPS troopers following the accident and faces two counts of intoxication assault with a vehicle with serious bodily injury and one count of intoxication manslaughter with a vehicle. According to a preliminary DPS investigation, Rascon's vehicle, a 2022 Ford F150, was traveling southbound on FM 730

passing in a no-passing zone, while in a curve. The other vehicle, a 2024 Buick Envoy, was traveling northbound. Rascon struck the Buick head-on.

In a written affidavit, the arresting officer noted seeing white powder residue on Rascon's left nostril and beer bottles strewn throughout the vehicle. The officer described Rascon's clothes as being in a state of disarray and the crotch area of his jeans seemed to be wet. Rascon advised that the accident occurred after the other vehicle entered his lane and that the beer must have been left behind by his cousin,

but officers determined some bottles were cold to the touch. Officers subjected Rascon to a field sobriety test, requested a blood sample and placed him under arrest. Rascon appeared to be nervous and all he could think and speak about was having insurance on his vehicle, the officer said.

Rascon has since been booked into the Parker County Jail, where he is held on \$100,00 bond for the manslaughter charge and \$25,000 for each count of assault for a total of \$150,000. This is an ongoing DPS investigation. Jail records also indicate that

last and Texas everything in between.

This is why it pains me so much to criticize most anything to do with Texas, but sometimes situations call for comment. The relationship between Texans, their cars, and the state, has got to change. Mind you there are more than 22 million registered vehicles in Texas and more than 19 million registered drivers. No question this is a lot to keep track of, monitor and regulate. At the same time, the situation has become almost laughable.

This past week a fellow I work with needed to renew his driver's license. He was advised he needed an appointment to renew, so he called the local bureau and was advised he would need an appointment. He told the bureaucrat that would be fine but was shocked to learn the next date available was some six or seven weeks hence. He was told he needed to bring a copy of his birth certificate in order to renew. It can only be assumed the birth certificate is to establish that the person getting the license is

in fact, who they say they are. have the check made out and Between illegal immigrants and the threat of terrorists, proof of who you are seems like a reasonable request, so my friend started digging through his legal papers to find a copy of the document which proves who he is. Unfortunately, he could not find his copy, so he had to go to the state and request a duplicate copy of his certificate. When he called the state, they wanted to see his driver's license to establish that he is the same person as the person on the birth certificate. So, the birth certificate establishes the ability to get a driver's license, as long as you have a driver's license to get a birth certificate? Does that sound like one big bureaucratic circle or what?

My car and my wife's car both need to be registered in the month of December. I ready, but I am required by law to have my car inspected before it can be registered. New legislation mandates that effective in January, inspections are no longer required to register a vehicle.

To fulfill my legal obligation, I spent half a day Saturday driving from one place to another, trying to find someone to inspect my car. The first four places told me that they no longer had somebody approved to do inspections since the inspection requirement ends in 30 days. When I attempted again Monday, I was told the state computer system was down and nobody in the state had access to submit inspection results, so I would have to come back to have the inspection done

Millions of cars, millions of people and the state collects

millions of dollars in taxes from our vehicles. At the minimum, shouldn't the state have a system that is convenient, fast and efficient for the taxpaver? The role of government should be to serve the people, not for the people to have to spend time, effort and money to pay the taxes due and satisfy the requirements set forth by law.

Sometimes I think politicians work at creating new programs when they should be looking at the programs in place and fix how inefficient and ineffective they are. Now there is a way to win some

Routes old and new

The song has been a staple in Christian hymnals for more than a century, underscoring deeply held beliefs. "The Way of the Cross Leads Home" — written in 1906 might be in the running for Christians' national anthem if it ever came to a vote.

Until here lately, the "way" to Branson, Missouri has not been quite so clear. Though highway routes to this Christian entertainment mecca are many — some of them picturesque — they can easily eat up the better part of a day for Texans driving there.

Eureka! Southern Airways Express now offers twicedaily flights from Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport to Harrison, Arkansas, just a half-hour from Branson. Round-trip airfare is around \$150, parking is free and the two-hour flight a few thousand feet aloft provides welcome "look-sees" at the colorful foliage below. (The aircraft has eight seats, with some safety requirements that may be unfamiliar, such as use of scales to determine weight of both passengers and luggage. Rent a car, use an Uber app or lean on a friend for pickup in Harrison and the short final "leg" to Branson. Remember to pack light and arrive early for check-in.) ...

En route to this one-of-akind entertainment center that emphasizes God and country, one sees an exit for College of the Ozarks in Point Lookout, Missouri. It's a stop worth taking, a scant halfdozen miles from Branson, this college of some 1,500 students. The Lord is honored and patriotism is the hallmark of the appropriately nicknamed "Hard Work University."

Students earn their way to four-year degrees by working at numerous campus sites. They graduate free of debt, unlike many college graduates who face heavy payback commitments for several

Named C of O president in 2022, Dr. Brad Johnson envisioned an additional symbol to enhance the institution's spiritual and patriotic values. It already had The Missouri Vietnam Veterans Memorial. Now, the giant cross erected last year reminds students and visitors of Christ upon entering or leaving the campus. Artist/designer Max Greiner Jr. was commissioned for the project — The Empty $Cross^{TM}$ — made of steel — is 40 feet tall and weighs 28,000

I have written about Branson many times, but somehow was never previously present for the muchheralded "Christmas in Branson." Though "late to the party," I recently was "wowed' by a community emblazoned by lights and Christmas décor, and a bevy of shows "glitzed up" with festive costumes, Christmas music and creative dancers. (The season starts in November and runs through the first week of January.)

During a whirlwind 46-hour visit, I attended seven shows, including the Sight and Sound Theater's "Miracle of Christmas." This is Branson's "crown jewel" where all

2,200 seats often are taken for productions that dazzle with Broadway quality and are always Christ-centered. "David" opens March 8, 2025.

Other shows included The Duttons, The Hughes Brothers, Pierce Arrow (featuring a world-class baritone and a Guinness Book of Records holder for the lowest bass voice), Doug Gabriel, A Tribute to ABBA and "Hot Rods and High Heels." They, too, sparkled ..

Branson is a "family place" on both sides of the flood lights. Central to its "warp and woof" are shows dominated by multiple family members, including three generations of Duttons and their across-the-street neighbors, the Hughes Brothers. They even "borrow" each other's grandbabies for manger scenes. This year, the Hughes Brothers' family has two of their four infants "on loan" to the Duttons! The Clay Coopers have to be proud of son Colton, star of the "Hot Rods" show, a high energy production featuring 1950s

Doug Gabriel has been "at it" for decades, playing a stringed instrument his dad made from a car muffler. He calls it a "muff-tar."

This account barely touches the garment's hem of Branson. Experiencing it coupled with a visit to C of O — never grows old, at Christmas and throughout the year ...

City of Azle casts votes for appraisal district directors

AZLE — Ahead of a Dec. 13 deadline, the Azle City Council voted for Sayeda Bilgees Syed for Tarrant County Appraisal District's board of directors and split its allotted votes between Sterling Naron and Jerry **Durant for Parker County** Appraisal District. As a taxing unit in both counties, the city of Azle can cast seven votes to select a director for Tarrant County's tax board and 35 votes in Parker

Each taxing unit is allocated a certain number of votes per Texas Tax Code Section 6.03 using a calculation based on the amount of property taxes

The appraisal districts determine property values for

the purpose of calculating ad valorem property taxes. It is headed by an eight-member board of directors who resolve disputes, appoint appraisers, set the budget and ensure other critical duties are carried out for the county. Five of these board members

are appointed by taxing units, County's taxing units. which includes cities, school districts, colleges and like entities, while another three were elected in May.

The council selected Syed because of a visit she made to the city in October in an effort to visit each of Tarrant Councilmembers discussed selecting Naron based on his unique experience as a city administrator in Hudson Oaks and selected Durant based on their familiarity with his local car dealership.

Old-Fashioned Christmas grows while keeping small-town spirit

For the last 30 years, Springtownians have gathered at the town Square, under its crown jewel, the Tabernacle, every second Saturday in December to celebrate the Christmas season as a community. This year, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m Saturday, Dec. 14., this timeless event is bigger and better than ever before.

For 25 years, this event was known as Christmas on the Square, and it continues to be hosted by the City of Springtown to blend Yuletide and community spirit as a gift to the community. In 2019, the city's newly formed events committee, following direction from the City Council, worked to vastly expand and improve the event. That year, the event was renamed Old-Fashioned Christmas, to highlight the community's traditional small-town values and establish a warm and charming atmosphere in which families and friends could celebrate

the Christmas season in a variety of ways.

The second Saturday in December each year is the annual festival which now includes even more vendors, children's activities, Christmas-themed contests and much more.

Organizers are very excited to bring back the ice-skating feature for the second year. Based on last years' experience, Old-Fashioned Christmas does not require appointments this year. The children's area will include ice skating, a 16-foot double slide, an alpine inflatable slide, a gingerbread bounce house specifically for younger children (toddlers), a petting zoo, coloring contest, cookie giveaway, arts and crafts, face-painting and alpaca petting. The event anticipates having nearly 100 vendors for last-minute Christmas shopping opportunities. Plus, a new feature will be available from the night of the parade daily until the new year — the gazebo at Optimist Park will be decorated and free to use as a backdrop for family Christmas photos.

in 1994 and remains a family



Films are a popular component that help to make the holiday season so special.





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


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

People are passionate about the things they love. Through the years there have been many debates over a wide range of topics, from which cola brand to back to which book/movie character was more deserving of a lead character's heart.

The holiday season features a classic example of taking sides. The debate surrounding artificial Christmas trees and their natural alternatives will pick back up this holiday season. As with any debate, there are two sides to every story. Those on the fence as to whether to go real or fake this year can consider these pros and cons of each.

REAL TREE

Pros: One of the biggest advantages of a real tree is its pleasing aroma. The fresh pine smell of a natural tree can trigger memories of Christmases gone by and make a home feel cozy and holiday-ready. It takes many years for a Christmas tree to grow large enough to be harvested, and as it grows it provides a habitat for animals and benefits the planet by absorbing carbon and providing oxygen, according to Megan Quinn, coordinator of conservation biology at the Nature Conservancy of Canada.

When trees are cut down, two or three may be planted in their place. Buying a real tree from a business nearby also supports the local economy.

Cons: Real trees can be messy and require upkeep like daily watering. Cutting down a tree oneself and bringing it home can help guarantee freshness, but there is really no way to know when trees at Christmas tree lots were cut down. This means that needles can begin falling the moment the tree is placed in the living room. Another thing to note is that live trees can't be placed just anywhere. They shouldn't be next to fireplaces or heat

sources, where they can dry out prematurely and pose a fire risk. A real tree also might have unwelcome bugs or animals hiding within its branches. According to Penn State Extension, anything from spotted lanternflies to spiders to aphids to bark beetles or lice may be on a real tree.

ARTIFICIAL TREE

Pros: Artificial trees can be convenient because they are easy to assemble, disassemble and store. Plus, you don't have to venture out each year to get one. Unlike real trees, artificial trees do not require watering or vacuuming to manage fallen needles. Since

artificial trees can be reused for numerous seasons, they may be more cost-effective than real trees. Artificial trees can last anywhere from six to 10 years, but that life span depends on the quality of the tree and how well it is maintained. Artificial trees also guarantee a uniform, pleasing look year after year.

Cons: Artificial trees are made from polyvinyl chloride and other plastics, and environmentalists attest that those ingredients make them bad for the environment. According to an assessment study of artificial versus natural trees published in 2009 by Ellipsos, a Montreal-based

sustainable development consulting firm, an artificial tree emits 8.1 kilograms of carbon dioxide per year, compared to 3.1 kilograms of carbon dioxide emitted by a real tree in a given year. In addition, the chemicals used in manufacture may have adverse effects on human health and often are non-recyclable. Artificial trees also take up room in homes yearround since they need to be stored. Plus, they don't emit a pleasing aroma.

The debate over a real or artificial Christmas tree is sure to rage on year after year, so it's up to holiday celebrants to make their pick.

How some popular holiday traditions got their start

Will you be baking gingerbread or hanging stockings by the fireplace this holiday season? Perhaps you'll be lighting the menorah or playing a game of dreidl? The holidays are steeped in tradition, some of which are older than celebrants may realize.

Individuals gather during the holidays and participate in various traditions that have withstood the test of time. Most people engage in these traditions or recognize symbols automatically, but it can be interesting to learn how these traditions came to be.

CHRISTMAS CAROLING

The British traditions of wassailing and mumming and the Slavic tradition of koliada were some of the precursors to more modern caroling. People would go door-to-door and recite poetry or sing with the hope of bringing about good fortune or influencing a future harvest, according to Rutgers University. Carolers spread hope and good tidings through song during a time of year when sunlight was limited.

CHRISTMAS TREES

Pagans once displayed evergreen branches as a reminder that spring would come again, while Romans placed them around temples to honor Saturn, the god of agriculture. Eventually the evergreen was used in conjunction with Christian Christmas celebrations. In the sixteenth century, German Christians put trees inside their homes as symbols of everlasting life.

SANTA CLAUS

Children who celebrate Christmas eagerly await the arrival of a jolly sort who goes by the name of Santa Claus. His origin story stretches back to the third century, when Saint Nicholas became the patron saint of children. Saint Nicholas was a monk in what is modern-day Turkey. It is said that he traveled helping the poor and the sick. History.com says he is believed to have saved three impoverished sisters from slavery by providing them with a dowry so they could be married, and he also provided gifts to children.

MENORAH

The menorah is a multi-

branched candelabra used in Jewish religious rituals. The menorah is first mentioned in the book of Exodus when the design of the lamp was revealed to Moses by God on Mount Sinai. Many menorahs are seven-branched, but during Chanukah, an eightbranched menorah is used. The Chanukah menorah is modeled after the Tabernacle menorah that corresponds to the eight-day festival. It was used to celebrate the rededication of the Second Temple. The available oil supply was supposed to light the menorah for just one day, but the candles actually burned for eight.

MISTLETOE

Kissing under the mistletoe is a holiday season tradition that can lead to some red faces when couples are caught beneath the plant. Norse mythology paved the way for kissing under the mistletoe. Legend has it the gods used mistletoe to resurrect Odin's son, Baldur, from the dead. Baldur's mother, Frigg, the goddess of love, made the plant a symbol of love and vowed to kiss anyone who passed under it. Mistletoe

YULE LOG

Yule logs were once part of winter solstice celebrations to bring good luck and fortune, but America is where a

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

TikTok blocked

AZLE — There was virtually no discussion surrounding the unanimous decision of Azle City Council to block TikTok on city-owned devices, Nov. 19. Amid national security worries, the Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 1893 prohibiting the use of TikTok and certain other

social media applications and services on governmental devices last year. The bill required cities to adopt a policy themselves prohibiting the installation of TikTok or another covered application on any device owned or leased by the municipality by Nov. 20. In conforming with the policy, the city has since updated its technology policy to include language

outlined in Resolution No. 2024-19 banning TikTok and any successor application or service developed or provided by ByteDance Limited. An employee found to have violated this policy may be subject to disciplinary action, including, without limitation, termination of employment.

LW Council addresses budget concerns, approves fire station parking lot

LAKE WORTH — On Nov. 19. the Lake Worth City Council addressed budget concerns related to the decline of the sales tax revenue. Lake Worth Finance Director Debbie Whitley addressed the council.

"Given the recent declines we've seen in our revenues, I just wanted to give council an early projection before March audits are presented," Whitley said. "We do believe we have recorded all material transactions for the last fiscal year and given that, of the major funds, the general fund budgeted for a deficit of just over \$3,000 and I now anticipate a surplus of over \$300,000."

Whitley went over a spreadsheet that showed the projected funds and explained to council that all major funds performed better fiscally than they were budgeted for. That information appeared to ease the council's concerns about not meeting the budget for the next fiscal year.

Next, Lake Worth Fire Chief Ryan Arthur proposed a motion to approve an additional parking lot to be added to the new fire station which will be located at 6620 Charbonneau St., which used to be a residential spot that the city purchased.


"This will be a public visi-

tor parking area for people coming to visit the fire station," Arthur said. "Doing this also increased our space where we have employee parking that's going to be secured behind and gate. This includes the price that you see, to not to exceed total cost to complete this additional project in conjunction with the new fire station shall not exceed \$235,000." Three streetlights will also be added to the expansion. One council member asked if the expansion will add more room for the firetrucks and Chief Arthur answered that it will.

The city council approved the motion unanimously.





"The events are an opportunity for our neighbors and friends to gather on our Square and get to know those in their community while enjoying a family friendly, entertaining event," Derr said.




