Planning Board Discusses The Father's Heart **Project**

When the Vestal Planning Board met Tuesday Planning Board Chairwoman Madeleine Cotts and Planning Board members: Michon Stuart, Dan Hayes and Bob Warner discussed with Pastor David Campbell Jr. and P. E. Melissa Secord plans regarding "The Father's Heart" proposed parking lot project.

Pastor Campbell noted that The Father's Heart Town of Vestal location is at 117 Powderhouse Road. He explained that he and Melissa were there to answer any questions the Planning Board may have regarding the proposed parking site plan project for The Father's Heart parking lot, he had submitted.

He added, "The site plan proposes the following additional parking. We are considering the addition of adding twenty-eight additional parking spaces to our current existing asphalt parking

lot. Currently, there is an existing tree line surrounding the parking lot. This acts as a buffer for two adjacent neighboring properties. No additional lighting is being planned at this time because the church building is currently being used only during daylight hours. The number of total parking spaces will still be within Town of Vestal Code parking site requirements."

Pastor Campbell explained, "Our congregation presently has between 150 and 170 members. We are anticipating and looking forward to future growth. At this time, we will only be using the brick building at the site. Our purpose for this proposal is to keep our members safe by not having overflow parking on Powderhouse

He pointed out, "The impact to the septic system has been taken into consideration, along with the impact our project would have on the surrounding neighbors. We had been informed notification of the surrounding neighbors was not needed, because that is not a Planning Board requirement for this project. However, we did have our parking lot project announcement posted to the Town of Vestal Website, along with the complete information packet."


During the Planning Board reviewing the SEQR information document, they requested Melissa amended and initialed a Planning Board request to show an added change on line 5b from "Yes" to "N/A". Planning Board Chairwoman Cotts had explained this needed to be done because the Town of Vestal did not have a comprehensive plan. The Planning Board requested and Pastor David Campbell and P.E. Melissa Secord agreed to the parking lot having a 6-foot privacy fence installed along the property lines of the two neighboring properties on either side.

Following Planning Board Chairwoman Madeline Cotts reading the required SEQR negative declaration statement. This document noted that the Vestal Planning Board determined this project will not have any large impact on the environment, therefore this negative declaration has been approve. The Planning Board, then voted unanimously to accept the presented The Father's Heart parking project site plan. However, their decision depended on the Planning Board receiving Broome County's 239 comments, along with the revised parking lot project site plans showing the requested 6-foot privacy fence addition.

Town Engineer Vernon Myers presented the following Town of Vestal Change of Tenants Permits he had recently reviewed and approved: "Myers Security, LLC" is to occupy space and do business within the 220 Vestal Parkway East, Suite 2 building complex, A Change of Tenant permit for "The Father's Heart" to occupy space and do business within 117 Powderhouse Road Vestal building complex; A Change of Tenant permit for "Raj Hospitality, LLC (Comfort Suites)" to occupy space and do business, within the 3401 Vestal Parkway East building complex, A Change of Tenant Permit for "Aurora Nails" to occupy space and do business within 4700 Vestal Parkway East building complex, has been reviewed and approved. A Change of Tenant Permit had been approved for "Madeline Rose Mastectomy Boutique, LLC" to occupy space and do business within the 100 Rano Blvd. Vestal building complex, has been reviewed and ap-

To address safety concerns Case Drive declared a school zone

Vestal Supervisor John Schaffer explained the request from Vestal Central School District Superintendent Jeffrey Ahern at the May 10 Town Board meeting asking the Board to consider deeming Case Drive a school zone with a 15-mph speed limit. Superintendent Ahern had noted, "We have received complaints from parents of Vestal Hills Elementary School students as well as Case Drive residents regarding the dangerous situation presented by the 30-mph speed limit on Case Drive, behind the elementary school."

Ahern pointed to the increase in traffic during the morning/afternoon hours when parents drop-off/pick-ups of students. Said Ahern. "As part of our current capital project a parent drop-off / pick-up zone is planned to be located in front of the school. However, this will not be completed for another 2-3 years. Meanwhile, for the safety of the students, as well as Case Drive residents, we are requesting that section of Case Drive speed limit be lowered to 15 mph." The Town Board agreed and declared that section of Case Drive to be a school zone and lowered the speed limit to 15mph. Mary Sonnen presented her Girl Scout Gold Award proposal to the Board at the May 8th Work Session. She explained, "I would like to put signs up at each of the Town of Vestal parks providing information about the Town of Vestal's history. Each sign will highlight the change and advancements of the Town of Vestal during a 50-year historic time span."

On Wednesday night Town Board approved the project for Vestal's parks. During the public comment portion, Some 24 Vestal residents explained the main reason for their attendance was to share their frustrations, concerns, and questions regarding the latest Vestal property reassessments. Vestal residents Marcus Smith and Mindy Bell explained their properties assessed values have been increasing a great deal over the past couple of years, even though no additional changes have been made to their properties

Some assessed values went up a total of 25 to 30 percent. Marcus Smith said, "My 2021 assessment was \$105,050. Last year \$177,200. This year it was \$203,800." Mindy Bell also spoke saying, "My husband and I moved to Vestal 17 years ago from Dutchess County thinking we were moving to a more reasonable area. Now, we're getting priced out in Vestal."

Some residents questioned, "What does the assessed val-

ue increase mean when it comes to our property taxes?" Schaffer explained that just because assessed property value increases, it doesn't necessarily mean a tax increase. Vestal Town Board Member John Fletcher suggested that those who don't agree with their current assessment should file an assessment grievance form with the Town of Vestal Assessment Department.

As to other items on the Board's agenda, the Board agreed Sarah Koontz, Logistics Coordinator and River Guide with Bad Adventures, could use Castle Gardens Park for one night of group tent camping on Friday, May 26, 2023. Koontz said, "This will be an overnight stop, as part of our Susquehanna River canoe and kayak trip. Our one night of camping will be Friday, May 26th to Saturday May 27. We will arrange for our rental toilet facilities. There will be no smoking and no alcohol permitted. Quiet time rules will be strictly enforced. We have been running this type of program successfully or many years. Our participants range in age from 27 to 72 years old."

A Public Hearing was scheduled for Wednesday, May 24, concerning a Local Law creating a Town of Vestal Administrative Hearing Officer position. Another Public Hearing was scheduled to be held 5pm at the Vestal Town Board room on Wednesday, June 14, for a proposed Local Law concerning the adoption of a Town of Vestal Nuisance Law.

Vestal Museum Director Cherese Wiesner-Rosales asked the Town Board to waive the alcohol restriction on the Rail Trail for their Second Saturday Music Festival Series being held May thru October 2023. The Town Board granted her request, but only if all requirements are met and presented to the Town Board before the event:

Insurance Indemnification and a day use Liquor License from New York State Liquor Authority from each participating vendor serving alcohol. If food is served, a Broome County Health Department permit must also be provided. Town Board approved an increase in the annual base salary for the position of Town Engineer to \$150,000 effective with the first full payroll in July 2023. The Supervisor explained, "This increase is to address current and future recruitment and retention issues." Schaffer signed the Supplemental Agreement for the Main Street Bridge Replacement Project for additional soil boring, stormwater concerns, and archeological services. Vestal Police Chief Stace Kintner received approval to sell the department's retired 2020 Dodge Durango "as is" via Auctions International.

As the meeting concluded, Town Board members, acting as the Board of Fire Commissioners, approved and welcomed these new Vestal Fire Department volunteers at the following Vestal Fire Stations:

Fire Station 1- Grace Kelley.

Fire Station 2- David Kubeli and Jacob Kubeli, and Fire Station 4– Mark Pradun.



Last Day of Attendance Scheduled for Vestal Students

Vestal Central School District, assuming that there are no emergency closings between now and the end of the school year, has anticipated the last day of school for students in GradesK - 8 and 9 - 12.

In order to meet the minimum number-of-hours requirement and 180 days of instruction mandated by New York State, the District has scheduled the last day of pupil attendance for students in Grades K – 8 for Friday, June 23, 2023. Both Thursday, June 22, and Friday, June 23, will be half days for students in Grades K – 8.

At Vestal High School, the last day of pupil attendance for Grades 9 - 12 is Tuesday, June 13, 2023.

Regents exams will be administered June 14 - 16 and June 20 - 23.

Looking ahead, the District anticipates welcoming students on Thursday, September 7, 2023, for the opening of the 2023-24 school year.




