# Tigers End Golden Bear Winning Streak

The UE Tigers ended one of Vestal's longest winning streaks as they defeated the Vestal Golden Bears by a 97 to 84 score to win for the first time since the 2001-02 season. Despite the loss, Coach Joe Shore saw plenty of future potential in the meet results. Career best times are not to be expected from veterans in the opening meet, yet tri-captains Ocean Sun and Logan Kim turned them in. Kim had a pair of best times to win the 100 Back for Vestal's only individual swimming event win and the 100 Fly where he took 2nd behind one of last year's state qualifiers. Sun had his best 50 Free to finish 3rd behind team mate Ben Hutchings.

Joining Kim with a pair of best times was Sayum Singhal who had his fastest 100 Fly and finished 2nd in the 200 IM with his best time. Harrison Cappellett had his career best to lead a 2-3-4 Vestal finish in the 200 Free and outscore UE in the event. Tri-captain Adi Banerjee led the only other event where Vestal outscored the Tigers as he headed a 2-3-4 finish in the 100 Free. Adi also led the Golden Bears in the 100 Breast. Lucas Matt led the Golden Bears finishing 2nd in the 500 Free.

Three newcomers earned their first varsity points by placing in their individual events. David Cozma scored in both the IM and the Breast, while Finn Hynes scored in the 200 Free and Jayden Kim earned his points in the IM. Gavin Hantsch turned in his career bests in both the 500 and 50 Free, while Luke Sobel also had a career best in the 50 Free.

# Dog Shelter Law

With cold weather now upon us, Rick Murray (TOB Dog Control Officer) wants to remind you of the "New York State Dog Shelter Law".

Section 353-b of the New York Agriculture and Markets Law states that you are required to provide shelter for your dog at all times. The Broome County Sheriff's Dept. and the New York State Police, as well as local police agencies, can enforce this law. If your dog spends anytime outdoors, you must provide shelter to protect the dog from direct sunlight, rain, snow, wind, cold weather, hot weather, and other inclement conditions. The shelter must be waterproof, insulated, and allow the dog to move around freely. The dog must be able to stand up, turn around, and lie down.

Violators will receive a Court citation and be required to pay a fine ranging from \$50 to \$250, as well as to show proof of shelter for the dog.

If you suspect that someone is not providing their dog with adequate food and/or shelter, don't hesitate to call the Sheriff's Dept. at 778-1911 or the New York State Police at 775-1241.













# Charity Scam Prevention Tips As Holiday Season Begins

The charitable spirit of New Yorkers is at an all-time high during the holiday season, so this week's tips are meant to serve as a guide when choosing causes to donate to so donations get to the right place and not in the hands of scammers.

"The season of giving is in full swing, and people are purchasing gifts for loved ones and making generous donations to causes they care about," said Secretary of State Robert J. Rodriguez. "But before making these donations, it is important to remember that scammers like to prey on the good intentions of people, and we encourage New Yorkers to do their research before making donations so that these good deeds reach the right place."

Charity scams can happen at any time, but they are more prevalent during the holiday season when donors are moved by both generosity and the end-of-year deadline for securing tax deductions. Charity scams also increase after a natural disaster or emergencies, collecting millions of dollars from unsuspecting donors. On many occasions, these fraudsters pretend to be affiliated with well-known organizations or even the government to scam people out of their hard-earned money. According to the Federal Trade Commission, in 2022, there were 10,217 reports of charitable solicitation fraud resulting in \$21 million in losses. This is a drastic increase from 2019's 3,872 reports of charitable solicitation fraud resulting in \$6 million in losses.

#### **Tips to Help Avoid Charity Scams:**

Check the legitimacy of the charitable organization. Charities located or engaging in substantial fundraising in New York State should be listed on the New York State Attorney General's database of registered charities. Research before you donate by visiting charitiesnys.com to verify registration, and by checking websites such as www.bbb. org, www.give.org and www.guidestar.org in addition to visiting the charity's website. If donating toward relief efforts, visit a site such as disasterphilanthropy.org to ensure your donation is really going where it needs to.

Learn to detect a phony charity. Some scammers will create fake "charities" and try to trick you with names similar to well-known charities. Pay attention to the charity's full name, web address, contact information, donation policies, etc. Scammers may copy or mimic the name of a familiar, trusted organization to swindle you.

Designate your donation. Ask how your donation will be allocated between direct services and administrative fees. Unless you designate a specific purpose for your donation, it will go into the organization's general fund, so make sure to note if you are sending money for a specific purpose (ie: "Playground Fund").

Be cautious of third-party fundraisers. If a solicitation comes from a third-party company, the charitable organization will receive only a percentage of your donation. If you want to ensure the charity receives the whole amount, donate directly to the charity instead. For more information, access the New York State Attorney General's website and review the annual "Pennies for Charity" report.

Pay attention to vague claims. Be on alert for claims without any clear plan such as "all proceeds go to cancer treatments" or "donations go to veterans who can no longer work." Instead do some research on the charity before you decide.

Resist high-pressure tactics. Charity fraud scams can come in many forms, whether by email, social media, crowdfunding platforms, cold calls, etc. Watch out for direct e-mails from "victims" and solicitors who employ heart-wrenching stories, insisting that you donate imme-

diately. It is highly recommended to never provide personal information to unsolicited telemarketers, but instead ask the caller to provide you with the full name of the charitable organization, , website address and contact information to research and verify.

Find out who's behind the crowdfunding request. Online crowdfunding websites like GoFundMe, Indiegogo and Crowdrise make it easy for people to create crowdfunding campaigns. To protect yourself, remember to only give to people you know directly. It's also important to understand the crowdfunding site's rules, policies, and vetting procedures. It can be helpful to know these ahead of time to determine how they are protecting consumers from potential fraud.

Never disclose personal information. Do not provide any personal information such as your credit card number, Social Security number, or any other personal identifying information in response to an unsolicited charitable request.

Never give cash. Give your contribution by check or credit card to ensure that you have a record of the donation. Make checks out to the charity, not to an individual. If you choose to make a donation via a charity's website, check that the website is secure and that your computer is equipped with the latest anti-virus protection. Check for the padlock to the left of the URL search bar to ensure the site is secure. Do not send funds to anyone asking for bitcoin or cryptocurrency as these payments typically have no protections against fraud.

Don't mail checks from public collection boxes: According to the US Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN), the number of check fraud crimes nationwide has increased since 2020. To avoid this fraud, go directly to the post office to deposit mail. If you need to use a public U.S. Postal Service collection box, try to do so before the last pickup of the day to minimize the amount of time the check spends in the box.

Double Check before you deduct. Donations made to individuals or organizations that are not tax-exempt are not deductible. To find out if a donation will be tax deductible, research an organization's tax-exempt status at the Internal Revenue Service Tax Exempt Organization Search . Request a receipt and track the status of your donation.

# Get Help for Rising Heat Bills with HEAP

For anyone concerned about rising heating costs through the winter months, the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) is available to help you keep the heat on.

Eligible homeowners and renters may apply for HEAP, which can provide up to \$976 in assistance depending on income, household size, and what kind of heating system you have in your home.

More than \$434 million in HEAP benefits were issued last year, and Governor Kathy Hochul has announced that \$360 million would be set aside for home heating aid this winter

# Pets- Snow, Ice, And Freezing Temps, Oh My! Top 10 Safety Tips to Follow During the

**Cold Front** 



Cold weather is upon us and that will likely affect many

We are letting pet owners know to be prepared as the cold fronts move in, below are 10 tips to help people and their pets stay as safe as possible:

- Keep your pets inside during extreme temperatures. Once the temperature drops below 20 degrees Fahrenheit, pets are at risk of developing hypothermia or frostbite.
- Dogs and cats' paws, ears, and tails are the most common areas that pets can develop frostbite - this increases if those areas are wet.
- If a pet needs to spend time outside during extreme temperatures, keep both walks and potty breaks short.
- Use plastic water bowls for outdoors. A pet's tongue may stick to metal, and they could injure themselves when trying to pull away.
- Chemicals used to melt snow and ice can injure or irritate the pads of pet's feet. Look for pet-friendly ice melt products and steer clear of anti-freeze which is toxic
- Gently wipe their feet with a damp towel once they are back inside to avoid a trip to the veterinarian. Wearing boots can protect paws from irritating salt on the street.
- Many dogs, particularly those with short coats, will be more comfortable if they have a sweater or coat on. If a dog frequently lifts their paws, whines or stops during walks, it is probably because their feet are cold.
- Be particularly careful when taking older, arthritic animals and small pets outside. They may become stiff and tender quickly and often find it difficult to walk on the snow or ice.
- Don't let dogs off the leash during a snowstorm. No matter how much they want to play in the snow, they can easily lose their scent and become lost.
- Always make sure dogs are wearing ID tags and are microchipped before you take them out.
- Always check under the hood of a car's engine a favorite hiding space for community cats. Check underneath a car, bang on the hood, and honk the horn before starting the engine to make sure a cat hasn't taken up temporary

# Junior IB Diploma candidates volunteer at **CHOW**

One of the essential components of the International Baccalaureate Diploma is Creativity, Activity, Service (CAS), which reflects the IB requirement that students voluntarily participate in service to the community in which they reside. Alongside their academic studies, IB encourages students to be well-rounded and to pursue interests that are both enjoyable and meaningful. IB recognizes that every student has a different starting point, and our annual VHS field trip to CHOW serves as an initial opportunity for our diploma candidates to come together early in their junior year as they begin pursuit of this challenging diploma. It has become a Vestal tradition for our students to volunteer at CHOW during this critical time

A total of 18 of our junior IB Diploma Candidates volunteered at CHOW on November 15, 2023. Cody Manning, Community Engagement Specialist for CHOW, first gave students an overview of the mission of the warehouse, providing some impactful statistics: Broome County is one of the most "food insecure" counties in New York State (in fact, once we returned to VHS, students engaged in a lengthy discussion of "food insecurity" and exactly what that meant). CHOW is the central warehouse for a network of food pantries in the Southern Tier. They have seen a 41% increase in distribution over last year and have distributed two million pounds of food in the first 10 months of this year. They expect to reach three million by the end of the year. Additionally, six new food pantries opened just in the last three months. Students noted that, while it is fortunate that donations and distribution have both increased, the inevitable conclusion is that the community's needs have also increased significantly

After the overview, students first listened to instructions about how to properly pick and organize orders from

local food pantries. They were then sent off on their own to pull items from shelves and put labels on packages. Each student immediately took the initiative, working cooperatively to pick and arrange sometimes large orders for food. Students developed several skills during this process, not the least of which are asking questions and problem-solving how to best fill an order when there appeared to be no easy answer.

After students returned to VHS, they learned how to record and reflect on their experience. Diploma candidates are required by IB to keep a journal of their creative, active, and service-oriented pursuits throughout the two years of the diploma program. Mr. Dunham also provided an overview of the upcoming Extended Essay process. Students brainstormed possible research questions for this 4,000-word essay that they will write over the next 14 months under the guidance of a staff member. # Some Rockefeller **Historical Milestones:**

1931 - Construction workers building Rockefeller Center put up a Christmas tree, the first- ever Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree.

- 1933 First formal Rockefeller Center Tree Lighting Ceremony. The tree was decked with 700 lights in front of the eight-month-old RCA Building.
- 1936 Two trees, each 70 feet (21.3 m) tall, were erected. For the first time the Lighting Ceremony included a skating pageant on the newly opened Rockefeller Plaza Outdoor Ice Skating Pond.
- 1942 Three trees were placed on Rockefeller Plaza, one decorated in red, one in white and one in blue to show support for our troops serving during World War II.
- 1949 The tree was painted silver, to look like snow.
- 1951 The Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree was lit for the first time on national television on the Kate Smith Show.
- 1966 The first tree from outside the United States was erected. It was given by Canada, in

honor of the Centennial of its Confederation. This is the farthest distance a tree has traveled to Rockefeller Center.

- 1980 For the 50th Anniversary of Tree Lighting, a 70 foot-tall (21.3 m) Norway Spruce came from the grounds of the Immaculate Conception Seminary of Mahwah, N.J. Bob Hope participated in the Lighting.
- 1999 The largest tree in Rockefeller Center history, 100 feet tall (30.5 m), came from Killingworth, Conn.
- 2004 The Swarovski-designed star became the largest star to ever grace the tree. • 2007 - For the first time, the tree was lit with energy-
- efficient LEDs. They draw a fraction of the power that had been traditionally required by the tree, reducing energy consumption from 3,510 kwH to 1,297 kwH per day, saving as much energy as a single family would use in a month in a 2,000 square foot (185.8 m2) home. Hundreds of solar panels atop one of the Rockefell-
- 2021 For the first time, the Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree comes from Maryland.
