

Hawks Splash Past Golden Bears

With the weather forcing another meet delay, missing a few regulars, and facing three meets in a six-day period, Coach Joe Shore decided to let his swimmers try some new events in last Thursday's meet at Corning. The result included several best times along with an easy victory for the Corning Hawks, by a final score of 89-79. That score was made to look close only because Corning swam exhibition in the final four events after dominating early to build an 89-33 lead.

Vestal's first top finish came after the meet was clinched, as Logan Kim had his career best 100 Backstroke time to finish ahead of the field. Earlier in the meet he had the team's season best and his career best time in the 50 Free finishing 3rd. Finn Hynes had a pair of best times in the distance events, as he finished 3rd in the 500 after a tight race. He was edged by team mate Ocean Sun in the 200 Free, who also had a season best in the 100 Free. Harrison Cappellett and Lucas Matt both broke the minute mark in the 100 Free for the first time, while Cappellett had another career best in the 100 Back.

Sayum Singhal was the top Golden Bear in both the 200 IM and 100 Fly. Michael Xue and Cameron Smith both had their best times in the 100 Breast, finishing behind Adi Banerjee. Ben Elie topped the 200 mark, again in the diving while finishing 2nd behind a career high score by defending Class A champion Brendan Jardin-Reed of Corning. That was one of only two 2nd place individual finishes for Vestal, as Banerjee was runner-up in the 100 Free. Newcomer Stephane Zhou earned his first varsity points as he placed in the 100 Back and also swam his first 200 Free. Jayden Kim and Xue turned in their fastest 50 Free times, along with Singhal, Smith, Luke Sobel, Ananta Banerjee, Solomon Chen and David Cozma

The Medley relay team of Cappellett, Adi Banerjee, L. Kim and Elie finished 2nd. Officially Vestal won both Free relays due to Corning swimming exhibition. In the 200 Free it was the B team of Cozma, J. Kim, Sobel and Hynes winning, while Matt, Sun, L. Kim and Adi Banerjee were credited with the win in the 400 Free relay.

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Vestal Girl Scouts' Silver Award Project: Grand Opening of Personal Care Kits on February 19

Girl Scouts of NYPENN Pathways, INC has awarded Vestal residents and Girl Scouts Madeline Herceg, Lily Medionte and Lilly St. John the Girl Scout Silver Award – the highest award a Girl Scout Cadette can earn. The award represents a girl's accomplishments in Girl Scouting and her community as she grows and works to improve her life and the lives of others. Girls who pursue it look around their neighborhoods and/or schools and develop a project to make their community better in the process.

By earning the Girl Scout Silver Award, Madeline, Lily and Lilly have become community leaders. Their accomplishments reflect leadership and citizenship skills that set them apart.

Herceg, Medionte and St. John's project focused on providing personal hygiene products to people in need. They chose to collaborate with the Vestal Public Library to house the items.

The Vestal Public Library, formerly the Vestal Free Library, was founded in 1947 and proudly serves an area of more than 26,000 residents. The mission of the VPL is to be recognized as the resource for life-long learning, community involvement, and entertainment.

They met with the library and discovered that there were many individuals living in a local hotel that come to the library seeking help with personal needs supplies. The library has seen an increase in the number of individuals in similar circumstances. During the day these individuals come to spend time at the library and utilize their many resources.

Through research Madeline, Lily and Lily found that homelessness was on the rise in Broome County. They learned that "Homelessness in the Southern Tier increased by more than 50 percent over the past year, according to new preliminary data from the Southern Tier Homeless Coalition." The coalition runs programs and tracks homelessness in Broome, Chenango, Otsego, Cortland, Delaware and Tioga counties. Across that region, 483 people either stayed in shelters or on the street on a single night this year according to data collected in May of 2022.

The three girls volunteered to come out to the library during voting night to inform residents about the local needs and asked for them to help with donations of supplies. Over the span of 2 months the girls collected donations from family, friends, community members and local businesses. The Junior League of Binghamton had recently collected items for a similar project called Showers of Hope and they shared items with the girls as well. They collected cans and bottles from family and friends and used the funds and gift cards donated by local busi-

ness to purchase a bookcase, for the items to be housed, and some other items.

Through their efforts, they built a bookcase to hold all the items, made signage and organized the items as well as boxing items that will be put out for replenishment by the libraries staff. Becky Pineau, Programing support for the library, has been a wonderful liaison for the girls working with the library.

"I learned so much about our community and the needs that people have" says Madeline. While Lily and Lilly shared that they are hopeful that this Girl Scout Silver Award project will "create a useful space that will serve the needs of the people coming to the library for personal hygiene items."

Medionte says, "I hope this project will help people in need and inspire others to bring better into the world. Even if this project helps one person, or three hundred, I will feel accomplished either way!"

St. John says, "Our goal for the project was to serve people in need and I hope this can both inspire people to help others!"

Herceg says, "Helping people in my own community makes me see that there are so many ways to help people right here where we live. I hope people look around them to see how they can help others."

SIU Investigation in Vestal Leads to Felony Drug and Weapons Charges



On January 24, 2024, with the assistance of the METRO SWAT Team and the Vestal Police Department, the Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force executed a search warrant at 1 Wakeman Rd. in the Town of Vestal.

The target of the search warrant was Daontay Stephenson, age 34 of Vestal, who was present during the execution of the warrant. Also present was Willie Mims, age 56 of Vestal.

During the search, the following items of evidence were located:

- □ 175.1 grams of Fentanyl Pills (Approximately 6.176 ounces)
- ☐ 24.7 grams of Powder Cocaine
- □ 3.9 grams of Crack Cocaine
- \square 17 green pills that were determined to be Oxycodone Hydrochloride,
- a Schedule II Controlled Substance
- ☐ Scales and packaging used to distribute narcotics
- ☐ A Citadel Warthog 12-gauge shotgun
- ☐ A loaded high-capacity .223 magazine
- ☐ Assorted ammunition
- □ \$1,068 in US currency

Following the search, both Stephenson and Mims were transported to the Broome County Sheriff's Office. While in an interview room, Stephenson tampered with evidence by destroying Acetaminophen/Oxycodone Hydrochloride pills that were secreted down his pants.

As a result of the investigation, Daontay A. Stephenson and Willie C. Mims were arrested and charged with the following:

Leave No Trace — Hiking with Dogs

If you're bringing your canine companion along for the hike, make sure you are aware of how you both can produce as little of an impact as possible.

While your dog may not be able to wear matching snowshoes with you, you can try to keep them to the side of the trail to avoid "paw post-holing."

We recognize this isn't always easy to do, but there are other ways to practice Leave No Trace $^{\text{TM}}$ with your dog that are more in your control.

For example, bringing plastic bags to pack out your dog's waste is a great way to prevent the spread of invasive species and protect the natural environment.

Stay mindful of your impact and have a paw-some time outside!

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Consequences of Feeding Deer in the Winter

Now that white-tailed deer hunting seasons have ended throughout most of New York State, it may be tempting to begin feeding deer to "help" them through the winter. However, feeding deer during the winter or other times of the year is unnecessary, prohibited in New York, and can have very negative consequences for deer, your neighbors, and surrounding wildlife habitat.

During the winter, deer primarily rely on woody and evergreen vegetation for their daily nutritional and metabolic needs. The digestive enzymes in a deer's stomach change in the winter to better digest this vegetation. If deer are provided with unnatural food sources such as corn or hay after this change in diet has occurred it can result in deer becoming ill or even their death. Deer will attempt to utilize the unnatural food source, but can develop acidosis (i.e., grain overload disease) or enterotoxemia (i.e., Clostridium overgrowth) disease because they can't digest the food properly. Both diseases occur acutely and can result in the rapid illness and death of deer in winter even though their stomachs are full.

Deer also congregate around food sources in winter which can increase the risk for disease transmission. For example, if a deer infected with chronic wasting disease visits an artificial deer feeding site it will shed CWD prions in its saliva directly on the food, which can infect any other deer that feed from the same site. Congregations of deer around artificial feeding sites can also increase the risk for deer-vehicle collisions and deer related damage to landscape plantings, orchards, and tree farms. Inflated deer densities resulting from deer feeding can also exceed the carrying capacity of the surrounding habitat, resulting in wildlife habitat degradation.

Habitat improvement, especially the creation and promotion of early successional habitat, is the best way to ensure that deer and other species of wildlife have plenty to eat all year and avoids the negative consequences of deer feeding. Anyone interested in improving wildlife habitat on their property can contact their regional DEC deer or wildlife habitat management biologist.

The following is a partial listing of tree and shrub species that are eaten by deer in the winter, arranged in order of quality and preference.

Preferred or Best Liked

Cedar (white or arborvitae), sassafras, wintergreen, alternate-leaved dogwood, yew, mountain maple, witch hobble, basswood, apple, maples*, flowering dogwood, and staghorn sumac.

Second Choice

Elderberry, highbush cranberry, silky dogwood, nannyberry, wild raisin, red-berried elder, highbush blueberry, red osier dogwood, cucumber tree, arbutus, mountain ash, willow*, honeysuckle, and hemlock.

Readily Eaten

White ash, black birch, American chestnut, spicebush, black walnut, butternut, wild grape, sugar maple, yellow birch, black cherry, choke cherry, shadbush (winterberry), black ash, bush honeysuckle, oaks*, hickory, witch hazel, elm, lowbush blueberry, hazelnut, and leatherwood.

Starvation or Poor Food

Scotch pine**, red pine**, mountain laurel**, paper birch, spruces, grey-stemmed dogwood, raspberry, blackberry, sheep laurel, buckthorn, pitch pine**, beech, rhododendron**, musclewood (blue beech), alder, red cedar, sweet fern, tamarack, hawthorn, white pine**, aspen (poplar), gray birch, ironwood (hop hornbeam), black locust, balsam**, gooseberry*, currant* and pin cherry.

There is considerable difference in palatability and preference of the different species of this genus.

This species is often browsed heavily enough to appear to be second choice food in areas where winter food is inadequate.
