## Golden Bear Swimming & Diving Awards Ceremony

Vestal Boys Swimming & Diving coaches Joe Shore and Sara Rostedt recently recognized the team at their season ending celebration. Many of the rookie awards were fiercely contested due to the fact that half of the 24 athletes were in their first year of competition, while another eight are only in their second year. Twenty members of the team earned Academic All-Star honors, while Coach Shore recognized 13 as either Attendance All-Stars or Attendance All-Stars with Honors.

7th grader David Cozma earned Most Valuable Rookie as he earned Section 4 Freshman (or younger) Top 10 in four events. Freshman Michael Xue earned the Most Improved Rookie award based on his improvements including a Freshman Top 10 ranking in the 100 Breast. The Rookie Coach's award went to freshman Ananta Banerjee. Another first-year swimmer, Cameron Smith, was recognized with the STAC Sportsmanship award. Among the runner-ups who were recognized for these awards were: Jayden Kim, Solomon Chen, Chris Issa, Lucas Matt and Ananta Banerjee.

Junior tri-captain Logan Kim was named Most Valuable Swimmer as he earned a sectional bronze medal in the 100 Back and was named STAC Metro All-Star for the 2nd consecutive year. Another junior, Ben Elie, was named Most Valuable Diver and Swimmer Extraordinaire as he also earned a sectional bronze medal and STAC Metro All Star in only his 2nd year of competing. His top diving scores earned him the #7 All Time (in 58 years of Vestal Swimming & Diving history) for 6 dives and #4 All Time for 11 dives, as he narrowly missed qualifying for the state meet and finished the season in the Top-40 of New York State in both events. Freshmen and 2nd year varsity swimmers Ben Hutchings and Sayum Singhal were runner-ups for the MVP.

Sophomore Luke Sobel earned Most Improved Swimmer as his 100 Fly time this year was better than his best 100 Free last season. Freshman Finn Hynes and sophomore Gavin Hantsch were runner-ups for this award. Captains' certificates were awarded to Logan Kim along with seniors Adi Banerjee and Ocean Sun. Senior Ian Chung was recognized for his improvement in only his 2nd year on the team. Other key contributors who were recognized at the celebration were: junior Harrison Cappellett as the top distance freestyler, freshmen Arsen Markevych and Derek Dai, junior Jonathan Zheng, 7th grader Stephane Zhou, and sophomore Daniel Li.

Hutchings earned Section 4 Top 10 Freshman recognition in four events including #2 in the 50 and 100 Free. Singhal also earned Freshman Top 10 in four events including #4 in the 200 IM. Hynes earned a Top-10 Freshman ranking in the 500 Free. Both Logan Kim and Elie were Top-10 juniors in their best events. Adi Banerjee was the sole Golden Bear to earn a Top 10 Senior ranking which he accomplished in the 100 Breast. Three Golden Bears (L. Kim, Elie and Adi Banerjee) were able to earn Section 4 and STAC Top-25 rankings along with

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the three relays. Others who earned Class A Top-25 rankings were: Cappellett, Singhal, Matt, Cozma, Hutchings, Sobel, Hynes, and Xue.

Looking towards next year the return of a pair of STAC All-Stars along with many sectional championship and consolation finalists among 21 underclassmen on the team is encouraging. Ten achieved a ranking in at least one event. There is work to be done as Vestal did not have a single Section 4 Top-25 ranking in four of the individual events.

Vestal will again look to improve on this year's team finishes, including a 4-4 dual meet record, #3 finish in the STAC Metro division (2-2) and #4 finish (up from #5 last year) in the Section 4 Class A field of seven teams. Highlights of the season included the dual meet victory over Ithaca, along with beating the Little Red at sectionals.

At the state meet last weekend Section 4 was represented by nine swimmers from 6 schools and three divers from 3 schools in the individual events, while relay teams from 4 schools (Chenango Valley, Horseheads, Maine Endwell and Union Endicott) also qualified. Ten of the 22 Section 4 teams were able to qualify and represent Section 4 in at least one event. Teams who had a qualifier also included: Corning, Elmira, Ithaca, Johnson City, Lansing and Oneonta.

Top Section 4 finishes belonged to a pair of Chenango Valley seniors. Tyler Schultz set a new Section 4 record finishing 4th in the 200 IM (previously set by Ryan Nicholson of Ithaca in 2013) and placed 5th in the 100 Breast where he holds the Section 4 record. Amir Sadykov finished 7th in the 100 Back along with 11th in the 50 Free. Senior Shoonfon Li of Horseheads also scored, placing 11th in the IM and 14th in the Back. Koen Anderson of Ithaca placed 16th in the 500 Free and Lansing's Connor Lajza finished 17th in the Fly. Maine Endwell placed 17th in the 200 Free relay where the winners from Frewsburg broke the NYSPHSSA record set by Corning in 2021. The Chenango Valley quartet finished 12th in the Medley relay and 15th in the 400 Free relay.



## **Unveiling the Forgotten**

### Women in History Whose Accomplishments Were Overshadowed by Men

Throughout history, women have made significant contributions to various fields, yet their achievements often remained in the shadows, overshadowed by the spotlight on their male counterparts. Despite their remarkable accomplishments, the credit for their work frequently went to men, perpetuating a narrative of male dominance. ### 1. Rosalind Franklin (1920–1958):

### 4. Ada Lovelace (1815-1852):

Often regarded as the world's first computer programmer, Ada Lovelace made groundbreaking contributions to Charles Babbage's early mechanical general-purpose computer, the Analytical Engine. Lovelace's notes on the engine included what is now considered the first algorithm intended to be processed by a machine. Despite her visionary insights into the potential of computing, Lovelace's work was largely overshadowed by Babbage's, and it took decades for her contributions to be properly acknowledged.

### 5. Katherine Johnson (1918–2020):

Katherine Johnson was an African American mathematician whose calculations were crucial to the success of NASA's early space missions, including the Apollo moon landing. Johnson's precise calculations of orbital mechanics played a pivotal role in ensuring the safety and success of astronauts like John Glenn. Despite her integral role in the space program, Johnson and her fellow African American female colleagues, known as "human computers," faced discrimination and were often overlooked in the annals of history.

### White Rose Day Spa Renovations Nearly Complete After Car Crash

Renovations are near completion at the White Rose Day Spa located at 4535 Old Vestal Rd in Vestal. This comes after the business had to temporarily close its doors following a Miller Auto Team Shuttle Van crashing through the building on January 31st.

It was noted that the driver of the van had a history of seizures and experienced one while operating the vehicle.

This accident injured 4 people, one of them being an employee and another a client. About half the building was impacted by the crash with much of the equipment in the rooms affected having to be replaced.

Altogether 10 salon stations will have to be replaced (totaling around \$9,000 a piece) along with sinks, Belvedere chairs, flooring, and more.

With this, many of the hair stylists who work at the spa are either temporarily working at other salons or are struggling to make ends meet as the White Rose Spa tries to reschedule appointments with clients.

"We're totally out of commission for the time being." said Karen Latta, the owner of White Rose Day Spa. "We're very fortunate no one was severely injured or killed in the crash."

The business has been trying to contact Miller Auto regarding the accident with no response currently.

Despite the hard time the locally owned spa has been going through within the past month, there is light at the end of the tunnel as renovations have been slowly making progress.

With this, extra safety measures will be placed on the property to ensure nothing like this ever happens again.

"We're just trying to make everyone feel comfortable again." mentioned Latta.

It is said the White Rose Spa will be reopening sometime in March. The business would like to thank the Vestal Fire Department and Vestal Police Department for their quick response and keeping everything under control on the day of the accident. They would also like the thank Generall Property Services Inc. for helping with renovations.
