

Mental Health Awareness Days at Local Elementary Schools

Public Budget Hearing and Regular Meeting Vestal

NEWSPAPER EDITED MINUTES, Vestal School Board, May 14th, 2024

Student Government Report

Student Government President Ian Chung reported that the high school had a successful Teacher Appreciation Week with something special done every day for the teachers, including banners and a "chalked walk" to let them know the students really appreciate all they do. They were also leading up to the Student Government election on 5/22, and new officers will be reported to the Board at the next meeting.

Public Hearing on Budget

Superintendent Clifford Kasson and School Business Executive Angela Rogers presented the proposed 2024-25 budget totaling \$90,856,822. This includes a tax levy of \$51,884,996, which is an increase of 1.77% over the current year. They reviewed proposed reductions due to expenditures exceeding expected revenues. Community members asked questions regarding what the proposed increase to their taxes would amount to and if any companies on a PILOT (Payment In Lieu Of Taxes) program ever defaulted. Two 10th grade VHS students also spoke of their disappointment in budget cuts eliminating 0 period bussing and reducing late bussing from 4 to 3 days per week, as they feel this limits student opportunities to take extra educational courses and/or participate in clubs. Mr. Kasson reiterated that every decision made regarding reductions was very difficult, but necessary, in order to balance the budget.

Executive Session

Public Comment on Agenda Items

Dylan Ruffo, ASA President - Mr. Ruffo thanked Administration for working with the Administrative Secretarial Association to come to a fair agreement to bring before the Board for their contract renewal. He also thanked the Board for their consideration in approving the tentative agreement.

Reports

Board President Kathryn Egan reported on the following:

- --Budget Vote & BOE Election: Reminder that the Budget Vote and BOE Election will take place on Tuesday, May 21, 2024 from 12-8 pm in the Central Junior Gymnasium, 201 Main Street, Vestal. There will be a very brief Special Board Meeting that night at 9 pm to certify the vote.
- --Liaison Reports: Lisa Milkovich attended the GSCA meeting on 4/29, along with Mr. Kasson who provided information on the budget. They celebrated teachers the first week of May and plan to provide testing snack bags for students during State testing. The End-of-Year Party is scheduled for 6/23 at Skate Estate. Kay Ellis attended the Tioga Hills PTO meeting on 5/1, as did Mr. Kasson to discuss the budget and answer questions. The PTO is sponsoring the 3rd annual Spring Fling Carnival on 6/7 from 6-8 for all Tioga Hills students and their families. Shoba Agneshwar attended the most recent Town of Vestal Board meeting, where the Town Supervisor reported that they

are pleased to provide five active duty SRO's to the Vestal School District. Shoba also mentioned that families moving into the area are looking for real estate in the ARE and VHE elementary school zones. Shoba attended the VHE PTA meeting on 5/13, as did Mr. Kasson to highlight the budget. Kindergarten screenings have begun. Jared Campbell will be visiting the school, as well as an author. Mark Browning attended the VHS PTO meeting on 5/8, as did Mr. Kasson to report on the budget. Students are in the midst of AP/IB exams this month, and there are numerous concerts taking place throughout the month of May, as well. The Save A Life Tour came to VHS on 4/23, which is an impaired and distracted driving program. This was a powerful presentation for our students.

Superintendent Clifford Kasson reported on the following:

- --Budget Video Series: Mr. Kasson and Ms. Rogers, School Business Executive, have been releasing a series of videos on budget development to provide the community with helpful information that lead up to the vote. Mr. Kasson also expressed his thanks to Dylan Ruffo for producing the videos.
- --Staff Appreciation Video: Mr. Kasson sent out a personal video last week with a sincere message to let ALL staff know that he appreciates their contributions in making Vestal a great school district.
- --Hall of Fame Dinner: The Vestal Hall of Fame Dinner took place on May 1st at Vestal High School. Dr. Mark Hatala (Class of 1980) and Brian Lynn (Class of 1993) were both inducted at the inspiring ceremony that evening.
- --Academic Awards Night: Vestal High School recognized over 180 students for their academic achievements on May 7th. Selected students were also presented with Department Awards.
- --Junior Prom: The Junior Prom took place at The Riverdale Banquet Hall on April 26th. Mr. Kasson took the time to visit during the event, which he reported was well-attended and a good night all the way around.
- --Badge Access to Buildings: Mr. Kasson informed the Board that Administration is developing a protocol that would allow staff/coach badge access to the buildings on weekends/holidays ONLY ON A PRE-APPROVED BASIS. The District is currently working with Syracuse Time & Alarm to adapt the alarm systems. A meeting will then be held with fall coaches to discuss the proper approval process and responsibilities in order to use the new badge access system.
- --NYSSBA Awards: Mr. Kasson recognized Kathryn Egan as a recipient of the NYSSBA Achievement Award, Shoba Agneshwar as a recipient of the NYSSBA Excellence Award, and Dinno Nistico as a recipient of the NYSSBA Board Mastery Award based on their participation in NYSSBA events during their time as Vestal Board of Education members.
- --Broome-Tioga BOCES Chief School Administrators Mr. Kasson announced that he is honored to represent the Vestal Central School District by accepting the role of Vice Chairperson for the Broome-Tioga Association of Chief School Administrators.

MOLINARO DEMANDS ANSWERS FROM SPECTRUM ON UNACCEPTABLE REPORT OF POTENTIAL VESTAL LAYOFFS

In light of a recent report by News 12 that dozens if not hundreds of workers at the Spectrum call center in Vestal could be laid off, U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19) today demanded answers from Christopher Winfrey, President and CEO of Spectrum.

The Spectrum call center provides hundreds of residents with job in the Southern Tier. According to the report, layoffs could come as a result of the company moving the call center out of Vestal.

Rep. Molinaro said, "Spectrum promised us they'd be a community partner. This is not what that commitment should look like. Closing the Vestal call center will hurt our local economy and have an impact on customers. I'm demanding answers and am going to fight this."

The full text of the letter can be found below:

Dear Mr. Winfrey,

I am concerned by local reports regarding the potential layoff of hundreds of employees at the Spectrum call center in Vestal, NY and what it means for the residents of Vestal and the surrounding area.

For years, the Spectrum call center in Vestal has provided hundreds of residents with jobs in a part of the country

I represent, that has largely been forgotten about. This prospective action by your company to move jobs away from Vestal would only exacerbate this issue.

My office was recently made aware of the potential closure of the call center in Vestal which would lead to the layoffs of hundreds of my constituents. The elimination of hundreds of jobs at a local call center would be a significant blow to our community at a time of already high economic uncertainty.

According to reporting, employees would be offered the ability to relocate to another location hours away. I have several questions about the potential layoffs, relocation plan, and timeline that employees were notified.

- 1. Why are you considering closing the Vestal, NY call center location?
- 2. When did you first target the Vestal call center for a potential closure?
- 3. When did or do you plan to notify employees of the impending layoffs?
- 4. Will you reconsider the decision?
- 5. On what date would the potential closure of the Spectrum call center in Vestal be effective?
- 6. What are the details of the potential employee reloca-

tion offer and how long would employees have to make a decision?

7. How will the possible closure of the call center in Vestal impact local Spectrum customers and their access to services?

The closure of the Vestal call center would have rippling implications for our local workforce and beyond. I urge you to reconsider closing this call center site.

Thank you for your consideration of this important matter and I look forward to your response.
