





VESTAL MAN CHARGED WITH SOLICITING MINOR FOR SEXUAL PERFORMANCE



A Vestal man is facing a felony and other charges for soliciting pornographic images from a 12-year-old girl.

In the early morning hours of Wednesday, April 3, 2024, members of the Broome County Sher-

iff's Office responded to a 911 report from a 12-year-old victim in the Town of Union. The victim informed investigators that she had been talking and exchanging explicit messages with Steven R. Cook, age 18 of Vestal, NY.

The subsequent investigation showed Cook had been attempting initiate sexual contact with the minor and attempting to solicit pornographic images from her. Throughout the investigation, probable cause was developed and an arrest warrant for Cook was granted.

During the execution of a search warrant at a residence in Vestal, Cook was uncooperative with investigators, but was eventually taken into custody without incident.

Following the investigation, Steven R. Cook was charged

- Attempted Use of a Child in a Sexual Performance, a Class D Felony
- Endangering the Welfare of a Child, a Misdemean-
- Obstruction of Governmental Administration in the 2nd Degree, a Class A Misdemeanor

Cook remains in the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Office awaiting arraignment.

Vestal Central School District Receives Eighth National Recognition As One Of The Best Communities For Music Education By NAMM

For the eighth consecutive year, the Vestal Central School District has been honored with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM) Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education.

This year, Vestal is one of only 975 school districts recognized nationwide!

The Best Communities for Music Education designation is awarded to districts that demonstrate outstanding achievement in efforts to provide music access and education to all students. To qualify for the Best Communities designation, Vestal answered detailed questions about funding, graduation requirements, music class participation, instruction time, facilities, support for the music program and community music-making programs. Responses were verified with school officials and reviewed by The Music Research Institute at the University of Kansas.

"It's an honor to receive the NAMM Best Communities for Music Education Award for the eighth year in a row," said Aubrey Warneck, the District's Music Department Chair. "This is truly a testament to the hard work and dedication of our 17 music educators at Vestal. It has been rewarding to watch our music programs recover and flourish after the pandemic."

Vestal's Music Education program regularly sees students selected for the New York State Schools Music Association (NYSSMA) festivals each year. This year, the District had three students in NYSSMA All-State ensembles, 174 students selected for All-County ensembles, and 44 students across Senior and Junior High Area All-State Festivals. We currently have 274 students preparing for the NYSSMA Solo & Ensemble Festival!



- 5. Be an Active Bystander: Learn how to intervene safely and effectively when you witness potential instances of sexual harassment or assault. Your actions can make a difference.




