

The Broome County Department of Parks, Recreation & Youth Services has announced the opening times for county park amenities.

While the parks are open year-round, special events are hosted during the summer months, including the annual Broome Bands Together, Movies in the Park, the Broome County Triathlon, the 5K Series, Beach Bash, and the popular Spiedie Fest. Starting on Memorial Day, the following amenities will be available:

- **Boat Rentals:** Open daily from 11:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. (last rental at 6:30 p.m.)

- **Beaches:** Open daily from 11:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

- **Concessions:** Available at Nathanial Cole Park and Greenwood Park daily from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m.

- **Camping:** Open daily at \$28 per night with a \$5 reservation fee

- **Pavilions:** Available for \$30 on weekdays and \$100 on weekends and holidays, with a \$5 reservation fee

Boat rental pricing is as follows:

- **Paddle Boats/Kayaks:** \$20 deposit, \$8 per hour - **Sailboats (Dorchester Only):** \$20 deposit, \$8 per hour/\$30 per day

Stand-Up Paddle Boards (Dorchester Only): \$20 deposit, \$8 per hour

Rowboats/Canoes: \$20 deposit, \$5 per hour/\$20 per day

Senior Citizen (age 60+)/Veteran Rowboats/Canoes: \$20 deposit, \$3 per hour/\$10 per day

The Department reminds all visitors to follow park rules and practice proper etiquette when using trails, beaches, boats, and other park equipment. Dogs are welcome in all parks but must be kept on a 6-foot leash and cleaned up after.

Parks open at 8 a.m. and close at dusk.

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GOOD NEWS (From May 28, 2024 - Regular WCSD Board Meeting) By Windsor School District

On May 21, Windsor voters approved the 2024-25 Windsor CSD budget by a vote of 296-92, a 76% approval rate. Margo Kibbler won re-election and Megan Waldron-Carroll won election to the Windsor CSD Board of Education.

In any language, Sydney Angelo, Aubrey Dixon, Thomas Donohue, Jarah Jubay, and Nicholas Pisano are trailblazers at Windsor Central High School. The five seniors are the first WCHS students to earn the New York State Seal of Biliteracy. The state award recognizes students who speak English and another language at a proficient level. Students had to present using their target language on a topic of interest. They also had to complete a research report on an article that was completely in their target language, and the report had to be in the target language.

Real Heroes

Jared Wilbur had just spoken to his mother on the phone. Something didn't seem right.

"When he came to me, I immediately knew something was wrong by the look on his face. Then he told me some of the symptoms his mom was having, and I immediately thought she was having a stroke," said Marc Ayers.

Wilbur, then a sophomore at Windsor Central High School, and Ayres, then the WCHS School Resource Officer, decided to go to Wilbur's home, where his mother was waiting for a friend who was an hour away for help.

"I ran inside, and my mom was sitting in her bed. She was crying and on the phone with her friend. I told her that Marc was here, and we were taking her to the road to catch the ambulance," said Wilbur, now a junior.

Wilbur's mother was indeed having a stroke. The quick thinking of her son and Ayers helped avert catastrophe.

"The doctor said if we waited that long (for her friend) it would have been worse. Our time just barely made the cut," said Wilbur, now a junior at WCHS.

On May 15, the Southern Tier Chapter of the American Red Cross honored Ayers and Wilbur as their "Education Heroes" at the organization's Real Heroes breakfast in Binghamton. Each have their own definition of who the hero was.

"The true hero is Jared and his mom. I was just doing my job, doing what I was supposed to do," said Ayers.

"I think it was a team effort, more on his part because he had the radio," said Wilbur.

Wilbur's mother has recovered, regaining much of the form she had before the stroke.

"I'm very grateful. If we didn't go, my mom would probably be in a hospital or not able to walk," said Wilbur.
