

Town of Windsor Receives Good News

At the August 14, 2024, Windsor Town Board meeting, Town Supervisor Mark Odell announced the good news that the Town is receiving the 2023 Bridge New York Award for McNair Road Bridge. Highway Superintendent Mike Kithcart said this will be a \$2.8 million project with the Town having to pay only 5% of the cost. Councilman Dan Price said, "Excellent, thank you, Mike."

A public hearing was held for Local Law No. 2 for the year 2024. There were no public comments. The Board approved the local law to override the tax levy limit. Resident Scott Clarke spoke about the Pettus Hill Preserve on Abbey Road. He has been the Steward of the Preserve since it opened in May 2019. The 105-acre Preserve was put into a Conservancy for the use of the public by Charles 'Chuck' Pettus. The Preserve is owned by the Waterman Conservation Education Center (WCEC). The WCEC is attempting to update Mr. Pettus's biography. Anyone who has a story or detail they would like to include, please call the WCEC at 607-775-4166 or Scott Clarke at 607-775-4166. Information about Mr. Pettus can also be put online at www.watermancenter.org. Town Supervisor Odell thanked Scott Clarke for all his volunteer work for the Pettus Hill Preserve.

Heather Noyd and Mirra Florance attended the meeting to give the Board a mid-year update on Windsor Youth Sports & Recreation. Heather reported that it is its 8th year of operation, and numbers are up in various sports. She said they continue to partner with the Windsor School Varsity Athletics for various camps and clinics. For the Spring 2024 update, Heather reported that the Klumpp Park Clean Up Day had a huge number of volunteers, and Opening Day was a success with many community vendors. She described the numerous softball field renovations at Klumpp Park. Renovations included a new electrical service to provide electricity to the softball announcer's booth and to power a new scoreboard and lights.

Heather concluded her report with a Winter 2024 update by describing their Basketball League possibly participating in a new local civic program and thanked the Board for their support. Deputy Supervisor Dan Colwell asked if leagues are open only to Windsor kids. Heather replied that football is just Windsor kids, but soccer does have Deposit kids. Councilman Tim Harting asked about the funding for the softball field renovations at Klumpp Park. Heather responded that the Village of Windsor got a grant to do the work.

Dog Control had two reports. The first report was about the Rabies Clinic held on July 23 rd , which vaccinated 100 animals: 76 dogs and 24 cats. Liz Pfister, Town Clerk, said the clinic went smoothly. Broome County provided all the supplies at no charge, and the Vet agreed to accept the \$5/pet to administer the shots. Town Supervisor Odell recognized Dog Control Officer Floyd Bronson and Vet Ellen Johnson for a job well done. The second report was the New York State Agriculture and Markets Municipal Shelter Inspection Report. The Board discussed this report, noting that there have been continued unsatisfactory findings that appear not to be addressed by Broome County.

Attorney Mark Spinner recommended that the Town write a letter to the Broome County Dog Shelter with a copy to the County Executive asking that the unsatisfactory findings be addressed. The Board also discussed the Town not having been billed for the 2023 third and fourth quarter Broome County Animal Shelter fees until April 2024. The Board passed a resolution to amend the General A Fund 2024 Budget to reflect those expen-

ditures. Town Supervisor Mark Odell announced that the Windsor Partners Corn Festival & Tractor

Show will be held on August 24 th from 12:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. at Klumpp Park. Councilman Gary Hupman reported that volunteers from the Susquehanna Valley Grange and the FFA at Windsor High School will help the Windsor Partners with the event. Town Supervisor Odell thanked the Windsor Partners for putting on the Corn Festival & Tractor Show.

Town Supervisor Odell read four thank-you notes the Town had received. A Mountain Road resident thanked the Town road crew for cleaning out debris in the creek bed on Mountain Road. BOCES thanked the Town for participating in the Summer Internship Program. The Civic Club thanked the Town for their donation to the Summer Band Concerts. The Windsor Library thanked the Town for their donation, which is being used to buy books. The Board conducted other business. The Board approved the minutes of their July 10, 2024, meeting and approved the bills for August 2024. The Board approved the signing of an Intermunicipal Agreement with the Town of Deposit to provide cooperative highway services. Regarding the Wastewater Treatment System, the Board approved a resolution to amend the Sewer District 2024 Budget for the repair cost of two submersible pumps and noted the connecting of new construction on Riley Road to the Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Regarding speed limits, the Board acknowledged receiving notice that the request for speed limit reduction on Baker Road had been received by the New York State Department of Transportation and received notice of an order for speed reductions on New York State Route 79 South. Finally, the Board passed three resolutions related to the use of technology: (1) Adoption of an acceptable use policy concerning computer, network resources, and internet usage,

- (2) Adoption of a breach notification policy which is used if there is a suspected breach of private and confidential information, and
- (3) Adoption of a disaster recovery plan for disaster recovery planning, preparedness, management, and mitigation of IT systems and services.

Town Supervisor Odell announced the following upcoming meetings at the Windsor Town Hall: Planning Board Meeting, August 28, 2024, 7:30 p.m.; Regular Board Meeting, September 11, 2024, 7:00 p.m.; and Zoning Board Meeting, September 12, 2024, 6:30 p.m. The meeting was adjourned at 8:13 p.m.



Supervisor Winsor called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm; followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Mr. Winsor opened the floor for comments or concerns. Jan Mcknight asked where we are in the Courts regarding the property violations on the 2 places in Centervillage.

Mr. Winsor said the petition against Dart was filed: the Defendant's Attorney made a request for time, to consult.

The other Defendant Andres, was in Local Court yesterday. Have not heard the outcome.

With no further comments or concerns, Mr. Winsor closed the public portion of the meeting at 7:05.

Resolution # 63.24

Resolved that the ROA results for Bradford McAvoy and Dale Snyder was submitted in error on the Standard Workday Reporting Resolution for the Period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024. The correct ROA results for both are being resubmitted this date on a new Standard Workday Resolution for Elected and Appointed Officials, is herein approved. Motion made by M. Monthly reports submitted to the Board included the Supervisor, Town Clerk, Enforcement Officer.

Committee Reports:

Highway - Highway Superintendent Bulger discussed his position in hiring fulltime employees. Mr. Bulger said the applicants applying for work do not have their Commercial Driver's License. He asked the Town Board to make provisions to allow them to work while they fulfill the State's requirements in obtaining a CDL.

Resolution #64.24

Resolved the Highway Superintendent is authorized to hire Summertime Employees as they work towards earning their NY State CDL. Motion made by D. Rhodes and seconded by G. Cower.

Adopted Ayes 5

Mr. Bulger also noted he is receiving quotes on the replacement of 2-275 gallon oil tanks. The new tanks will be doubled-walled.

Mr. Bulger also discussed the condition of the large trees in the Town's right-of-way on Perch Pond Road. Attorney Matt suggested sending a notice to the property owner advising that the trees need to be evaluat-

ed.

Mr. Bulger also noted that the Main Street Bridge was Yellow Flagged. He will be working with the contractor

Now that the creek is dry, Mr. Bulger can finish the Hartz Road bank stabilization project, they have begun to stack the stones.

The other large project the Highway Crew is working on, is the replacement of the large pipe near Perch Pond and Nabinger Hill Road. We will be using the County's excavator for approximately 2-3 weeks.

Youth - Councilperson Olin reported the Youth Commission met June 21, the field hockey program and tournament schedule was reviewed. Next meeting 7/17/24.

ZBA - Councilperson Cower said the Board met, the Area Variance application on Pratt Road was approved.

Planning - No meeting held.

Historical – Councilperson Rhodes said the meeting was held June 10.

Guest Speaker Patti Smith gave an interesting talk of the Underground Railroad Quilts and the story of quilt blocks that helped enslave people during slavery.

Parks – Councilperson Cower said the parks are in good shape, they are checked and cleaned weekly. He is looking into ordering a new ladder.

Cemetery – Councilperson Rhodes said the cemeteries are looking nice. Bill Pratt, Son of Revolutionary War Soldier will be scheduled a time for the placement of the historical marker.



Town of Colesville Offices

Offices for the Town of Colesville are located in the Town Hall at 780 Welton Street, Harpursville, NY. The Town Garage is located across the street from the Town Hall.

The Town of Colesville lies in the northeast part of Broome County and is bounded on the north by Chenango County, on the east by the Town of Sanford, on the south by the Town of Windsor, and on the west by the Towns of Kirkwood and Fenton. The town was formed on April 3, 1821, from the Town of Windsor. Harpursville is the largest hamlet in the town although it is not incorporated.

Colesville derives its name from pioneer Nathaniel Cole, a revolutionary soldier. He settled here in 1795, on a hill south of Harpursville, known as Coles Hill. He built a tavern there which was in operation as early as 1800. It was the first tavern between Albany and Binghamton. Broome County's Nathaniel Cole Park was opened in the town in 1974 and is located about two miles from the site of its namesake's tavern.

Windsor Welcomes New Teachers

Windsor's 12 newest educators began a three-day orientation Monday, learning the priorities and processes of the district.

"A big part of ensuring student learning is learning as adults. The more we learn, the more it impacts our students," said Barb Tasber, Director of Learning, Leadership, and Technology.

On Monday, the teachers learned the foundations of a Professional Learning Community (PLC). Teachers share their ideas and practices as part if collaborative teams to develop cycles of continuous improvement to ensure students learn.

Among the first-year group are five graduates of Windsor Central High School. Chelsea Stone graduated in 2019 and was part of WCHS's first Introduction to Education class, a course for aspiring teachers.

"From graduating to subbing to being back brings it full circle. It makes my heart happy," said Stone, who will be a grades 4-7 reading interventionist. "I'm learning more about how the district helps their teachers. We've heard a lot about being on an island (elsewhere) but Windsor is different. We're learning who we can go to for help."

Kim Washington is returning to the district differently. She worked as a student-teacher at Weeks Elementary two years ago as she finished her degree. She spent her first year as a full-time teacher in Binghamton last year. She is back in Windsor this year.

I'm excited to be back in this district. I think I made a lot of good relationships when I was here and I'm happy with the community and collaboration here," said Washington.

She will be a self-contained teacher at Windsor Central Middle School, a special education position.

"Working with the self-contained teacher at C.R. Weeks (Megan McCarvill) is the reason I went into special education," said Washington.

On Tuesday, the Windsor transportation staff will take the new teachers on a tour of the district. The educators will also learn about new teacher supports, meet their mentors, and study how to build safety and relationships in the classroom.

Next Tuesday, the final day of the orientation, the

new teachers will learn engagement strategies, and design lessons for first three days of class to set the culture and classroom procedures necessary to proceed.

"Having the opportunity to kick off our new staff's careers specifically with three days for them in addition to three days of (professional development) with their collaborative teams sets the stage for the ongoing learning and support we provide to ensure success," said Tasber.


