Looked like summer, felt like summer, smelled like it even. And it was summer summer's last day.

The woods smelled of pine needles, fresh and revived by a light steady rain from last night. Drops had collected in seasonal potholes, creating small pools in which bright yellow leaves now were floating. Everything glistened in low sunlight beams: leaves on red maples that swayed overhead; lichens adhering to trunks on great oaks; haircap moss clumps soft as pillows.

Creature noise filled the air, but the voices weren't singing. A lone peeper peeped. Nuthatches conversed using soft nasal sounds, their version of woods walkietalkies. Ravens croaked just out of sight

through white pines, while the usual onslaught of gray squirrel clucking announced nut hoarding season's first days. I walked to a stream, barely flowing, hardly rippling, where it slid through a meadow surrounded on all sides by forest.

Determined to find its way down to the river, it trickled and waited for more rain to push it along. No gouging of banks at the bends it encountered, no loud gurgle each time it passed over stones smoothed by time. Just a thin silver necklace, catching sunlight and throwing it back.

I basked in that sunshine, feeling warm in light flannel, walking slowly through dense vegetation. Chest-high goldenrod clumps

offered no easy path, nor did brambles and roses all thick from a full growing season. Goldenrod blooms painted everything yellow. Each flower seemed covered with honey bees, bumble bees, beetles in full pollen quest. Walking around them I struck multi-flora. Its thorns tore at my sleeves and bare skin.

And, of course, there were gnats, mindless torture devices. Unaware frost would kill them some fine autumn morning, they wavered about near my eyes carving halfdrunken circles.

Escape to the forest. Keep an eye out for white flashing tails. The first ones I saw were on small sparrow cousins called juncos. The next came from deer, bounding off, looking dark, having lost all their warm rust of summer. One fork-horn I saw had just rubbed off his velvet. Each burnt umber tine glistened smooth.

Then objects commenced falling out of the sky. Plink is the sound acorn pieces make striking hard ground. High above in red oaks, gray squirrels used sharp incisors to access nutmeats in the center. They "chucked" and they "churred", telling other tree rodents this oak stash was not to be shared.

Then, while I watched, not just acorns, but leaves, started falling. The squirrels were severing branch tips that held clumps of leaves and their clusters of acorns. When the coast cleared of humans, the squirrels would descend, finding bounteous food on the ground.

Approaching a white pine, I heard chickadees. I saw titmice as well, flitting here and there through pine branches. But what was that shape, slightly different, more streamlined? A black-and-white warbler combed the trunk of the pine, its needle beak probing curled fragments of bark, seeking insects to fuel its migration this last day of summer.

In recent months we have had numerous "smash and grab" style larcenies from vehicles in the town. The common factor with these larcenies was visibility and availability. Valuables were left exposed in the victim's vehicle and

criminals exploited that opportunity. We would like to emphasize safety and security if and when you do leave valuables in your vehicle. We understand people come straight from work to walk the trail or may do so in between running errands, so we suggest the following if leaving valuables home is not an option. Hide belonging in the trunk, glovebox or center console before arriving at your destination. Many of these crimes are crimes of opportunity. We have seen that individuals will try door handles on any vehicle but generally don't break a window unless valuables are clearly visible (risk v reward). We have also seen a consistent trend where unlocked vehicles are gone through in the middle of the night. We urge the residence of the Town of Vestal to lock their vehicles especially at night. If your vehicle is gone through and nothing is missing, we still ask that you contact us to file a report as soon as possible. Situational awareness is paramount to your safety and the safety of those around you. With that in mind, if you see someone checking vehicles or lurking in parking lots, we urge you to contact us immediately at 607-754-2111 or 911 and keep your distance.

AUTUMN FUN FACTS

- 1. Pumpkin seeds are a superfood! A quarter cup of pumpkin seeds provides 42% of your recommended daily magnesium intake (which keeps your heart and bones healthy, lowers blood pressure and can prevent migraines).
- 2. 30-40 Apples yield one gallon of cider.
- 3. California Hosted the Biggest Corn Mazein 2014, with pathways up to 32 miles long!
- 4. Pumpkins are the most craved food during fall.
- 5. Butterflys are the only insect that migrates up to 2,500 miles for nicer weather.

Golden Bears Win Two More!

The Vestal Girls Swimming & Diving picked up a pair of wins last week. For the first time they won the Johnson City Relay Invitational by capturing 6 of the 12 events. Oneonta captured 4 events with Chenango Valley and Johnson City winning the other two. Vestal's 401 points topped Oneonta's 387 and Maine Endwell's 348. Rounding out the nineteam field were CV, Dryden, Elmira, JC, Union Endicott and Susquehanna Valley.

In the 6-dive event Addie Smith broke the 100-point barrier for the first time giving the Golden Bears their first points finishing 8th. The 1st Golden Bear win came in the 850 Crescendo Freestyle Relay with Sophie Ryan in the leadoff 50, Reagan Young doing a 100 and then Fran Vallone gave Vestal a narrow lead with her 200 leg before Jay Ratterree broke it open for an 8 second victory with her final 500 yard leg. Yih Hui Lim, Ratterree, Young and Vallone came right back to win the 200 Fly by less than a second.

Yih Hui, Young, Mary Sonnen and Ratterree picked up the win in the 200 Free relay with a season best time. Yih Hui, Megan Jones, Sua Choi and Yih Xinn Lim swam to a solid win in the 200 Breast relay, followed by Vallone, Sonnen, Young and Ratterree capturing the 400 Free relay with another season best. Vestal's final win came in the 4x100 IM relay where the Lim sisters, Yih Hui and Yih Xinn, combined with Vallone and Ratterree for a 10 second

Other top Vestal finishes included 3rd in the 400 Medley by Yih Xinn, Jones, Yih Hui and Sonnen; 3rd in the 200 Back by Yih Xinn, Keira DeVantier, Sonnen and Ryan; 4th by the 200 Medley team of Yih Xinn, Jones, Vallone and Ryan, along with 5th in both the 400 (Sonnen, Jones, Choi, DeVantier) and 200 (Yih Hui, Sonnen, Ratterree, Yih Xinn) Fin relays.

With only one official relay allowed in team scoring other Golden Bears who competed in the exhibition relays included: Cora Richtsmeier, Eleanor Davidovich, Jia Parikh, Maya Stankevich, Eva Grenchus, Charlotte Coker and Madeline Herceg.

Coker, Stankevich, Vallone; Last Tuesday the Golden Bears travelled to Elmira where they beat the Elmira Express by a 91-84 final score. Coach Shore was able to mix up the lineup while the team took advantage of competing in the same pool where Class A Sectional swimming preliminaries and diving will be held in early November. The team won 8 of the first 9 events (and were the fastest while swimming exhibition in the final 3) to build an unbeatable 91-46 score after the 200 Free relay.

Sophie Ryan, Yih Xinn and Yih Hui Lim were anchored by Jay Ratterree for a comeback win in the opening Medley relay. Mary Sonnen, Megan Jones and Charlotte Coker had the only 1-2-3 Vestal sweep in the 200 Free, followed by a 1-2 sweep by Reagan Young and Fran Vallone. Other 1-2 sweeps included Ratterree and Sonnen in the 100 Free, Ryan and Coker in the 500, Yih Hui and Young in the Back, along with Yih Xinn and Jones in the Breast.

Olivia Tanton set a new career best coming up 1 point short of the Elmira pool record and 5 short of the 37-year-old Vestal school record. Her 283.45 score is currently the highest 6-dive score in the section and the 2nd highest in New York State (per SwimCloud website). Addie Smith finished 3rd for Vestal.

Other wins and top swims for Vestal were Yih Hui winning the 50 Free along with Vallone and Yih Xinn going 2-3 with best times in the Fly. Sonnen, Vallone, Jia Parikh and Ratterree easily won the 200 Free relay. The exhibition 400 Free relay team of Elinor Davidovich, Ratterree, Sonnen and Yih Hui came from behind to narrowly top both of the other Golden Bear teams as well as the Express. Among those turning in season or career best times were Sonnen, Coker, Young, Keira DeVantier (IM), Yih Hui, Sua Choi and Elinor Davidovich (50), Vallone, Madeline Herceg (100). Eva Grenchus scored her first varsity points in the 100 Free.

It appears it will be another tight meet between the host Spartans and the Golden Bears. The meet will begin with the diving at 9:30 AM and the swimming at 12:30 PM.

Those meets are followed by a couple of weeks of dedicated training before they host Ithaca on Tuesday, October 15th in their final home meet. They finish the dual meet season in late October with away meets at Horseheads and Binghamton. In October their overall team goal of another top-3 Class A sectional in early November will be at the forefront of Coach Shore's training schedule for the team.

Elmira Flexes Its Muscle in Victory Over Vestal

Elmira pounded-out 16 first downs, covering 363 total yards in a 43-21 victory over the Golden Bears of Vestal Friday night at Dick Hoover Stadium.

It was Vestal though who came out roaring, recovering a fumble on the opening kickoff and following it with a 32-yard scamper by Julian Adams around the right end for a touchdown on the next play. Thereafter, it would be the Express taking charge, combining a punishing ground game with effective passing.

Deep in their own territory on their next possession, quarterback Josh Kweller was hit at the goal line, the ball popped up right into an Elmira defender's hands for 6 points. With the two point conversion Elmira took an 8-7 lead, a lead they would never surrender.

The Express would score touchdowns on their next three first half possessions to put up 28 points by intermission. Vestal would temporarily draw within two at 16-14 in the second quarter, when Kweller hit J.T. Gannon near the right sideline who ran it in from 24 yards out.

Down 28-14 to start the third quarter, Vestal took the kickoff and rolled-off four first downs, moving the ball down to the Elmira 17-yard line. However, a personal foul moved the ball back 15 yards and Kweller was intercepted on the next play.

Elmira then did what they do best, control the ball, eat the clock and score. The Express assembled a 13-play, 89-yard drive to extend their lead to 36-14. Later, the in the fourth quarter they marched 50 yards on ten plays to make it 43-14.

Vestal's final score was set-up by a 59-yard toss-and-catch over the middle to J.T. Gannon. Adams would take it in on the next play from 5-yards out. Sophomore Preston Antesburger converted all three extra point kicks.

Sophomore quarterback Josh Kweller and junior J.T. Gannon would top the 100-yard passing/receiving mark for the third straight game. Kweller completed 12-of-14 passes for 141 yards and one touchdown; Gannon grabbed four passes for 107 yards and a TD.

Junior Julian Adams finished with 91 yards on 18 attempts with 2 TDs. J.T. Gannon and sophomore Cayden Kitchen led the Bears with 10 tackles.

Next up for the Golden Bears: the Johnson City Wildcats at Dick Hoover Stadium Friday night.

You can find our Wonderbooks in the Youth Services Department near the audiobooks on CD. This collection was made possible by a Four County Library System Mini-Grant.


