Give Thanks—Reduce Wasted Food and **Compost Your Food Scraps**

As many give thanks with family and friends this November, be thankful for our environment too by taking actions to protect and preserve our natural resources. Help by reducing wasted food, composting your food scraps, and leaving leaves on the lawn.

Reduce Wasted Food Plan Ahead

- Plan appropriate serving sizes based on the number of guests.
- Make a grocery list and stick to it as much as possible. Making a list can help to minimize trips to the grocery store and reduce fuel use.

Choosing Your Ingredients

- Include a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables in your menu. These foods provide nutrition and often result in little waste because they have little, or no packaging, and any waste typically is compostable.
- Learn to love the peels. For even more nutrition, flavor, and less waste—don't peel items such as apples, potatoes, and carrots before cooking.
- Use imperfect produce in cooked dishes, such as bruised apples for apple pie.
- Make desserts simple. Pumpkin and apple pies are popular choices. Remember to compost peels and parts you do not use. Pumpkin seeds can be toasted for a tasty seasonal snack.

Leftovers

- Save any leftover food for future meals. Either freeze or plan to use soon. Look up recipes for a turkey soup which can make good use of any leftover meat or veg-
- Place any leftovers in the front of the refrigerator to ensure they get eaten first. Choose reusable containers for anything you may choose to freeze.
- Ask guests to bring their own reusable containers, or let them borrow your own, to share any leftovers.

- Consider starting a home composting system if you do not have one already. For some, vermicomposting (using worms) may be a good option.
- Learn what can and cannot be composted. For example, turkey and other meat bones do not go in the compost pile.
- · If available in your area, consider a curbside food scraps pick-up service or food scraps drop-off pro-
- Keep an eye out for pumpkin and other composting events in your community.

Recycle Right

- · Know before you throw. Start by checking your municipality's recycling rules or those provided by your recycling hauler.
- Glassware and ceramic dishes should not go into your home recycling bin. Drinking glasses, dinnerware, and baking dishes, whether whole or in pieces, should not be put in your home recycling bin. However, glass items like empty food jars are usually acceptable to put in your home recycling bin.
- Recycle metal cans and plastic bottles. You might also have steel cans from cranberry sauce or jugs and bottles of juice and milk. Empty metal cans and empty plastic bottles and jugs can also typically go in your home recycling bin.
- Leave the liquids behind. Show your thanks for recycling and recycling workers by making sure food scraps and liquids are not disposed of in your recycling bin.
- And the soiled pie pans too. Soiled disposable foil bakeware and pans, such as those used for pies, casseroles, and breads, should not go in your recycling bin.

Make the Most of **Your Leaves**

Make good use of fallen leaves—save them for compost of mulch

- Mulch your leaves in place. Shred your leaves with a lawn mower and leave them on your lawn. It's faster and easier than raking or leaf blowing and adds nutrients to the soil.
- Add shredded leaves to your garden and landscaping. Shredded leaves can be used as mulch to help prevent weeds and keep moisture in the soil. The leaves will also slowly release nutrients into the soil.
- Save your leaves for composting. Fall allows us to collect and store a great carbon-rich source for our compost pile and that's leaves! Leaves balance out nitrogen-rich materials in your pile like food scraps and grass clippings. One of the biggest challenges to composting food scraps at home is the release of water into your compost pile as the food breaks down. One of the best ways to fix this is to add leaves every time you add food scraps (Compost tip: shredded leaves absorb water better than whole leaves). Learn more about home composting.
- Insulate your compost bin for the winter. Place leaves around and on top of your compost bin. This will insulate your bin and allow the material to continue to break down throughout the winter. In the spring, you will have fresh compost without waiting for your pile to thaw out, and the leaves can be added to your spring compost pile.

Traffic Safety- Following Too Closely



Rear end collisions are generally avoidable and can often be attributed to driver inattention due to cellphone use or other in car distractions. Another leading cause of rear end collisions is following too closely. When you follow too closely or tailgate another vehicle you are severely limiting your reaction time if something happens ahead of you on the road.

A general rule of thumb is the "3 second rule" meaning it should take you 3 seconds to reach the vehicle in front of you. The way you can measure this is by picking a stationary point on the road such as a sign or tree that the vehicle ahead of you is passing and then count to 3 while you approach that object. If you reach that object before you count to 3 you should slow down to allow for more space between vehicles. You can use this as a rough measure to keep proper distance between you and the vehicle ahead of you allowing adequate reaction time if that vehicle suddenly stops. While this is a general rule of thumb, we would encourage you to leave more distance at higher speeds as indicated in the photos.

When you are operating a heavier vehicle or following a motorcycle or bicycle you should allow for more time between you and the vehicle in front of you due to the differences in braking distances.

- (a) The driver of a motor vehicle shall not follow another vehicle more closely than is reasonable and prudent, having due regard for the speed of such vehicles and the traffic upon and the condition of the highway.



following another motor truck or motor vehicle drawing another vehicle shall, whenever conditions permit, leave sufficient space so that an overtaking vehicle may enter and occupy such space without danger, except that this shall not prevent a motor truck or motor vehicle drawing another vehicle from overtaking and passing any like vehicle or other vehicle

(c) Motor vehicles being driven upon any roadway outside of a business or residence district in a caravan or motorcade whether or not towing other vehicles shall be so operated as to allow sufficient space between each such vehicle or combination of vehicles so as to enable any other vehicle to enter and occupy such space without danger. This provision shall not apply to funeral processions.

What Are the Penalties for Tailgating in NY?

Fine: Drivers convicted of tailgating (following too closely) in New York can be fined up to \$150 for a first offense. A second offense in 18 months raises the maximum fine to \$300 and a third offense in 18 months can mean a fine of up to \$450.

Points: Following too closely (tailgating) is a 4-point offense in New York. This makes it one of the higher-point traffic violations in the state.

Surcharge: A conviction or guilty plea for following too closely in New York obligates a driver to pay a state surcharge of either \$88, or \$93, depending on where he/she was ticketed.

Vestal Science Olympiad Competes In Ithaca

On Saturday, November 16th, Vestal's two Science Olympiad Teams competed in Ithaca against 59 other teams at their first in person Science Olympiad Invitational of the year, hosted by Cornell University. This is Cornell Science Olympiad's 10th year hosting an Invitational and it has become one of the most competitive events in the area. Schools from all over the East Coast travel to attend. Our students took home individual event medals, in three events. Vestal CSD 2024 Capital Project Proposals

The Vestal CSD 2024 Capital Project Proposals, which total \$39,435,000, include:

Installation of Full Air Conditioning System at Clayton Avenue Elementary, Vestal Hills, Elementary and Vestal High School.

This will provide an equitable classroom experience for all students, better focus for students and teachers and yearround use of spaces.

Installation of Lights on Sammon Field.

This will allow the increased use of Sammon Field, especially in the evening hours, as well as provide the HS Marching Band with a safe space to practice. As of now, they practice in the HS parking lot.

High School Auditorium Upgrades.

Once the current upgrades are completed, the anticipated work to be done includes an upgraded sound system and improved stage lighting.

Stadium Video Scoreboard.

The replacement of the stadium scoreboard with a video scoreboard will enhance video capabilities used during sporting events and special "nights', such as the Golden Circle of Bands and Cancer Awareness and Suicide Prevention Nights. The current scoreboard's controllers' connection fails intermittently. If not included in the Capital Project and the existing board fails, the replacement cost would not be eligible for state aid.

The 2024 Capital Project does not include a transportation facility proposal.

The 2024 Capital Project Hearing is on December 3, 2024, 5:00 p.m., at Clayton Avenue Elementary.

The 2024 Captial Project Vote is on December 10, 2024, Noon-8:00 p.m., at the Central Junior Building Gym.

Great Girls Season Wraps Up at State Championships

Coaches Joe Shore and Sara Rostedt and the entire senior class of the Vestal Golden Bear Swimming and Diving team were able to reflect with pride on the 2024 season as they celebrated their season this past weekend. The team had the most dual meet wins since 2013 with their 7-2 record which included an undefeated 4-0 record to capture their 2nd consecutive STAC Metro Division title. Their post-season accomplishments included a 4th place finish at Class A sectionals and concluded this weekend with their first state meet competitors since 2019.

Senior Jay Ratterree matched her season best time from Sectionals in the state 500 Free preliminaries and finished 34th in her first and only state meet appearance as the only Section 4 representative in the event. 8th grader Olivia Tanton was one six Section 4 divers. After a slow start on her first couple of dives she moved from 32nd place up to 25th place after five dives. Unfortunately, that left her a half point and one place short of making the cut to continue, so she finished 25th among the 39 divers. Section 4 senior divers Madison Morris of ME and Kaelyn Katchuk of Owego finished 4th and 9th respectively in the highest Section 4 individual finishes of the meet. The Waverly 200 Free relay finished 6th and their Medley relay 8th in the only other Section 4 championship final races.

As a team the Golden Bears captured six STAC All Star berths and a pair of Class A titles. Individually the season concludes with two individuals and a relay earning spots in the All-Time (going back to 1971 when the first girls swim team was formed) Vestal Top-10. Ratterree finishes her Vestal career as #7 in the 200 Free and #5 in the 500 Free. Her career included a pair of Class A 500 Free titles. She anchored the 200 Free relay team with Yih Hui Lim, Reagan Young, Mary Sonnen who turned in the 5th fastest time in Vestal history which knocked the 2002 team of Collen Scannell, Stephani Furminger, Julia Boisvert and Daniella Borrelli out of the Top-10.

One of the season highlights was the success of 8th grader Tanton in the diving. She improved by nearly 90 points to break the 1987 school record for 6 dives of 3-time NYS champion Missy Urbanic with a score of 304.20, becoming the first Vestal diver to break the 300-point barrier. That score establishes her as #7 All Time in Section 4 history. Her gold medal sectional score for 11 dives moves her to #2 on the Vestal Top-10 and #22 in the Section 4 All Time Top-25.

At the banquet the coaches looked to next season as they return four of their six STAC All Stars including junior Fran Vallone, freshman Yih Hui, 7th grader Yih Xinn and Tanton, while Ratterree and Young will graduate as repeat All-Stars. Those four returning All-Stars, along with 8th grader Sophie Ryan and sophomore diver Addie Smith will provide a core of six athletes who earned a spot and scored in the sectional championships and are ranked in the final Section 4, STAC or Class A rankings. Seven seniors (Megan Jones, Young, Ratterree, Sonnen, Anne Coleman, Charlotte Coker and Sua Choi) along with the six underclassmen earned spots in the final rankings. Highlights included #1 Freshmen (or younger) rankings for Tanton (6-dives) and Yih Hui (IM).

The Golden Bears are led by senior captains Harrison Cappellett, Ben Elie and Logan Kim, who are all ranked in the section Top-25 in the Section 4 pre-season rankings. Other veterans who earned either Section 4 Overall Top-25 or STAC Top-25 preseason rankings are David Cozma, Ben Hutchings and Sayum Singhal. Other veterans who are in the Class A Top-25 preseason rankings are: Finn Hynes, Lucas Matt, Cameron Smith, Luke Sobel and Michael Xue.


