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


Second-grade classes at Palmer Elementary hosted caregivers for a learning celebration!

2025-2026 Windsor Central School District's Universal Pre-kindergarten Program for 3PK and 4PK Students



Applications are now being accepted for the 2025-2026 Universal Prekindergarten Program (4PK and 3PK) in the Windsor Central School District. The program is free for Windsor school district residents.

To be eligible for 4PK, a student must be 4 years old on or before December 1, 2025. To be eligible for 3PK, a student must be 3 years old on or before December 1, 2025. All students must meet New York State immunization requirements.

If interested, please visit our website (www.windsor-csd.org) and follow the Universal Prekindergarten program link under Programs or contact Amy Barton at 607-655-8216 for assistance.

Students will be placed through a lottery, as required by the New York State Education Department guidelines. Pre-K students will attend either the 3PK or 4PK program in the school zone where they live. If that class is full, students will attend the next closest building.

All plans for 2025-2026 UPK program are tentative and depend on receiving enough funding from the State Education Department.

Ambler Earns New York State Senate Commendation Award

Asia Ambler, who works in the Windsor Central School District as the Rural School Mental Health Site Supervisor at Binghamton University Community Schools (BUCS), has earned the New York State Senate Commendation Award. She was one of four people NYS Senator Lea Webb honored for their work in the community in recognition of Black History Month.

“I’ve worked in youth development since I was a teen. I’m passionate about it. I’ve worked with Senator Webb in prior roles that she’s had. I’ve done a lot of community work supporting families and youth,” said Ambler.

In Windsor, Ambler oversees Binghamton University’s social work interns and coordinates mental health initiatives such as Chalk the Walk, family engagement events, and home visits to welcome new families to Windsor.

She’s created the drop-in space at Windsor Central High School, where students can speak with a counselor about any issues they have. Ambler also connects Windsor students with Binghamton University students for various reasons, including social-emotional support.


Ambler learned of the opportunity to work in Windsor through BUCS while at Cornell Cooperative Extension, where she spent over 10 years running community-based education programs.

“If I’m going to be serious about serving all kids, I know that rural communities are really underserved,” said Ambler. “It’s important to work not just in the Black community but also where I’m the only Black face in the room. I think diversity is important. It’s good to have another voice in the room. Building community is important and it transcends all of our identities.”

In addition to the New York State Senate Commendation Award, Ambler won the Black Excellence Youth Advocate Award in 2022, was named one of the Next Generation of Leaders in Afterschool by the National Afterschool Association in 2020, and worked as part of numerous initiatives to support at-risk youth, and address and reduce poverty.

In Windsor, Ambler is learning more about an area different from the ones she’s served before.

“I’ve learned the power of rural communities comes from within. People here take care of their community, and I admire that, especially as a Black American knowing how often you rely on the people around you to grow. I appreciate being welcomed into Windsor and seeing the amazing work they do, how they leverage their resources, never give up on their kids, and invest back into their community,” said Ambler.

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


LOCAL LAW NO. 1 OF THE YEAR 2025

A LOCAL LAW AMENDING CHAPTER 48-SEWER INSTALLATION AND USE LAW

Be it enacted by the Town Board of the Town of Windsor as follows:

Section 1. Purpose

A. The purpose of this local law is to amend sections of Chapter 48, Article I "Sewer Installation and Use Law" as follows:

1. Section 48-3, titled "Permits" shall be amended as follows:

A. Repealed and replaced with the following:

No person, firm or corporation shall make an excavation in a public street or sewer district easement for the purpose of connecting a lateral sanitary sewer with trunk sewer, and no person, firm or corporation shall connect a lateral sewer line with a trunk line, without first having applied for and received a permit from the inspector, allowing such excavation and allowing said connection to the trunk line at the place indicated on the permit. Permit fees shall be set by resolution of the Town Board from time to time. All work shall be so conducted as to comply with all Local, State, and Federal ordinances, laws, and regulations. A written permit shall be obtained from the Superintendent of Highways before working on any Town street or highway that has been accepted for maintenance by the Town or in any case where required by the "Ordinance Covering Excavations in Town Streets and Highways" or any other Town Ordinance or local law, as specified in the



TRAFFIC SAFETY- PASSING

When driving in New York State, it's essential to exercise caution and follow proper passing techniques to ensure the safety of yourself and others on the road. According to the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles, drivers should always check their mirrors and blind spots before passing, and make sure it's safe to do so. When passing, drivers should signal their intention to pass by using their turn signal and then move into the passing lane. It's crucial to maintain a safe speed and distance from the vehicle being passed, and to avoid cutting off other drivers. Additionally, drivers should be aware of potential hazards such as pedestrians, bicyclists, and road debris, and adjust their passing techniques accordingly. By following these guidelines, drivers can help prevent accidents and ensure a safe and smooth flow of traffic.


One broken line:

You can pass other vehicles or change lanes if you can do so safely without interfering with traffic.



Solid line with broken line:

If you are on the side with the solid line, you cannot pass other vehicles or go across the line except to make a left turn into a driveway. If you are on the side with the broken line, you can pass if it is safe to and you will not interfere with traffic.



Double solid lines:

You can not pass or change lanes. You cannot go across the lines except to turn left to enter or leave the highway (e.g., to or from a driveway or to do a U-turn see Chapter 5).



One solid line:

You can pass other vehicles or change lanes, but you can only do so when obstructions in the road or traffic conditions make it necessary.

The left lane is normally used to pass other vehicles. You



cannot pass a vehicle on the left if:

Your lane has a solid yellow center line.

You cannot safely return to the right lane before you reach a solid yellow center line for the right lane.

You cannot safely return to the right lane before any oncoming vehicle comes within 200 feet (60 m) of you.

You approach a curve or the top of a hill on a two-way

road and cannot see around or over it.

You are within 100 feet (30 m) of a railroad crossing on a two-way roadway.

You are within 100 feet (30 m) of a bridge, tunnel or viaduct on a two-way road and your view is obstructed.

If you try to pass, you will interfere with oncoming traffic.

Vehicle & Traffic Law Section 1122

Overtaking a vehicle on the left

The following rules shall govern the overtaking and passing of vehicles proceeding in the same direction, subject to those limitations, exceptions, and special rules herein-after stated:

(a) The driver of a vehicle overtaking another vehicle proceeding in the same direction shall pass to the left thereof at a safe distance and shall not again drive to the right side of the roadway until safely clear of the overtaken vehicle.

(b) Except when overtaking and passing on the right is permitted, the driver of an overtaken vehicle shall give way to the right in favor of the overtaking vehicle on audible signal and shall not increase the speed of his vehicle until completely passed by the overtaking vehicle

Vehicle & Traffic Law Section 1124

Limitations on overtaking on the left

No vehicle shall be driven to the left side of the center of the roadway in overtaking and passing another vehicle proceeding in the same direction unless authorized by the provisions of this chapter and unless such left side is clearly visible and is free of oncoming traffic for a sufficient distance ahead to permit such overtaking and passing to be completely made without interfering with the operation of any vehicle approaching from the opposite direction or any vehicle overtaken. In every event the overtaking vehicle must return to an authorized lane of travel as soon as practicable and in the event the passing movement involves the use of a lane authorized for vehicles approaching from the opposite direction, before coming within two hundred feet of any approaching vehicle.

Vehicle & Traffic Law Section 1125

Further limitations on driving to left of center of roadway

(a) No vehicle shall at any time be driven to the left side of the roadway under the following conditions:

1. When approaching the crest of a grade or upon a curve in the highway where the driver's view is obstructed within such distance as to create a hazard in the event another vehicle might approach from the opposite direction;

2. When approaching within one hundred feet of or traversing any railroad grade crossing;

3. When the view is obstructed upon

approaching within one hundred feet of any bridge, viaduct, or tunnel.

(b) The foregoing limitations shall not apply upon a one-way roadway nor to a vehicle in any lane which is at the time allocated exclusively to traffic moving in the direction the vehicle is proceeding and is marked to give notice of such allocation.


No-passing zones

(a) When official markings are in place indicating those portions of any highway where overtaking and passing or driving to the left of such markings would be especially hazardous, no driver of a vehicle proceeding along such highway shall at any time drive on the left side of such markings.

(b) The foregoing limitations shall not apply to the driver of a vehicle turning left while entering or leaving such highway.

(c) Where a two-way left turn lane or a paved and clearly traversable dividing section separates the travel lanes for traffic proceeding in opposite directions, the foregoing limitation shall not apply to the driver of a vehicle traveling within such lane or section for such distance as is required for safety in preparing to turn left leaving such highway or in completing a left turn entering such highway.

Town of Windsor Highway Construction Standards All permits shall be issued to the owner of the premises who shall be responsible for compliance with this Ordinance. All such connections shall be made in conformity with this Ordinance and under the supervision of the Inspector.

2. Add New Section 48-4(A) titled “Connections, Laterals” as follows:

§ 48-4(A). Connections; Laterals.

The connection of the building sewer to the public sewer system shall be made at the property line. The property owner is responsible for the installation and maintenance of the building sewer from the structure to the property line, including any portion extending to the curb. If a lateral connection to the public sewer trunk line has not previously been provided, the sanitary sewer district will construct the lateral from the property line to the trunk line upon receipt of a written application from the property owner. The cost of constructing the lateral from the property line to the trunk line shall be borne by the sanitary sewer district. The Inspector is responsible for ensuring compliance with respect to the lateral connection to the trunk line. The sanitary sewer district is responsible for the maintenance of the lateral sanitary sewer connection from the property line to the trunk line. The method of connection of the lateral to the public sewer will depend on the type of sewer material used and, in all cases, shall be subject to approval by the Inspector. Improper or unauthorized installation of laterals from the trunk line to the property line by a property owner, which causes repairs to become necessary or interferes with the main sewer lines, will result in the proper installation of the lateral from the trunk line to the property line being at the expense of the property owner. Proper installation of the lateral shall be done by the district and shall comply with the standards defined elsewhere in this chapter. The property owner is responsible for securing all necessary permits for the connection and street excavations.

Section 2. Authority

This local law is enacted pursuant to the provisions of New York’s Town Law and Municipal Home Rule Law.

Section 3. Separability.

The provisions of this local law are separable and if any provision, clause, sentence, subsection, word or part thereof is held illegal, invalid, unconstitutional, or inapplicable to any person or circumstance, such illegality, invalidity or unconstitutionality, or inapplicability shall not affect or impair any of the remaining provisions, clauses, sentences, subsections, words, or parts of this local law or their application to other persons or circumstances. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent that this local law would have been adopted if such illegal, invalid, or unconstitutional provision, clause, sentence, subsection, word or part had not been included therein, and as if such person or circumstance, to which the local law or part thereof is held inapplicable, had been specifically exempt therefrom.

Section 4. Repealer.

All ordinances, local Laws and parts thereof inconsistent with the Local Law are hereby repealed; specifically, Section 48-3 is repealed in its entirety.

Section 5. Effective Date.

This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the office of the New York State Secretary of State in accordance with Section 27 of the Municipal Home Rule Law of the State of New York.

LOCAL LAW NO. 2 OF THE YEAR 2025

A LOCAL LAW AMENDING CHAPTER 64-MOBILE HOMES AND TRAILERS

Be it enacted by the Town Board of the Town of Windsor as follows:

Section 1. Purpose

B. The purpose of this local law is to amend sections of Chapter 64, “Mobile Homes and Trailers” as follows:

1. This title of this Chapter shall now be “Mobile Homes, Recreational Vehicle Parks and Campgrounds.

2. In the initial list of enumerated sections, § 64-22 shall now be titled “Campground requirements.”

3. The following definitions shall be added to § 64-2, “Definitions and word usage:”

a. CAMPING – Overnight occupancy by visitors of facilities or space.

b. CAMPGROUND – Any parcel or tract of land including buildings or other structures, under the control of any person(s), corporation, limited liability corporation or like organization, where five (5) or more campsites are available for temporary or seasonal overnight occupancy.

c. CAMPING CABIN – A hard sided, fully enclosed structure constructed for habitation on a temporary basis and is part of a campground. Cabins may be of rudimentary rough construction or may be framed in the same manner as a single-family dwelling with or without kitchen and/or bathroom facilities as per the New York State Building Codes.

d. CAMPING CABIN CLUSTERS – A site layout of two (2) to six (6) camping cabins grouped on one campsite and sharing common public areas including but

Town of Colesville Offices



The Town of Colesville lies in the northeast part of Broome County and is bounded on the north by Chenango County, on the east by the Town of Sanford, on the south by the Town of Windsor, and on the west by the Towns of Kirkwood and Fenton. The town was formed on April 3, 1821, from the Town of Windsor. Harpursville is the largest hamlet in the town although it is not incorporated.

Colesville derives its name from pioneer Nathaniel Cole, a revolutionary soldier. He settled here in 1795, on a hill south of Harpursville, known as Coles Hill. He built a tavern there which was in operation as early as 1800. It was the first tavern between Albany and Binghamton. Broome County’s Nathaniel Cole Park was opened in the town in 1974 and is located about two miles from the site of its namesake’s tavern.



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
