## Water issue results in major changes at WSC

*Editor's note: The following is information provided by Wayne State College in connection with a number of water issues the college has dealt with in recent weeks. This information was provided to all students and staff as classes resumed this week.*

"Welcome back to campus. I hope you all had a restful break and had the opportunity to enjoy time with family and friends. As we begin the semester, I wanted to provide our campus community with information regarding some unfortunate incidents that occurred in late December and acknowledge the work of the campus community in handling each situation," said WSC President Dr. Marysz Rames.

"Winter weather challenges on campus due to high winds and subzero temperatures prior to Christmas led to frozen and



broken pipes and property damage in various buildings. Water line breaks began on Dec. 22 in the attic of Berry Hall, struck again at the College Center in South Sioux City on Dec. 24, hit Gardner Hall and Carhart Science on Dec. 25, struck Anderson Hall on Dec. 26, and hit Carhart Science again on Dec. 27," Dr. Rames said.

Here is the summary of each of the water line breaks that occurred during December:

Dec. 22: A water line break in the attic of the west wing of Berry Hall resulted in water running down onto the floors below. Damages included insulation in the attic, ceiling tiles, mattresses in some student rooms, and some student property. Another small break occurred at the radiant heater in the north vestibule, resulting in wet carpet on the main level and wet tile flooring and furniture on the lower level.

Dec. 24: A fire sprinkler line break at the College Center building on Christmas Eve resulted in water damage to ceiling tiles and drywall. Water lines to the building were turned off and a contractor was called to repair the line.

Dec. 25: Christmas Day brought a hydrant break inside the wall cavity at Gardner Hall, with minimal water in the building and minimal damage. A fire sprinkler line also broke on Dec. 25 in Carhart Science Building. This incident occurred near the southwest entrance which resulted in water damage on the first and ground floors. Ceiling tiles, carpet, drywall, electrical, elevator, and fire alarm devices were

all affected by this event.

Dec. 26: The most significant water line break occurred on this date in Anderson Hall. Pipes broke in at least eight locations in the attic of Anderson Hall. This resulted in widespread water damage in the attic and all four student living floors. Water damage included wet insulation in the attic, damaged ceiling tiles, wet mattresses, and furniture. Student property was also affected. The College contracted with ServPro for cleanup and restoration. ServPro arrived on site that same day to assess and start a more thorough cleaning and recovery.

As work progressed in Anderson Hall late last week, the situation on the third floor of the building made clear the need to move the residents from that floor to either another floor in the hall or to another residence hall. Students were notified via phone calls to those living on the third floor and via email for the remainder of the building.

Shutting down the third floor of Anderson Hall for the spring 2023 semester will provide continued access to the attic and affected areas for ServPro contractors. The basement, first, and second floors have been cleaned, restored, and sanitized. Students' belongings have been cleaned if they were affected by water and have been returned to their rooms.

Unfortunately, some items have been declared non-salvageable by the contractor. These items are available for the students to inspect. Finally, the logistics associated with this effort were complex. We continue to work with students to locate any items that have not been returned to their rooms. Anderson Hall residents who were moved to a new hall or a new room in Anderson will receive a 25 percent discount on the new room for the spring 2023 semester (based on the price for that particular hall). Those residents who remain in Anderson in their original assigned room also will receive a 10 percent discount on their room rate for the spring 2023 semester.

Dec. 27: A water line leading to a sink on the second floor of the Carhart Science building broke in at least three locations. This resulted in water damage on the second, first, and ground floors.

"In each instance, Wayne State's incredible Facilities Services crews, Network and Technology Services workers, Carhart Science faculty, Residence Life and Housing personnel, and Campus Security officers met the situation head on by directly working to remove water from affected areas, restore water service, preserve College and student property, repair network access, communicate with affected students, and secure the buildings. I want to personally thank each of these committed WSC employees who rallied during the intense cold over the holidays. Your work made a difference," Dr. Rames said.

Wayne State employees and contractors continue to work to fully restore affected areas on campus. I will provide additional details to campus as needed to keep you up to date on our progress.

## Resolution passed moving bond issue forward

Numerous items were on the agenda when the Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education met for the first time in 2023 on Monday.

Taking up the majority of the meeting were items connected to the proposed facility project the district has been working toward for some time.

Superintendent Dr. Mark Lenihan shared a power point with plans for the Early Childhood Center for Pre-K through second grade, extra classrooms to be added to the high school and work to be done throughout the junior-senior high school.

Dr. Lenihan told the board that the facilities committee "has spent lots of time looking at options" and noted there "is still some work to do."

Jay Spearman with Piper Sandler spoke

to the board on the cost of the project, which is \$27.5 million with a total bond request of \$27,945,000.

He said that based on the district's valuation, this would result in an increased tax levy of 12.90 cents per \$100 in valuation. He recommended obtaining two bonds for the project to allow for cost savings should

interest rates go down.

Spearman also shared a sample ballot which would go before the voters at a March 14, 2023 election. He told the board that the district has to give notice 50 days before the election and that the resolution calling for the special election needs to be sent to the Election Commissioner. It is anticipated that the election will be a mail-in election; however, the Election Commissioner makes the decision on whether in-person voting takes place or all votes are cast by mail.

Spearman talked about the school's responsibilities in regard to the election and noted that no school resources can be spent on promoting the passage of a bond.

Instead, he encouraged all to "focus on the facts" in regard to what the bond entails.

Following discussion, board members unanimously approved a Special Bond Election Resolution calling for the election to take place March 14, 2023.

Board members accepted the resignation of sixth grade teacher Joyce Hoskins, effective at the end of the school year. Hoskins has been teaching in the Wayne district for 33 years.

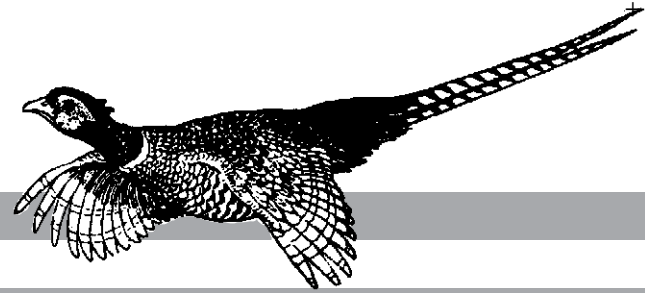

Following her time as an elementary student at Cedar County Rural School District 99, Marguerite graduated from Hartington High School in 1946. She went on to earn her teaching certificate from Nebraska State Teachers College in Wayne. With her love of learning, she also attended Greeley State Teachers College in Greeley, Colorado, and South Dakota Teachers College in Spearfish, South Dakota. She often spoke of knowing that she wanted to be a teacher when she was a young girl. To the dismay of her younger siblings, she made them "play school" in the corner during the hot Nebraska summers when other students could put lessons behind them. Marguerite loved her time teaching in rural Cedar County schools and elementary school in Laurel. She enjoyed keeping in touch and hearing from her students throughout their lives. An avid reader, she instilled a love of books in all of her children, who went on to grow their own appreciation of education.

Marguerite met Warren Stage when she taught kindergarten in Laurel. They were married June 6, 1954 at Trinity Lutheran Church in Hartington. Together, they lived and raised their family on a farm northwest of Laurel. She had a deep connection to farming and the feel of her hands in dirt. Her flower gardens were a cascade of color from peonies, roses, lilies, and daisies. She spoke of how the sweet smell of lilacs and plum blossoms took her back to her childhood. Marguerite raised a garden every year and could be found in roadside bushes picking chokecherries in the summer to later make jelly. She relished the process of growing, cooking, and canning for family and neighbors.

As an active member of the United Presbyterian Church, Marguerite sang in the choir, taught Sunday school, served as a deacon, an elder, and was President of the United Presbyterian Women. She was also a member of the coordinating team for the women of Homestead Presbytery. Marguerite was a dedicated student of the Bible, and sought opportunities to expand her learnings in faith, share her beliefs, and serve as an example of God. With her ever-present sense of humor, Marguerite volunteered for Clown Ministries, dressing up as "Annabelle" to visit those in need of a smile and hope in hospitals and nursing homes. She enjoyed working with young people outside of teaching as well. Marguerite was a Den Mother for Cub Scouts, a 4-H Leader, and was a Superintendent at the Cedar County Fair for many years. Marguerite contributed to the Laurel community in many ways. She was one of the editors of the Laurel Centennial book in 1993, was named Citizen of the Year in 1996, and delivered Meals on Wheels well into her 80s. She was a ready volunteer to drive someone to a medical visit or check on a friend in need. She loved history and telling stories as well as the adventure of travel. Some of her highlights included visiting the home where her father grew up in Denmark; seeing the Passion Play in Oberammergau, Germany; visiting other areas of Europe and Thailand; and regular trips across the country to visit her children, extended family, and friends.

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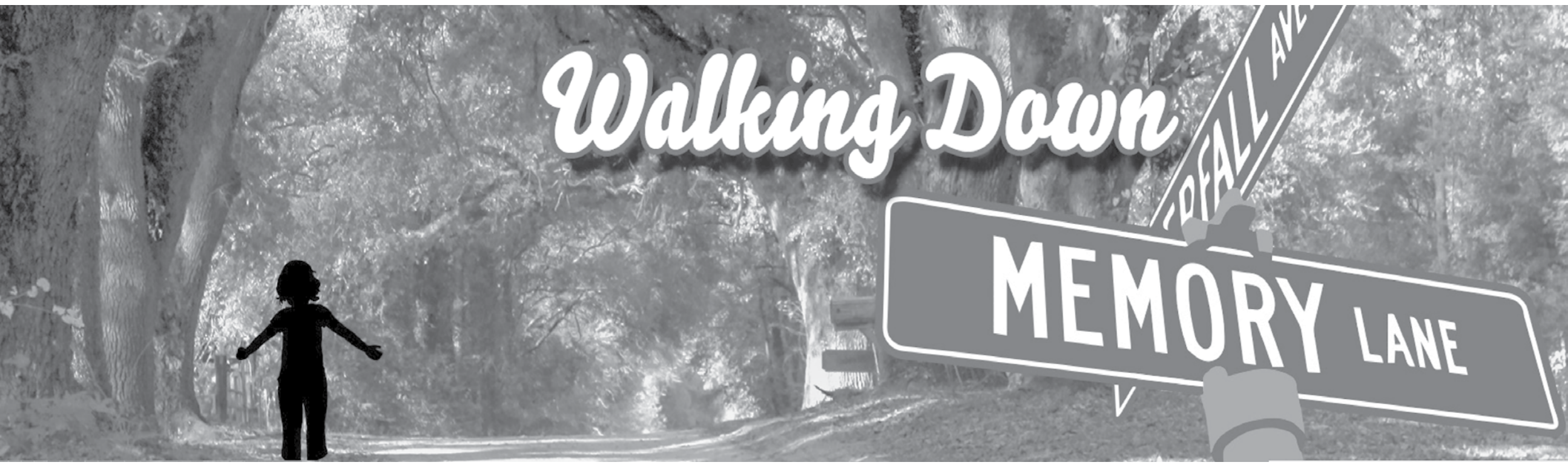

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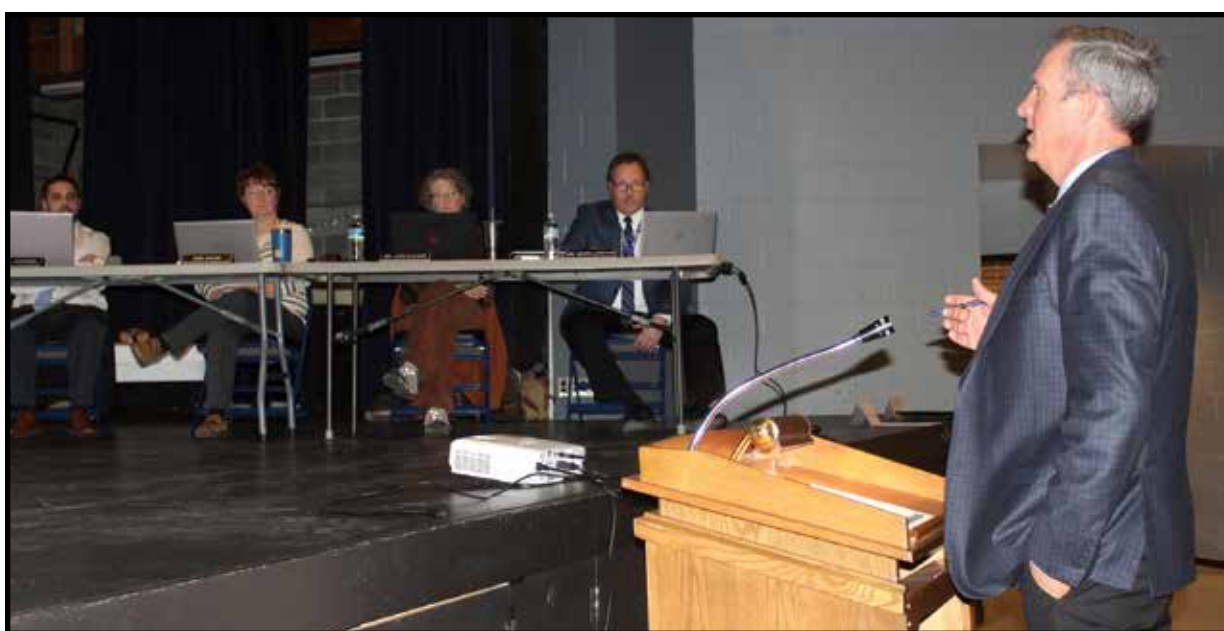

 Board members approved the negotiated agreement with the Wayne Education Association (WEA) for the 2023-2024 school year. It raises the base salary from \$38,000 to

\$38,800 for the 186 day contract and adds language to include compensation changes for teaching summer school.  
 Board members noted the "process went well and there was good conversation during the negotiations."

# Partisanship on the line, urban-rural divide too?

There's been a lot of talk about preserving the officially non-partisan nature of the Nebraska Legislature. But there is another issue, occasionally discussed with similar zeal in years past, that's creeping up again.  
 (Gasp!) It's the urban-rural split. While the focus has been on party loyalty - there are 32 Republicans and 17 Democrats in the officially nonpartisan Legislature - there are also 26 "urban" lawmakers (18 from Omaha and 8 from Lincoln) to just 23 "rural" senators. That reflects the shift of two rural districts, 49 and 36) to the Omaha metro area in the past four years.  
 District 49 was moved from the upper Panhandle to the Gretna area in 2018 and attorney Andrew La Grone was appointed to be the Senator. He was defeated two years later by current Senator Jen Day. Then, just last year, redistricting moved Central Nebraska's District 36 to Bellevue when term-limited Sen. Matt Williams of Gothenburg offered the district number to easily solve the problem.

Yes, the population center of the state has, as predicted, shifted toward the east end. But it hasn't created much of a floor fight so far. Redistricting debate coincides with the taking of the census.

Urban-rural discussion could surface this year as lawmakers, at the urging of Governor Jim Pillen and a special committee he has appointed, start digging into school finance. The urban-rural divide is huge in that arena with sparsely populated schools needing more resources while urban schools sometimes suffer a loss of state aid under some proposed finance schemes.

I don't want to encourage the debate, but in more than 40 years of observing the Legislature I have seen my share of such nastiness. Criminal justice reform is another area that could trigger the issue. After all, the common belief is that most of the criminals are in Lincoln and Omaha and the prisons are mostly in the eastern part of the state.

Comments made recently by the Department of Corrections interim director indicate even if the state builds a new prison, they may need a second one to handle the nation's worst overcrowding. Potential sites have been evaluated in Fremont, Omaha and Lincoln. It's a costly issue.

"If there's not some meaningful prison reform - which by the way will make our communities safer - then we're looking at spending half a billion dollars to accommodate our prison population to the year 2030," retiring State Sen. Steve Lathrop of Omaha said. Lathrop headed the Judiciary Committee and was the primary advocate for measures that would include alternative sentencing and programming.

Then-Governor Pete Ricketts said the measure was "soft on crime." His law-and-order partner, then-Attorney General Doug Peterson agreed and pushed the "lock 'em up" mentality, with the help of Lincoln Senator Suzanne Geist. That ultimately stalled the Lathrop-supported bill through a filibuster.

Geist, who represents southeast Lincoln, said she'll focus on issues affecting law enforcement and the Nebraska Department of Correctional Services as she moves into her final two years in the Legislature.

She said she also plans to sponsor legislation that seeks to enact some of the criminal justice reforms sought in the sweeping package that she helped derail. She was part of a panel that engaged with the nonprofit Crime and Justice Institute to develop the recommendations.

Her opposition centered on concerns about softening sentencing for minor drug crimes so judges could order inmates to serve consecutive sentences and cap minimum sentences to provide inmates more time on parole. The Republican lawmaker has vowed to work with

Democrat Omaha Sens. Justin Wayne and Terrell McKinney to reintroduce portions of the failed reform attempt.

Of note, Geist is challenging Lincoln's Democrat Mayor Leirion Gaylor Baird in the city's spring election. One can only imagine her vision that the promise of a new prison being built in the community would sweeten the pot for her.

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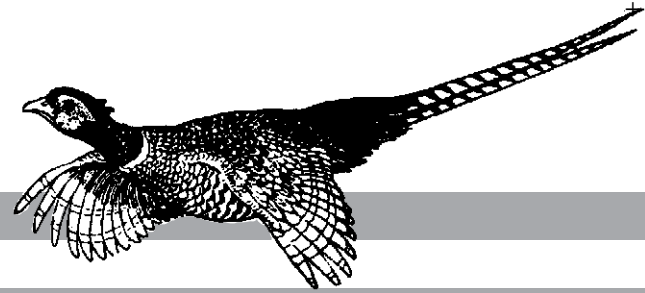

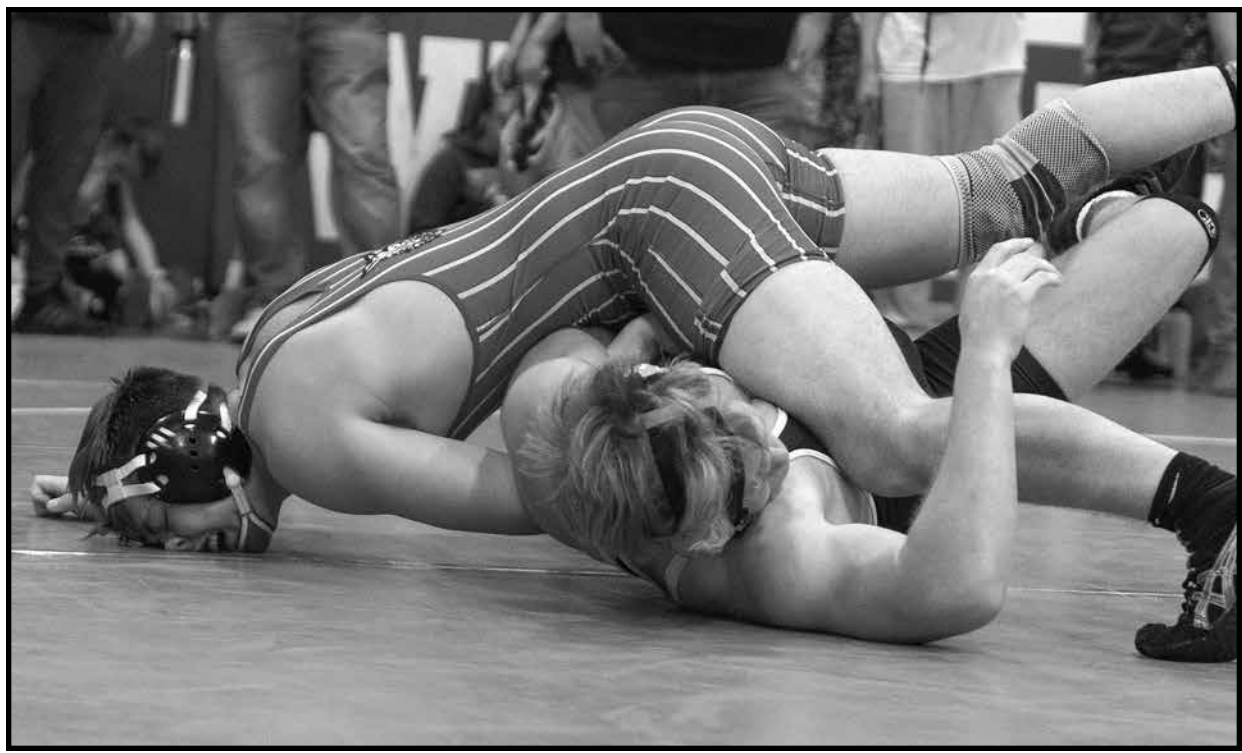
Wayne State used a 10-0 run

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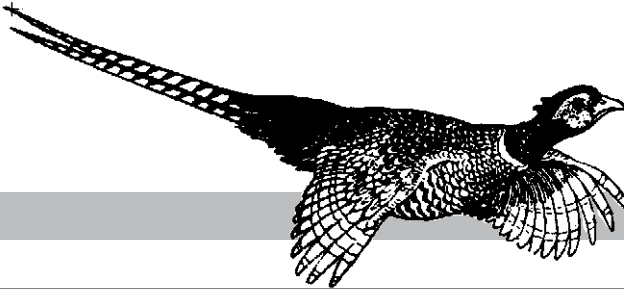
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# Starting a new year, mourning friends

## Multi-state land management and leasing workshop planned for Midwestern women in ag

An upcoming four-part extension workshop for women in agriculture will focus on the basics of land management, leasing and conservation for landlords and tenants.

"The Power of Negotiation and Communication: Land Leasing Strategies for Midwestern Ag Women" program will be a 4-part series, held at Haskell Ag Lab in Concord.

The series will focus on writing agricultural lease agreements, landlord-tenant relationships, negotiations and conservation practices. Workshops will be held from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. Central time on Wednesdays, Jan. 18, Jan. 25, Feb. 1, and Feb. 8.

The program is a collaboration between extension women in Agriculture programs at Purdue University, Kansas State University and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

According to Department of Agriculture census data from 2017, there are over 90,000 women producers and over 51,000 female landlords in the three states.

"Women represent an important and growing demographic in agricultural land management and this workshop series will teach essential management information while providing women the chance to ask questions, connect with each other and share their experiences," said Jessica Groskopf, director of the Nebraska Women in Agriculture program.

Each state will host a number of workshop sites with local extension personnel. Keynote speakers will be simulcast to each location and each site will provide additional speakers and hands-on activities. A meal is included each evening of

the workshop series.

Groskopf said the program's structure is intended to strengthen networks of women in rural areas, which can provide opportunities for building trust and sharing information. "Connections are so important to women farmers," she said. "We have seen the benefits that come from knowing your peers, having a place to share difficulties and mitigate the isolation that so many of us in agriculture often feel."

The workshops seek to help participants increase their awareness of local land values and cash rental rates and the factors that influence them. They will also cover the importance of having a written lease and the items that should be included in it to ensure an equitable agreement for all parties. Participants will learn negotiation strategies as well as best practices to improve relationships between landlords and tenants.

Conservation programs will also be covered, so that women will have a greater understanding of compliance requirements and increase their awareness of voluntary conservation programs that are available to them.

The workshop costs \$50 per person and participants should plan to attend each session. A virtual option is available for those unable to attend a workshop site, although in-person attendance is highly encouraged to better network with other attendees and interact with speakers. ## NDEE accepting applications for Private Well Reverse Osmosis Rebate Program

The Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy (NDEE) is now accepting applications for the Private Well Reverse Osmosis Rebate Program.

NDEE will administer \$1.2 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds through rebates for private well reverse osmosis systems, which is part of a larger \$4 million ARPA initiative administered by NDEE as authorized under LB 1014e Section 51.

Private well reverse osmosis system rebates are available to property owners of private wells with drinking water test levels above 10 parts per million (ppm) of nitrate. Applicants will be eligible for up to \$4,000 in rebates per small treatment installation that is effective in the removal of nitrate to a level below 10 ppm.

Rebate applications can include testing costs, purchase price of the system, and installation costs. Applicants will need to ensure that their well is registered with the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources.

Applicants will be required to submit water quality data from the State laboratory with testing results dated no earlier than Jan. 1, 2022. Testing is available to any private citizen in the state at <https://www.nebraska.gov/dhhs/water-test-kits/private.html>. Applications from property owners will also be required to contain a cost estimate from a licensed plumber, or an entity that has performed at least five successful Private Well Reverse Osmosis Small Water Treatment installations, for the installation of a reverse osmosis treatment device certified by the American National Standards Institute.

Following pre-approval, the property owner must submit adequate documentation of the treatment installation, including but not limited to proof of treatment device purchase, certified statement of and/or photographs of installation. NDEE will disperse approved rebates following successful installation and demonstration of effective removal of nitrate to a level below 10 ppm. Follow-up testing will need to be submitted to the department to demonstrate successful removal of nitrate to a level below 10 ppm. The application period for private well property owners opened Jan. 1, 2023 and closes March 31, 2023; installations and follow-up testing need to be completed by September 30, 2024.

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# Cornstalks, pasture leases discussed

## Mid-Winter Cornstalk Grazing

Here in mid-winter, cornstalks remain a great forage resource for livestock producers. Snow cover on cornstalks is generally not a problem for cattle as they are adept at digging their way through to get at the leaves, husks, and remaining corn that they are seeking. However, if an icy crust develops on the snow, this will limit grazing and supplemental feed may need to be provided.

Another important consideration is the stocking rate and how long they have been in a particular field. Nutritional value of cornstalk residue is greatest at the beginning of a grazing period and declines with time as the most nutritious plant parts are consumed. A general stalk grazing rule is there is about 30 cow days per 100 bushels of corn that the field produced.

Over the fall and winter, weathering can also play a role in reducing cornstalk quality. Rain or melting snow soaks into dry corn stalk residue and leaches out some of the soluble nutrients. Most serious is the loss of sugars and other energy-dense nutrients, which lowers the TDN or energy value of the stalks.



Another factor that affects cornstalk grazing is wind. We have had our share of excessively high winds which easily blow corn leaves and husks off the field. This of course, can impact the amount of feed, and after grain, those leaves and husks contain the highest nutritional quality.

Cornstalks are still a great and economical winter feed source. Just be sure to closely monitor cow and field conditions while adjusting your supplementation program accordingly.

## Pasture Lease Drought Considerations

Drought conditions usually occur one out of every five years in Nebraska especially in the western regions. Further, when severe drought conditions occur in one year, the majority of the time...an-

other extreme drought subsequently follows in the next growing season. Our last back-to-back extreme drought occurred in 2012 and 2013. With the extreme 2022 drought, will conditions repeat again this year? If so, should pasture lease agreements be adjusted?

Historically, pastures (especially in the western region) need time for full recovery after drought. During Dust Bowl years, heavily (overgrazed) pastures often resulted in delayed forage production for up to five years. Whereas, moderately grazed pastures recovered quicker.

So, now may be the time for landowners and tenants to include a clause in their written pasture lease agreements to account for potential dry conditions. Other pasture biomass management clauses might include severe hail and wildfire considerations.

Traditionally, pasture leases are for five or six months from April or May through October. Previously stressed warm-season grass pas-

tures might be rested by delaying grazing season start in 2023. Further, pasture stocking rates could be reduced 10-15% and adjusted further if drought continues. In fairness, pasture rent owed should also be adjusted accordingly if the grazing season is shortened.

Consider pricing leases based on grazing animal unit months (AUM's) rather than a flat rate per acre or cow-calf pair. A clause might be added to cover livestock water in case water source go dry. Typically, pasture weed control is a landlord expense; but if the pasture was overgrazed due to drought, weed control costs might be shared between landowners and tenants.

Start your communications early and make written agreements for fairness and equity. UNL Extension Ag. 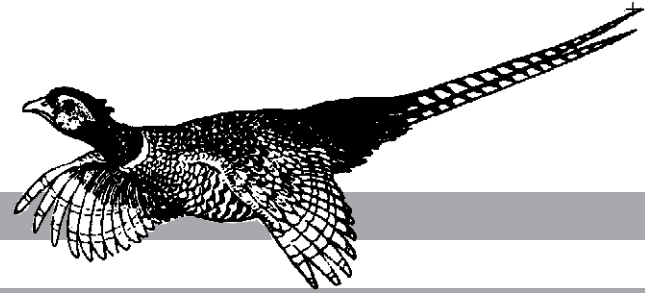

## Developmental milestones listed for creative preschoolers School Lunches

The "Why" years can be rather trying at times, but what a clear sign of your child's expanding knowledge! This is the prime time to make memories through shared activities.

Creativity can be encouraged through art, dance, music and story-telling activities. These activities may be one-on-one with your child or with small groups of preschoolers.

### Three to Four Years

At three years of age, you may notice new skills such as matching shapes, colors and patterns or drawing simple faces. Three-year-olds may use a pencil or crayon to print large capital letters or they may cut with scissors and begin to follow simple outlines.

These are some activities you may enjoy trying with your child:

- Making collages using paper, glue, and pictures cut from magazines

• Labeling your child's artwork using his/her own words and then letting your child "read" it

• Asking your child to choose a favorite storybook character to act out and discussing the character's feelings and emotions

• Telling stories of grandparents, aunts and uncles when they were children

• Imitating sounds found in nature (wind, rain, hail, thunder)

### Four to Five Years

Are you starting to hear "stories" from your child that show imagination and exaggeration? Do these stories involve lots of actions such as running, jumping and hopping?

Here are some other creative activities to try:

• Repeating sequences of three to five simple movements to fit a song or dance

• Making a patchwork quilt with scraps of paper or fabric

• Drawing a character from a favorite book or drawing a self-portrait while looking in a mirror

• Bringing clipboards outside so children can draw trees, flowers, pine cones, and tall grass

• Dramatizing a story together with familiar roles and then reversing roles in the same story.

### Five Years

"I can do this!" Yes, your child will demonstrate many new skills during this year! Physical skills may include jumping rope, playing hopscotch, doing somersaults

and cartwheels and riding a bike. Buildings made with cardboard or blocks may become quite elaborate and so will the stories that accompany these adventures.

Encourage your child's creativity by providing opportunities to try some of the following activities:

• Making scrapbooks of favorite stories or artwork

• Role play a familiar chore and have your child guess the activity, then reverse roles

• Choosing a theme and have children create a mural using sidewalk chalk

• Demonstrating dance movements and then have children take turns leading the dance while the music plays

• Provide a prop box of durable items and choose stories to dramatize

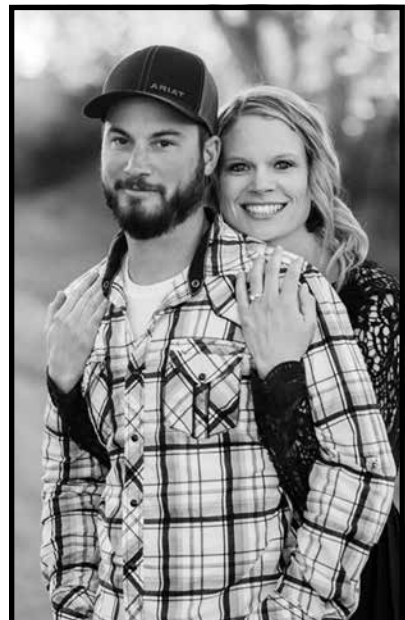

## Discussing 'The other skin cancer'

When people talk about skin cancer the type that most people think about is melanoma. This skin cancer follows the ABCDE rules for diagnosis. A — Asymmetry, B — irregular Border, C — more than 1 Color, D — Diameter more than 6 mm, and E — expanding in size.

However, these rules will not help find the most common type of skin cancer called a basal cell carcinoma.

Unlike melanomas, basal cell carcinomas are often symmetric with regular borders in the early stages. They are usually one color, being the same as the surrounding skin, but with a pearly sheen, although they can also be reddish or bluish in color. On darker skin tones, they may appear lighter or darker than the overall skin tone. They often start off as bumps with a rolled border or can have a warty appearance. They are also fairly slow growing and can be smaller than 6 mm when forming. As you can see, the ABCDE rules are NOT helpful for diagnosing this type of skin cancer.

Basal cell carcinoma accounts for nearly 80% of all skin cancers and is the most common type of cancer in the world. However, they are rarely fatal, tend to grow slowly, and do

not tend to spread to other areas of the body, although, if left untreated, may grow deep and spread out from where they started. They are commonly found on sun-exposed areas of skin — such as the neck, arms and face, especially on the nose and ears. Basal cell carcinomas are most common in elderly males, especially in fair skinned people with blonde or red hair. One example is farmers, who typically spend many hours out in the fields working in the sun. They often wear baseball hats which protect their foreheads and scalps but leave their neck, arms, nose and ears exposed to the sun where they are more likely to have a basal cell carcinoma occur. Another example would be truck drivers, they would most likely have a basal cell carcinoma on the left arm or the left side of their face versus the right due to that side more frequently being in the sun.

As a basal cell progresses, they can develop a central depression that often scabs and bleeds. Oftentimes there are thin red lines visible on the edges of a basal cell carcinoma. Those thin red lines are small blood vessels that can bleed when bumped or scratched. When someone comes to the doctor and describes having a sore that does not seem to heal, a basal cell carcinoma is often on the list of possible causes to rule out.

Do not just follow the ABCDE's for skin cancer detection. No matter what the spot on your skin looks like, if you are concerned, tell your doctor to take a look. It just could be one of the other types of skin cancer. Your skin will thank you.

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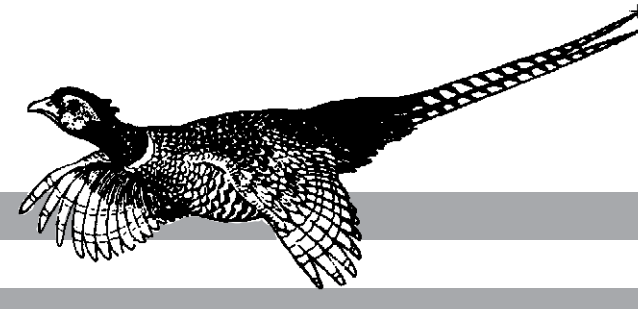

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# Celebrating the baptism of Christ

My 11-year-old great grandson, Leo, is going to be baptized on Jan. 22. I will take vacation so I can worship with him and other members of my family. I am excited to be able to celebrate with him as he takes this important step in his faith journey.

For those of us in liturgical churches, we are in the season of Epiphany. We celebrate Epiphany each year on Jan. 6 when we remember the Wise Men who travel to see the Christ Child, and offer their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

According to Oxford's English dictionary, the definition of Epiphany is,

• "the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi (Matthew 2:1-12)."  
• "the festival commemorating the Epiphany on Jan. 6."  
• "a manifestation of a divine or supernatural being."

This past Sunday, we celebrated another epiphany moment in the baptism of Christ.

In Matthew's gospel, we hear that John the Baptist was preaching in the wilderness, saying "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."

"I baptize you with water for re-

pentance, but the One who is coming after me is mightier than I, whose sandals I am not worthy to carry; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire."

John baptized people in the river Jordan as they confessed and repented of their sins. John touched the hearts of people, word traveled, and more and more people came to him from Jerusalem, all Judea, and the region around the Jordan. Then Jesus traveled from Galilee to the Jordan, a distance of about 70 miles, and asked John to baptize Him.

John has proclaimed over and over that he is not worthy to carry the sandals of the One who is coming. So, it is not surprising that John says, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?"

But when John objects, Jesus replies "Let it be so for now; for it is proper for us in this way to fulfill all righteousness." To fulfill all righteousness means to be obedient to the will of God. It was God's will that Jesus be baptized by John. Both John and Jesus were obedient to God's will.

After Jesus was baptized, He saw the Spirit of God descend upon him

like a dove, and a voice came from heaven saying, "This is my beloved Son with whom I am well pleased." We find a clear reference to the Trinity in this passage. After He is baptized, Jesus sees the heavens opened, the Spirit of God descending like a dove and resting on Him, and He hears the voice of His heavenly Father, praising Him.

The baptism of Jesus is an event that is filled with mystery. In the early church, Jesus' baptism by John was a source of embarrassment. Some people believed that this revealed that John was superior to Jesus.

In addition, Jesus' baptism by John seems to go against one of our fundamental beliefs. The Christian faith holds that Jesus was without sin, and that he died bearing the weight of our sins, to bring us salvation.

Jesus, who was perfect, died for all of us who are not, in order to reconcile us to God. Yet Jesus came to John to be baptized, and John's baptism was a baptism of repentance.

John MacArthur wrote in The MacArthur New Testament Commentary: Matthew, "Jesus' baptism was the first act of his minis-

try, the first step in the redemptive plan that He came to fulfill. He who had no sin took His place among those who had no righteousness. He who was without sin submitted to a baptism for sinners. In this act the Savior of the world took His place among the sinners of the world" 1 Unquote

In this we see the full expression of Emmanuel, God with Us. God has come to us in Jesus. As Jesus and John were called to live in obedience to the will of God, we too, are called to lives of obedience. That means giving up our own self-will and accepting God's will for our lives. This is something that I suspect we all struggle with, at least I know that I do.

We are called to live out our baptism, to follow God's will for our lives, and to share the love of God with others.

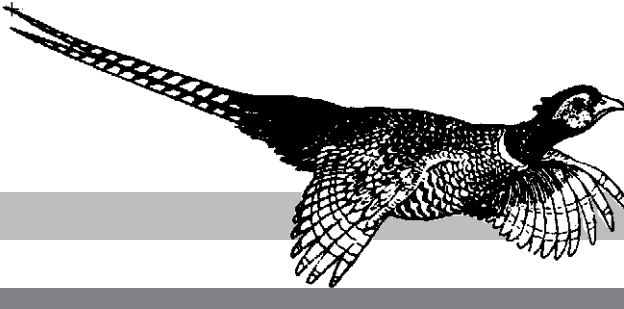
When we worship on The Baptism of Christ Sunday, or attend a baptism, we are encouraged to remember our own baptisms, and to live out our baptismal faith. We do this as we follow Christ's example, by caring for those in need, by feeding the hungry, giving a cup of cold water to those who are thirsty, and giving clothing to those in need. By visiting those in prison, and welcoming strangers. We live out our baptism as we reveal God's love for all people through acts of compassion.

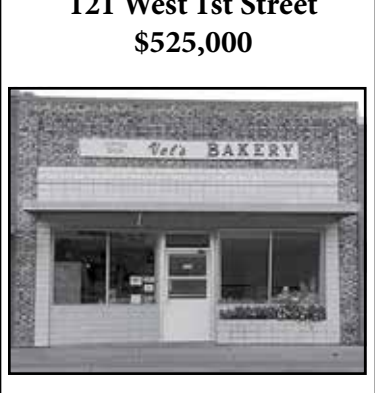
