## Trenhaile shares passion for history with future teachers

Phylis Trenhaile says it best, "History isn't something we can change but it is something we can learn from."

Trenhaile has been a teacher at Wayne Elementary for over 30 years, currently teaching fifth grade with an emphasis in Social Studies. She also shares her teaching talents with Wayne State College (WSC) students.

On Oct. 23, 52 WSC students walked the leaf covered paths at the Greenwood Cemetery right before dusk. Trenhaile led the students on an expedition to identify various veterans of the military from the Revolutionary War (1775-1783) to Iraq War (2003-2011). This was part of their current college class; "Development of Social Studies in the Elementary and Middle School."

The bronze markers can identify war veterans. Bronze markers are provided to

each family of deceased veterans to signify the war they served in during their time in the military.

Throughout the tour, students separated into groups gathering information about many veterans. They were also able to tour the Veterans Memorial, located in the cemetery, that is dedicated to veterans of all branches of the military.

In May, Trenhaile will repeat the lesson in history on the U.S. wars. Wayne Elementary fifth grade students will be able to also visit the cemetery to learn not only U.S. history, but Wayne County veteran history prior to Memorial Day.

Trenhaile believes that a teacher is a facilitator of learning, and it starts with the classroom teacher. Taking the college students out to the cemetery is her way of having her students experience an example of learning and seeing the importance of local history.

Ellie Patera, WSC junior majoring in El-

ementary Education with an endorsement in reading and writing shared her experience. "Mrs. Trenhaile has provided us with a multitude of resources and activities that she has used with her students to ensure our success in the future. Education can be a difficult job some days, but as an aspiring educator it is empowering to see how passionate Mrs. Trenhaile is about her calling to be a teacher."

In 2011 Trenhaile received the Wayne Area Economic Chamber Educator of the Year. She deserved this honor. She models fairness, honesty, integrity, community, and compassion for others in and out of the classroom.

She describes her classroom as "a mistake making place and a safe environment." She teaches problem solving skills and how to turn mistakes into learning opportunities. This lines up with her philosophy of why learning history is very important.

Trenhaile attributes a lot of her love for U.S. History to former Wayne Middle School Principal Richard Metteer. Having worked with Metteer in the past on History projects, his love of history transformed her to be the amazing teacher she is today.

In 2003 Metteer received the Wayne Kiwanis Club Retired Teacher of the Year. During the same year, Trenhaile had the Civil War come alive in her classroom by having her students re-enact the conflicts between the North and the South. During the Civil War lessons, Metteer visited Trenhaile's classroom and taught the students how to march as soldiers and shared his love for military history.

Trenhaile's hope for her students is that they will become independent learners, develop a love of their country, respect for those who have walked before us and continue to have a desire to learn.

She hopes they will be confident in themselves, as well as their learning abilities. She believes having these skills will help them to become productive adults, good citizens, and be prepared to shape our country's future.

## Country Christmas Tour of Homes is this weekend

Five homes in the Wayne area will be open to visitors this weekend as the Friends of the Wayne County Museum host an event being called 'Christmas Country Tour of Homes.'

Homes on this year's tour include that of Melissa Dobbins, Elizabeth King (Rose Cottage) Karen Longe and Mark Hill, Laura and Randy Nelson (Dreamer's Place) and Rhonda and Ron Sebade.

In addition, the Wayne County Museum, located at Seventh and Lincoln Streets, will be included in the tour.

This house was built in 1900 by Dr. W. C. Wightman at a cost of \$13,000. It took two years to build. The Wightman family lived here until they moved to California in 1912.

The house was then sold to a local banker, Rollie W. Ley, for about \$6,000. The Ley family continued to own the house until 1976 when Mr. Ley's heirs donated it to the Historical Society for use as a museum.

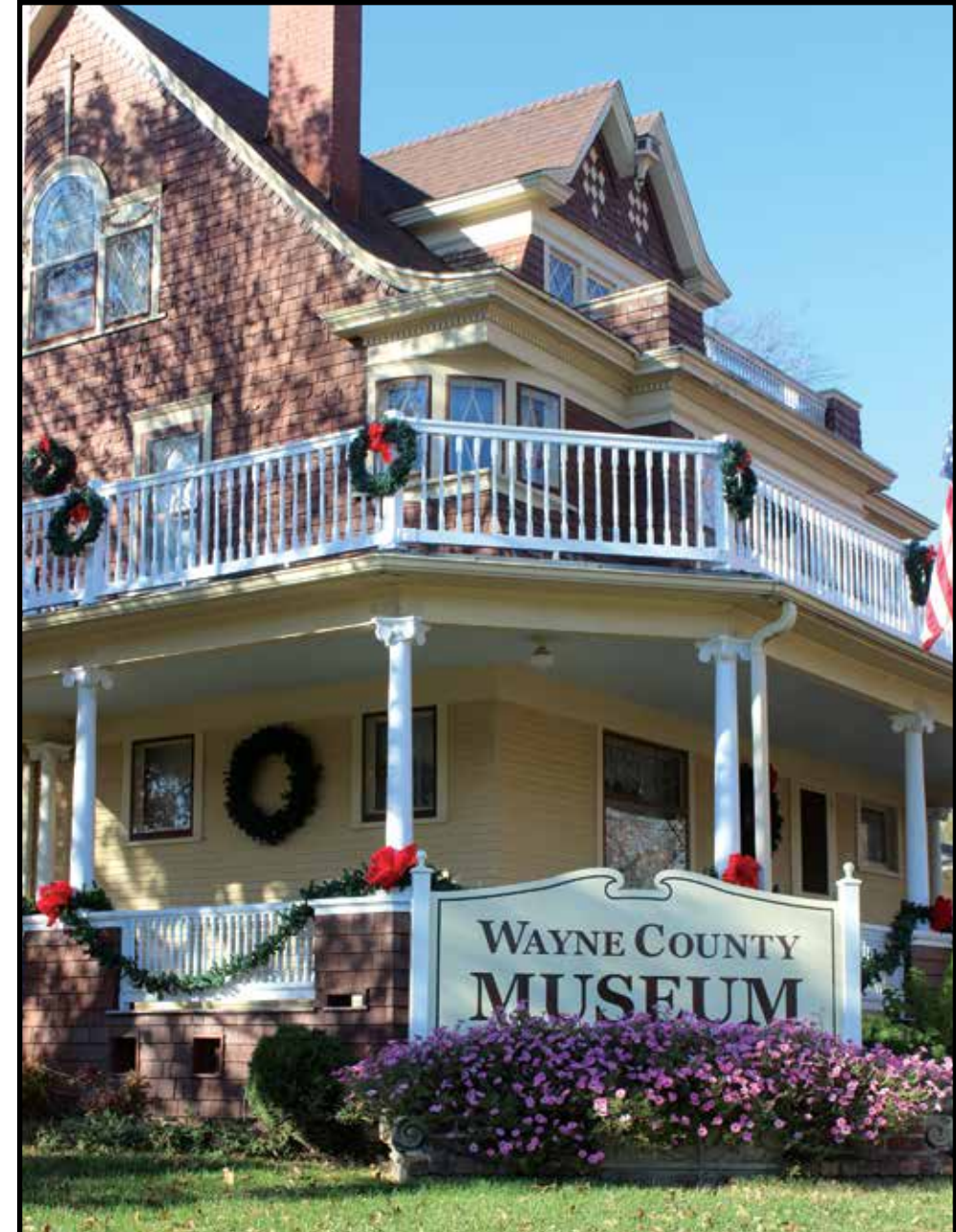
Features of this gracious home include a reception hall of oak paneling, a built-in bookcase with curved glass doors, courting corner, stained glass and beveled glass windows and beautiful parquet floors.

The house is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Refreshments will be served at the museum during the times of the tours.

Tour hours will be from 4:30 to 8 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 15 and from 10:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 16. 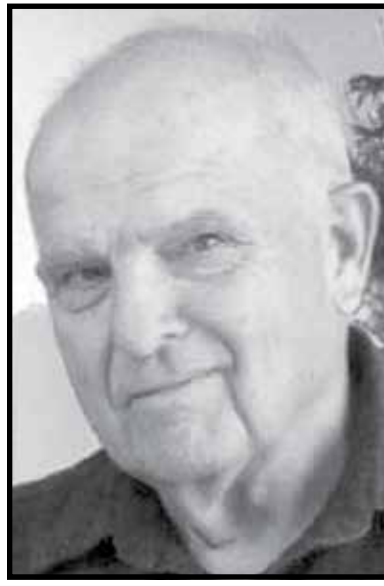

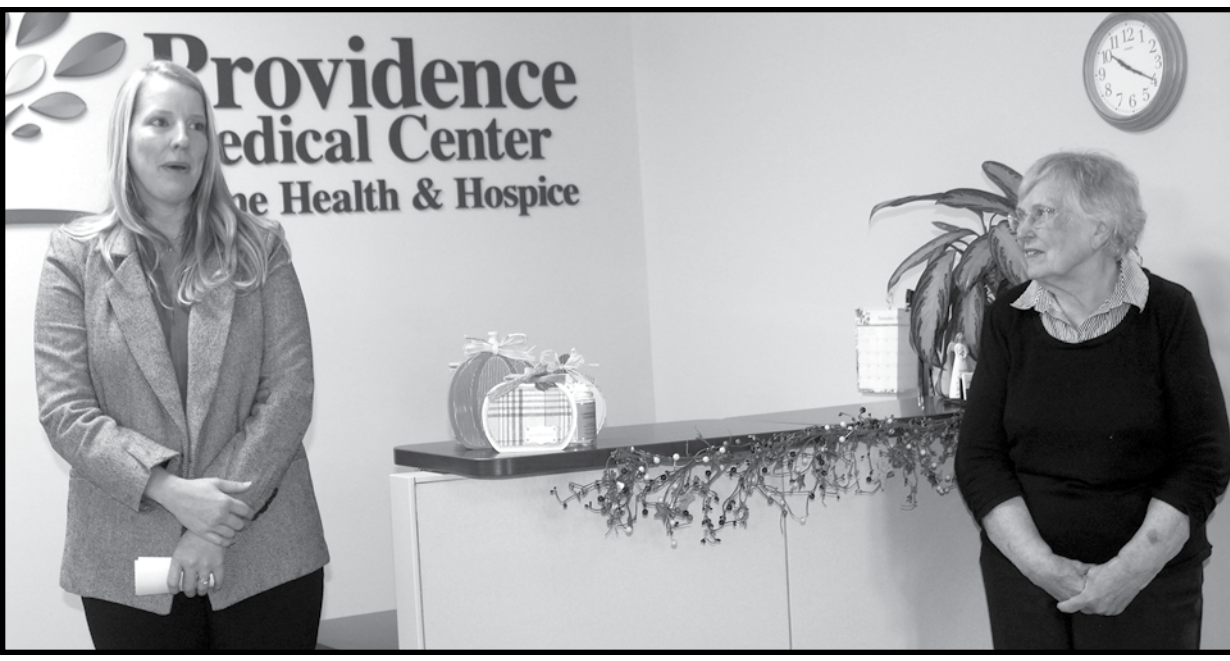

## Insurance coverage, additional staff on school board agenda

A presentation on insurance, along with discussion on adding new staff to the district highlighted Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education.

Sherry Shonka with All Lines Inter-local Cooperative Aggregate Pool (ALICAP) shared information with the board during a required educational session.

She talked about how the organization came into being in the 1980s to pool schools' resources when workers compensation coverage became difficult to obtain.

She explained some of the benefits of being a part of the group to pool resources to help manage risks in regard to coverage of the districts' property and workers' compensation claims.

Among the advantages is the fact the district would be able to get certain types of coverage at levels it would not be able to afford with the pool.

Other advantages include a nurse case hot line to handle questions, the fact that retired superintendents are part of the governing board and the fact that on-line safety training is available.

Shonka said the decision to become a part of the pool would involve a long-term commitment and shared information on how the program works and explained the dividends that have been paid to members through the years.

She also talked about how the districts are billed for being part of the pool.

During the new business portion of the meeting, board members voted unanimously to enter into an interlocal agreement with ALICAP.

One of the reasons for the change is the fact that the cost of having the insurance with EMC, handled through Northeast Nebraska Insurance, was cost prohibitive and the deductibles were higher.

Superintendent Dr. Mark Lenihan said the district has worked with Northeast Nebraska Insurance for a number of years and he

"appreciated working with them."

In other action, board members voted 3-2 to add E-Sports as an activity for students at Wayne High School. Approximately 30 students are currently involved on a club-level.

Board members Jeryl Nelson and Lynn Junck voted against moving forward with adding the activity, stating concerns with "adding without taking anything away. We (the board) will see other groups coming before us asking to add their activities."

Several Agenda Item Management (AIM) documents were discussed during the meeting, relating to additional classified and certificated staff within the district.

The first of these involves kitchen staff, janitorial staff and secretaries at the Early Learning Center.

Approval of this document received first reading approval.

A second AIM document would establish an additional PreK position at the Early Learning Center.

Board members discussed several options for the position and discussed which would be better for the district. These include having four year old students attend all day, every day or having two different groups of student attend on alternating days.

Early Learning Center Director Misty Bear told the board there are "pros and cons to both options."

The board voted to move forward with the first reading of this document also.

Also receiving first reading approval was an AIM document regarding the addition of certificated staff (K-6) at the Early Learning Center.

Board members discussed class sizes for the coming years and noted the person who fills the position could be utilized at the elementary school in some capacity.

Additional discussion took place for AIM documents for an additional Physical Education position, an art position and an additional school counselor.

Information shared with the board would have these three positions create two full-time-equivalent (FTE) staff.

Superintendent Lenihan shared information on funding the positions based on current statute. He said it was a little early to do an accurate estimate on how the new positions would impact the school's budget.

Board member Nelson said he was worried about how the district would be able to afford these positions in coming years.

"This is \$730,000 worth of new teachers. I am worried that we could have to RIF (Reduction in Force) these positions. We need to be cautious about hiring for these positions," Nelson said.

No action was taken on these items as they died for a lack of a motion.

Board members accepted the resignation of Suzanne Hasenkamp, effective at the end of the first semester of the 2024-2025 school year.

Board members also approved the hiring of Jillian Allemann as a science teacher, effective Jan. 2, 2025. She was hired on a probationary status.

Pay application No. 15 for \$1,184,265.25 to Hausman Construction was approved as work continues on the renovation/construction project.

Prior to the adjourning of the meeting, the board went into Executive Session to discuss negotiations.

The Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, Dec. 9 at 5 p.m. in the junior-senior high school library.

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## WSC football unable to force OT on final drive

With an opportunity to score late, it came down to the final drive for the Wayne State College football team with a fourth one-score game.

From Bob Cunningham Field on the campus of Wayne State, WSC welcomed Northern State on Saturday.

The Wildcats were held to just one score in the second half and were stopped at the Northern State seven-yard line on a fourth and one.

Final favored the visiting Wolves winning 28-21.

With the loss, WSC dropped their third straight falling to 6-4 (5-4 NSIC) while Northern State will end their season at 6-5 (6-4 NSIC).

WSC opened scoring with 7:57 left in the first quarter thanks to sophomore tailback Latravious Boyd with an 11-yard run.

Teams then traded points in the second quarter.

Northern State started with a one-yard rush by sophomore running back Hank Kraft (13:10 until half); true freshman running back Akeem Knox answered for WSC from three-yards out (10:39 left) and NSU's junior quarterback

Daniel Britt connected with freshman wide receiver Cade Kaiser on a four-yard pass (2:53 remaining).

At the half, Northern State and Wayne State were tied at 14-14.

The Wolves then scored two more times in the third quarter. Kraft ran in from six-yards (10:52 left) and redshirt freshman quarterback Colton Hackel added a one-yard score (5:10 remaining) to go up at-most 28-14.

Wayne State College lone points of the second half came from Knox on an 18-yard run (six seconds into the fourth).

Again, final favored Northern State winning 28-21.

Wildcat sophomore placekicker Boston Hensley was 3-3 on extra-points.

Senior quarterback Nick Bohn finished 18-35 for 159 yards with two interceptions along with 12 rushes for 97 net yards.

Boyd added 95 yards on 15 carries and one score as well as four receptions for 27 yards while Knox tallied 16 attempts for 55 yards and two scores along with two catches for two yards.

Redshirt sophomore wide receiver Kendrick Watkins-Hogue recorded five catches for 53 yards; junior tight end Trey Miller tallied

two receptions for 38 yards; senior wide out Ashten Schmaderer had two catches for 20 yards as senior wide out Jadon Johnson tacked on three receptions for 19 yards.

Senior linebacker Alex Schall recorded a team-high 11 tackles (three solo) with two tackles for loss while senior safety Jacob Byrd followed with six tackles (two solo) and a half tackle for loss.

Other tackles for loss came from senior defensive back Adrien Pidgeon (one solo tackle) with one TFL along with sophomore defensive lineman James Frank (three total tackles) with a half TFL.

Wayne State College ran 79 plays for 406 yards (247 rushing/159 passing) while Northern State University finished with 340 yards on 52 plays (186 rushing/154 passing). WSC was 6-16 on third down and 3-5 on fourth down compared to the Wolves going 6-12 on third down. The Wildcats won the battle of time of possession 32:53 to 27:07.

The Wayne State College football team will host the annual Egg Bowl and Senior Day game to close out their year welcoming Concordia-St. Paul at noon on Saturday, Nov. 16.

## Stokes with final bucket gives Wildcats road victory; three in double figures

## Truman named NSIC women's soccer goalkeeper

Wayne State College senior goalkeeper Sidney Truman was announced Monday morning as the NSIC Women's Soccer Goalkeeper of the Week following her performance last Thursday in a 1-0 win over Winona State. It's the first time that the fifth-year senior from Ankeny, Iowa has received NSIC Player of the Week honors.

Truman recorded eight saves vs. Winona State last Thursday in a 1-0 win over the Warriors, helping Wayne State qualify for the NSIC Tournament for the first time since the 2019 season. It was her sixth shutout of the season and the win over Winona State was just the third for WSC in 32 career meetings.

For the season, Truman has a 7-6-5 record with six shutouts and a 1.10 goals against average. She ranks fifth in the NSIC this season with 89 saves, is tied for sixth in the league with six shutouts, ranks seventh in save percentage (.824) and ninth in goals against average.

Wayne State is the #8 seed for the NSIC Women's Soccer Tournament that starts Monday afternoon with the Wildcats visiting NSIC regular season champion and #7 Minnesota State Monday at 1 p.m. in Mankato, Minnesota.

# Sorensen scores seventh goal on season, Wildcats land #8 seed during NSIC tournament

With a final push for the postseason, Wayne State College women's soccer closed out their regular season Thursday late afternoon.

From the WSC Soccer Complex, the Wildcats welcomed Winona State.

Going into the day, WSC was sitting ninth (one spot out of the tournament) and needed a win and either a loss or tie from either Northern State or Bemidji State.

The Wildcats took care of their business thanks to a 1-0 victory to improve to 7-6-5 (6-4-4 NSIC) while Winona State ended their season at 6-8-2 (5-8-1 NSIC/10th). According to Wayne State Athletics, it was just the third win for WSC over Winona State in women's soccer in 32 career meetings between the schools.

With Bemidji State winning, the Beavers remained ahead of WSC but Northern State lost and dropped to ninth allowing the Wildcats to jump into the NSIC Tournament with the #8 seed.

Alaina Sorensen scored her team-leading seventh goal of the season during the 53rd minute (52:08) of the match off an assist by Addison Walker. That held to the be the 1-0 final.

Sorensen took five shots with four on goal and one in the back of the net; Maia Vacks and Riann Daas both added one shot on goal as Walker had the assist.

Other shot attempts came from Morgan Rhodes, Erin Peters, Neleah Dunlap, Kaylee Herall and Paige Pemberton all with one.

Sidney Truman was in goal for all 90 minutes finishing with her sixth complete shutout of the season while adding eight saves.

Winona State outshot Wayne State College, 17-12 including 8-6 on goal. The host Wildcats recorded six corner kicks compared to four by WSU.

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# Blue Devils land six on Mid State All-Conference softball teams

Postseason recognitions are starting to be posted with several Wayne High softball players among the 24 listed All-Conference/Honorable Mention.

According to a release, the 2024 Mid State All-Conference selections featured 13 First Team and 11 honorable mentioned student-athletes.

Wayne High First Team All-Conference were led by junior Nyla Bolles and senior Sammi Gubbels.

Bolles recorded a .551 hitting percentage and .798 slugging percentage with 107 plate appearances and led Wayne High in hits (49), singles (33), doubles (12), triples (two), runs scored (41), hit by pitch (nine), stolen bases (20) and tied for the team lead in homeruns (two). She also had 19 RBI.

Sammi Gubbels led the Blue Devil pitching staff with 91 innings pitched (1,467 pitches) and appeared in 22 games with 20 starts going 13-6 with one save. She allowed 67 runs (41 earned) off 108 hits while striking out 96 batters, walking 28 and hitting

three with a 3.142 ERA. At the plate, Gubbels hit .354, led the team in RBI with 24 and walks (13), was second on the team in hits with 28 and singles (24) and tied for second in doubles (four). She also recorded a .971 field percentage with just one error.

Honorable mention Wayne softball individuals were senior Rylin Hall, junior Reagan McGuire and Mackenzie Nissen as well as freshman Kinnley McGuire.

Hall recorded a .301 hitting percentage with 22 hits (16 singles, four doubles, tied for first with two homeruns), 20 RBI, 25 run scored, 11 walks and seven hit by pitch.

Reagan McGuire finished with a .281 hitting percentage, 18 hits (14 singles, three doubles, one triple), 14 RBI, 25 runs scored, 10 walks and seven stolen bases.

Nissen was the second pitcher in the circle for Wayne with 48 innings (846 pitches) appearing in 13 games with nine starts going 5-5. She allowed 40 runs (32 earned) off 47 hits while striking out 58 batters, walking 31 and hitting two. At the plate, Nissen hit .348, had 22 RBI, 24 hits (21 singles, two doubles, one HR) and had

13 runs scored. She also recorded a .960 field percentage with just one error. Kinnley McGuire hit .329 with

23 hits (22 singles, one double), 17 RBI, 25 runs scored and 12 walks. The Wayne High softball team finished 19-11.

## Pumpkins and winter squash kids will love

Pumpkins and winter squash are more than just decorations; they're also nutritional superheroes that help keep kids and families healthy.

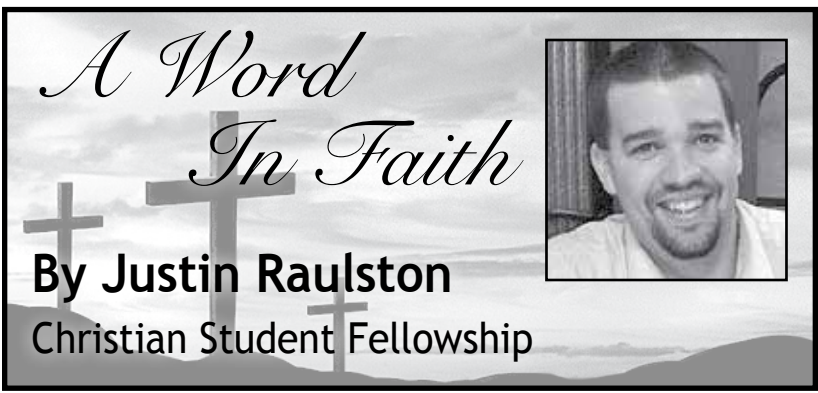
## St. Paul's Ladies Aid holds November meeting

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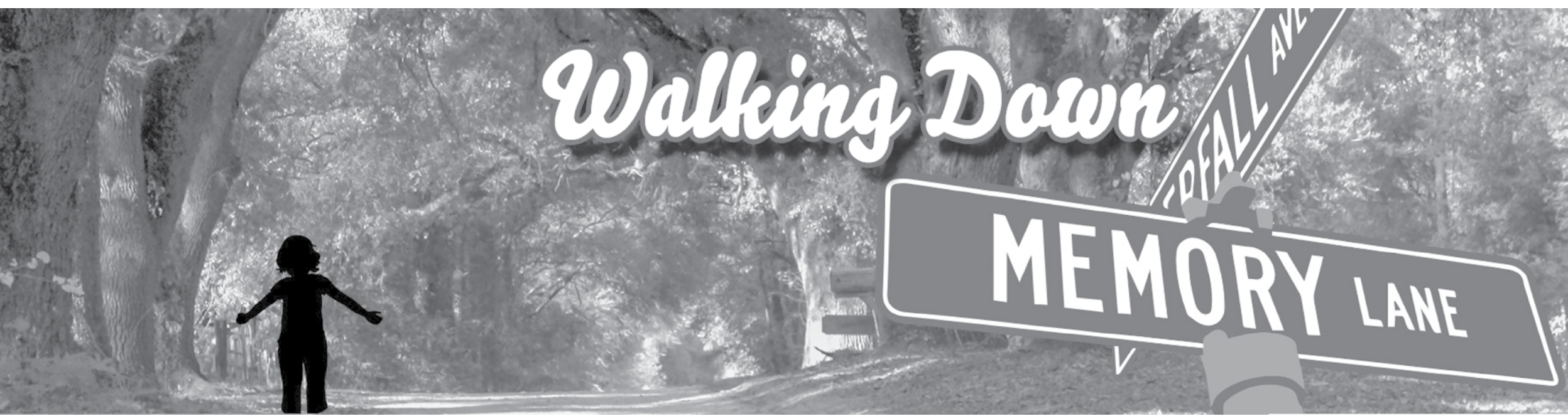
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**November 12, 1964 — Projects totaling \$2,250,000 for receive ok by State Normal Board**  
 A new dormitory of unusual design and an addition to the Student Center at Wayne State College received approval from the State Normal Board Monday. The nine-story dormitory, housing 400 students, will be the first high-rise structure on a Nebraska state college campus. Tentative plans call for each floor above the firsts to have a central lodge and study rooms in addition to the living rooms. Exterior design will have distinctly new features, though in harmony with Wayne's traditional architecture. The architecture is Leo A. Daly and Company, Omaha. The dormitory is being planned to accommodate either men or women students, or both, as the need rises. The addition to the Student Center will increase cafeteria capacity by about 50 per cent on the upper level, and the lower level will have more rooms for officers of students, publications and organizations.

**November 14, 1974 — City seeks new city clerk**  
 Dan Sherry, city clerk in Wayne since the fall of 1965, will retire at the end of this year. Mayor Freeman Decker made the announcement of Sherry's approaching retirement during Tuesday night's regular council meeting. The council was expected to meet this afternoon (Thursday) to discuss the duties currently carried out by Sherry as clerk-treasurer and to discuss what type of person will have to be hired to fill his post when he retires. Sherry had said several times in recent months that he was considering retiring, but Tuesday night's announcement by Decker was the first official statement. Sherry, 64, became city clerk late in 1965 after being elected to the council the previous spring. He resigned from the council to take over the clerk's job.

**November 12, 1984 — Allen Eagles state tourney hopes end in battle with Alma Cardinals**  
 The Allen Eagles volleyball team's hopes of advancing in the Nebraska State Class C2 volleyball tournament were plucked away by the Alma Cardinals in the opening round of play on Friday morning, Nov. 9. The Eagles, 15-6 entering the tourney, matched talents with a 16-1 Alma squad in an 11:20 match at the Lincoln High School Gym. Allen fell to the Cardinals in two sets by scores of 15-9 and 15-2. The Eagles end their year at 15-7 as the champions of the Class C2-8 District and runners-up in the Lewis and Clark Conference. The Eagles coaching staff includes Gary Troth and assistant RoNelle Woodward. Varsity team members include seniors Pam Heckathorn, Shelly Boyle, Tammy Kavanaugh, Mary Oswald, and Amy Gotch; juniors LeAnn McDonald, Diane Magnuson, and Denise Magnuson; sophomores Nikke olesen, Kristi Chase, Kristen Hansen, Barb Hansen and Tiffany Harder; and freshman Lana Erwin.

**November 15, 1994 — JDC faces survival vote**  
 The Northeast Nebraska Juvenile Detention Center will probably face a closure vote when its board meets Wednesday in Wayne. The troubled center has experienced numerous escapes and judicial charges of unsafe conditions and mismanagement in recent months and Wayne County Commissioner Jerry Pospishil, who is the county representative to the board of the JDC said he expects a vote close to the center when its directors meet wednesday. Center Director Greg Eckel told the associated Press Monday that he could be fired or the center could be shut down at the meeting scheduled at 9 a.m. in the Wayne County Courthouse. Pospishil said it would be a financial mistake for counties to vote to close the center, because they would have to pay a great deal more in transportation and detention costs for taking juveniles to other centers either in state or out.

**November 11, 1994 — New mayor sworn in at council meeting**  
 Wayne's new mayor, Lois Shelton, took office following swearing in ceremonies at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council. Judge Robert Ensz Shelton, who had previously served as President of the Council, assumed the position following last week's resignation of Sheryl Lindau. Prior to the ceremony, Shelton read a letter of resignation from former Mayor Lindau. She noted she was resigning for personal reasons and was confident the council and the city were in capable hands. Considerable discussion was held during the meeting on the Pedestrian Trail, both on the portion of the project that is completed and the phase scheduled in 2006. During the meeting a set of rules and regulations for use of the trail was adopted. These include - use caution when crossing streets; stay on the trail and off private property don't litter; leash all pets and pick up their waste; no motorized vehicles are allowed on the trail except for motorized wheelchair, use of alcohol or drugs is prohibited on the trail; and dawn to dusk usage of the trail in unlit portions.

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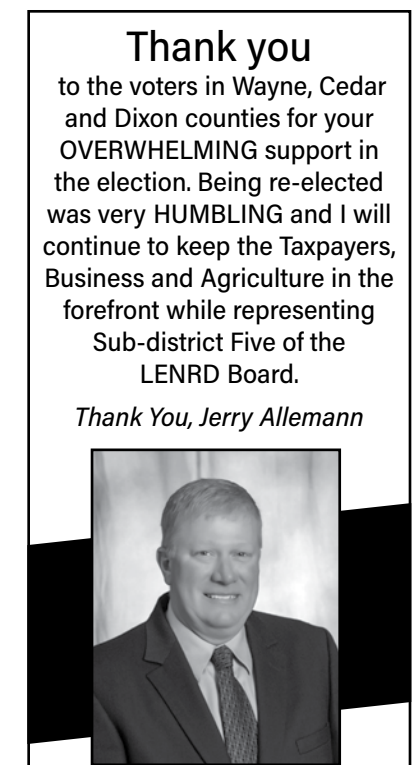

## Forage hazards following a freeze explained

Annual forages are a great resource for producers, but those using sorghums or sudangrass species always need to keep the risk of prussic acid in the back of their mind.

At any time of year, young shoots of sorghum species contain prussic acid, which is why recommendations are to allow ample growth (15-18 inches on new plants) before grazing. When ingested by livestock, the cyanide is released and can quickly cause lethal results when consumed in high amounts.

This time of year, when a frost occurs, broken cell membranes again release large amounts of prussic acid. Typical practice is to keep animals out of the field for 5-7 days after a freeze for the prussic acid to dissipate. The problem is that each time a new part of the plant is frozen, this five-seven day timer is reset until the entire plant has been killed. This can make grazing difficult in the fall when freezing events occur regularly but are not enough to fully kill the plant.

Another way to ensure that sor-

ghums are safe to graze after a freeze is to do a quick field test. UNL professors Dr. Mary Drenowski and Dr. Daren Redfearn share the following advice:

Using a Quick Field Test to Assess Prussic Acid Risk

Producers looking to assess risk in situations where plant growth is borderline or to confirm safety after a killing frost can perform a simple in-field test for prussic acid. This test screens for the presence of cyanide but does not provide exact concentrations. It can, however, give an indication of potential risk.

To perform the test, you can pur-

chase Cyantesmo paper from CTL Scientific Supply (Item 90604), which can be used for multiple tests and has a shelf life of about two years. You will also need disposable gloves, tape, and ziplock bags. Alternatively, Ward Labs offers kits that include everything needed for three tests.

How to Perform a Quick Field Test:

1. Collect the forage: Take a large handful of leaves or other plant material that animals will likely consume. Young shoots and leaves are more likely to contain prussic acid than stems. Collect multiple samples from across the field for a representative assessment.

2. Prepare the sample: Place the forage in a ziplock bag until it's about half full. Tear the leaves into small pieces, mashing them slightly to increase cell injury.

3. Attach the test strip: Tape a one-inch strip of Cyantesmo paper to the inside of the bag, near the top, without directly touching the plant material. Always wear gloves when handling the paper.

4. Moisten the sample: If the sample is dry (little plant juice), add about one tablespoon of water to the bag, just enough to make it

damp.

5. Seal and warm the bag: Seal the bag and place it in a warm location, such as on the sun-warmed hood of a vehicle. The heat will help release any cyanide gas present in the plant material.

6. Check the test strip: After 10 minutes, check the color of the test strip. If it turns dark blue, the sample is positive for cyanide, indicating a potential risk. If there's no color change, the sample is negative for cyanide. Some color change indicates some cyanide is present. If only slight color change occurs, wait another 20 minutes and reassess.

7. Final assessment: After 30 minutes, a sample causing little or no color change in a sufficiently moist environment likely poses minimal risk of prussic acid poisoning.

Safety Tip: Do not breathe the fumes when opening the bag, as cyanide gas is released.

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
